WILLIAM J. BRYAN
VISITED OREGON.

His Lecture at Gladstone was Superb.

TWENTY THOUSAND AT PORTLAND

To see and hear the noted bi-metallic champion. A finished orator, a comprehensive economist and a man that people revere.

About eight thousand people attended Gladstone Park Monday, July 12th, to hear the bi-metallic presidential candidate of 1896 discuss the money question from a non-partisan standpoint. He spoke in the afternoon and from a rostrum constructed under the giant fir and directed his remarks to an amphitheater filled with a delighted, crowded mass of souls. It was one of America's grandest men and champions speaking in a spot named after the grandest man of another great nation. His address was replete with logic and tone heard him but who more fully comprehended after he was through speaking.

Mr. Bryan's figure is well proportioned, tall, and not given to obesity. Constant travel and work has left his countenance more or less fatigued, but only enough to lend strength to his classic features. When he is speaking, one has an opportunity to closely observe his characteristics. Keenly alive to all that would appear flippant, his address was carefully guided from the shoals of buffoonery and his reasonings from cause to effect were applicable to a certainty, carrying strength of conviction. Had he been here in 1890, when the republican party ran on a free coinage issue, party leaders would have exalted his position to that of a demigod.

The daily Oregonian came nearer reporting him correctly than the gold press usually does, but about twenty five minutes of the best part of his lecture having been left out. His remarks frequently elicited cheers from the multitude, and his explanation of the feeling with which he used the term "gold bug" brought deafening cheers. In fact, his entire address was entirely free from bitterness and his most drastic passage was when he said:

"When I call a man a 'gold bug,' I do it in the same kindly spirit which he uses when he terms me a 'lunatic.'"

It will be observed that the county expenditures this year (if the 1895-6 year be footed) are \$3768.68 less than last year. The assessor's office saved \$443.70 while for the year \$2858.86 less was expended on bridges and roads. These two items alone nearly balance the discrepancy. The expense of the Steeves' trial is not included in this statement, as our county was reimbursed. It will be seen that the November election cost less than the June election, thus making a credit showing of \$372.21 for the 1896-7 year. The interest charges, of course, were higher. But one regular officer of the county shows a credit balance—the assessor. The court pulls out with \$111.30 to its credit on account of the excessive time on bridge work for the year ending June 30, 1896.

According to the sheriff's report there is delinquent on the 1896 roll, \$14180 20, and his disbursements to the county treasurer for the year were \$67078.14.
