COMMERCIAL BASE OF WHEAT AND HOPS

Very Little Movement in Either Product.

WHEAT 5 CENTS ABOVE LOW MARK.

Yesterday's Liverpool Advices Quote Buyers and Sellers as Standing Apart.

The market situation of wheat and hops, Oregon's staple products, remains very inactive, at present, although wheat has advanced five cents above the lowest mark of the this year's selling season. Sales are very slow even at this figure, buyers not appearing very anxious to load up, and the market seems to be bordering on the down grade. Cablegrams from Liverpool quote buying practically at standstill, indicating congestion. Charters out of Portland have risen slightly, although an immense fleet is on the way. Of course, it is very hard to predict the inclination but buyers seem to be expecting a downward break.

The hop market is very uncertain through the fact that there is a big amount of contract hops at very low prices, and the commission men are trying to keep up hopes of the growers, that they will hold for high prices until the contract product is out of the way at a good figure. A few choice lots in the state have sold at 15 cents but the buying is very weak. A Portland buyer is in town today for the purpose of making an offer for four or five choice lots but just what was tendered was not learned.

The partition wall has been built and the two old cells which for so long graced the old jail have been taken out and will do service in the west apartment of the new structure—to be used as the women's ward, or for insane as the emergency requires. The cells were riveted together after the building was completed. Crowden is said to now be in Tillamook.
