A LEGAL CURIOSITY

Is the Last Will and Testament of Edward Schiefelin, Deceased.

Hon. S. B. Huston, as attorney for the executor, has filed the last will and testament of Edward L. Schiefelin, the deceased California miner, and it is unique, both in brevity and conditions.

The wife receives all property in Alameda and Santa Clara counties, California, and after debts have been paid out of \$15,000 University of Arizona bonds and his life insurance the residue is divided between a brother, Jay Schiefelin and the widow.

The testator says he has no children but in case of proof, such are to have \$50. The will is in his own handwriting, the Clerk of the California court having sent to this state a certified copy.

Here is his last wish as expressed in the instrument: "It is my wish, if convenient, to be buried in the garb of a prospector, my old pick and canteen with me, on top of the granite hills about three miles westerly from the city of Tombstone, Arizona and a monument, such as prospectors build when locating a mining claim, built over my grave, and no other monument or slab erected. And that none of my friends wear crape. Under no circumstances do I want to be buried in any graveyard."
