[PUBLIC NO. 88.]

AN ACT to prevent forest fires on public domain.

It is enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled: That any person who shall willfully or negligently leave or suffer fire to burn unattended near any timber or other inflammable material, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, any district court of the United States having jurisdiction of the same, shall be fined in sum not more than five thousand dollars or be imprisoned for a term not more than two years, or both. SEC. 2. That any person who shall build a camp fire, or other fire, in or near any forest, timber, or other inflammable material, shall, before breaking camp or leaving said fire, totally extinguish the same. Any person failing to do so shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof in any district court of the United States having jurisdiction of the same, shall be fined in sum of not more than five thousand dollars, or to be imprisoned for a term of not more than five years, or both. SEC. 3. That in all cases arising under this act the fines collected shall be paid into the public treasury of the United States in which the lands where the offense was committed are situated.
