THOUGHT CONVICTION IMPOSSIBLE

How Mooberry's dog has Played a very
part in the Recent Great Murder Trial.

The state cases against Louis Rabe, Gus Seidler and J. C. Corey of Cornelius, alleging the sale of liquor to minors from Forest Grove, have all been thrown out of court. Rabe had a trial on one indictment last week and was acquitted. On Monday Gus Seidler's case was heard by a jury and after having deliberated all night a verdict of disagreement was reported. It was then thought advisable to dismiss all the similar cases as conviction seemed almost impossible. Therefore, the District Attorney, laboring under the impression that the Seidler jury stood 10 for acquittal and 2 for conviction, moved and obtained a dismissal. To his subsequent sorrow he ascertained that the vote had been the reverse, 2 for acquittal and 10 for conviction! So poor old knock-kneed justice is sad and disconsolate. Aber, as Rabe was acquitted, and the jury could not find Seidler guilty, it is better thus.

A CANINE DETECTIVE

How George Mooberry's dog
Immortalized Himself in Court.

Stenographer Runyon's reports of the Wachline trial contain a story which is quite an element in that celebrated murder case. Without the body of John D. Ledrick it is assumed that the state could not have established the corpus delicti and Gus Wachline today might have been living in the light of sunshine and breathing the atmosphere of freedom.

When the searching party was looking for Ledrick's body all efforts were fruitless. They were about to give up the hunt when Mooberry, one of the party, said, "If his body is here my dog will find it." Attention was then turned to the dog, which went down the narrow lane leading to the barn. The canine passed by the manure pile a few feet, sniffed, and then returned straight to the pile of compost. The eager crowd noted his strange actions and Mooberry said, "He must be buried in there." Search revealed the truth of this and the body was soon uncovered. But for the dog, the body of old John Ledrick might yet have been resting in its sepulchre of compost and Gus Wachline still enjoying that freedom which is dear to man.

CONVICTED OF
MURDER IN THE
FIRST DEGREE.Gus Wachline in the
Shadow of the Gallows

JURY OUT SIX HOURS

The Defendant may be
Sentenced Saturday.Not a Solitary vote for Acquittal - On
the First Ballot Unanimous as to Guilt.

Twelve men of the commonwealth of Washington county, after hearing all the evidence in the case of state vs. Wachline, found him guilty of murdering John T. Ledrick in 1894. For over three years the defendant has been a fugitive from justice, but "murder will out" and Gus Wachline will now pay the penalty of crime by execution on the gallows unless unforeseen circumstances step in and stay the proceedings.

The state forged a chain of circumstantial evidence with no weak link therein and all the strategy and legal ability of the defense could not bring into the case enough contra evidence to form the nucleus of the slightest doubt which might have been evolved into a reasonable doubt. The state traced Wachline from the neighborhood of the crime; followed him with the stolen horses of the dead man to Portland where they were disposed of; showed that he had left Ledrick's overcoat at a hotel and had requested that it be put out of sight and had never called for it; took him through the lapse of time during which he was in hiding in Eastern Oregon up to the time of his arrest and his subsequent bringing to trial. The defense made a hard fight—as good a one as could have been made under the circumstances—but the evidence was too strong.

Bagley & Brown, attorneys for the defendant, labored hard for his acquittal and much evidence was introduced to attempt to show that Mountain Buck was an enemy of Ledrick and that he had threatened the murdered man's life. But Wachline's own evidence precluded the possibility of the jury looking upon Buck as the assailant.

The evidence was all taken before noon Friday and Hon. S. B. Huston opened the argument before the jury for the state's case. He made a logical, forceful address, linking together the circumstances connecting Wachline with the crime. Mr. Huston contended that no weak link was in the chain binding the defendant to his guilt and asserting that the link forged by Wachline's own evidence was of itself one of the strongest of the whole. Hon. J. N. Brown followed and to say that he made the best of Wachline's defense is to say the least. He presented every possible doubt, of which there were but few, and those evanescent, in a forcible address. Attorney George R. Bagley followed his law partner, and started what promised to be a great effort for the man in jeopardy. Mr. Bagley was ill, however, and his voice, which was at first clear and distinct, soon broke down. The greatest effort of the defense during the arguments was to fix a doubt in the minds of the jurors as to whether Mr. Buck had not really been the perpetrator of the crime, owing to threats by him made prior to Ledrick's tragic death. The old man sat in the enclosure of the bar, gazing steadily at his accusers, with no display of emotion. He presented a strange picture, this old man, infirm, eccentric to a degree, his long uncombed locks hanging over his shoulders. But if any secret nestled in the old man's heart he betrayed it not. The District Attorney, T. J. Cleaton, closed the argument in a well connected, telling resume of the evidence and trial, coinciding with Mr. Huston, that Buck's innocence or guilt had no bearing with the case—that if Buck were guilty that the evidence showed conclusively that Wachline was also guilty.

The jury was charged and sent into the jury room about ten o'clock Friday night. It is said that the first ballot, on "probable guilt," resulted in the full twelve votes for "guilty," eight for the first degree and four for the second degree. By 4:30 o'clock Saturday morning the Judge was awakened and repaired to the court room to hear the verdict which had been reached.

"Guilty" was the judgment. A poll of the jury confirmed the findings. Wachline was brought into court and heard the verdict without betraying any particular degree of perturbation. Judge McBride set this coming Saturday as

the day to hear the usual motion for a new trial.

Wachline was taken back to his cell and by 9:30 o'clock was nonchalantly engaged in a game of cards with the jail inmates.

Sheriff Matlock, of Morrow county, will get the \$500 reward, \$250 of which will be paid by the county authorities and \$250 by the estate of the murdered man. Matlock is to give half to the man who located the defendant. It is only fair to state that Matlock offered his arms and handcuffs to the young fellow that he might make the arrest and claim the reward, but he would take no chances and took up the proposition of half, the sheriff to make the arrest.

Judge McBride gave the defense everything asked for during the trial, and it is quite improbable that a new trial will be granted or that the case will go to the supreme court.

This is probably the first case on record in this county where brothers were associated as opposition counsel. H. T. Bagley had worked hard procuring evidence for the state when it was not known other counsel would assist. Mr. Bagley was in the case from start to finish and is to be congratulated for the efficient way in which the young fellow performed his duties.

The Saturday Evening Telegram's report was an insult to the county of Washington and, had its report been true, Wachline would have been entitled to a new trial. The Telegram stated that a howling mob crowded the corridors and it asserted that Wachline would immediately be lynched if the jury acquitted. It stated that women shrieked hysterically while Mr. Cleaton was pleading and that tears flowed copiously, etc., etc. The Telegram reporter, whoever he may be, should try some formula for a brain producer and then find out what particular diet is good for promoting truth telling. The article was a slander on the people of this county and city and the Telegram should be careful in the future to steer from yellow journalism.
