

RECKLESS SHOOTING BY A YOUNG LAD

John Volker aged 13, Shot and Injured two Girls.

THE YOUNG FELLOW IN CUSTODY.

Both Girls Were Shot in the Face and Struck with Broken Glass Shot Through a Window.

Two young girls living in South Tualatin, Lena Demming, aged 10, and Etta Brock, aged 7, were Sunday last shot by a young lad by the name of John Volker, who is 13 years of age.

The boy had gone from home over to Demming's to play with the children. He loaded Demming's shot gun and asked the girls to play with him. They refused, whereupon he shot at them through a window, with the result that the older girl was struck by some of the shot and flying glass, the latter only striking the younger one. Neither was seriously injured, although the older girl may lose the sight of one eye. The boy says the girls made faces at him and that he merely pointed the gun at them, when it accidentally was discharged. He had a hearing before Judge Cornelius yesterday morning and after this evidence was taken, the young lad was sent to the state Reform School. Young Volker has no mother and his father has had no control over the youth for several years.

VERDICT FOR PLAINTIFF

Jury Case Before Justice Smith For Warehouse Charges on Wheat.

A jury in Justice W. D. Smith's court yesterday decided that George Alexander Sr. must pay charges to William M. McLeod, owner of the warehouse which burned at Forest Grove several months ago, in the sum of \$74.72. Alexander had stored a large amount of wheat in the warehouse and he contended that much of this had been sold. McLeod claimed that none had been sold and sued for storage and sacks in the sum of \$179.61.

The jury brought in a verdict for the plaintiff for sacks only, 934, at eight cents each. Plaintiff was represented by Hon. S. B. Huston as counsel while the defendant was represented by J. T. Whalley, of Portland.

It will be remembered that much wheat was stored in the warehouse at the time it was destroyed by fire and many farmers suffered considerable loss. There was no insurance.

The many Washington county friends of Loring K. Adams will be grieved to learn of the death of his father, Sebastian C. Adams, at Salem, this week. Deceased was well advanced in age and was of our early Yambill pioneers. He was of scholarly attainments and was perhaps one of the ablest historians on the Pacific slope, if not of the world. He was also author of a chronological chart 22 ft. in length, which was doubtless one of the most vivid portrayals of events ever given to the world. Loring K. Adams and a daughter are the two surviving children, the former now at Skagway, the latter living at Salem.

The Republican County Central Committee of Multnomah has replied to the "Mitchell Republican Committee's" proposition of compromise and says it cannot accept it. This means that it will now be a fight to the finish for the control of the state convention and a raging war in the republican party. The committee replies that it is the regular committee; that it has no recognition for the Mitchell committee; that it stands for "sound money," and that it will admit of no overtures from a factional body. Here is what the Simon Committee charges the Mitchell republicans with having done two years ago: They made no claim to the title of "republican" but adopted the name of "Mitchell republican," under which title they, in common with their allies, the populists and free silver democrats, made war upon the republican ticket. The rebuke ends thus: "But we cannot abdicate on the one hand nor permit the followers of a politician of uncertain principles to dictate to us on the other."

Before the charge had been made Mr. Boos discovered the nature of the bogus coin. Boos' friends do not believe this, as they claim his honesty is unquestioned.

A BLOOMING RESIDENT DROPPED DEAD

Thursday Night While Going to a Neighbors.

BODY WAS FOUND FRIDAY NOON.

Had Started to a Neighbor's After Dark, Did not Reach his Journey's end.

John Goetze, aged 62 years, and who has lived for several years with his son, Gerhard Goetze, on the George V. James place about one and one-half miles from Blooming, died during the night of Thursday last while on his way to a neighbor's house. Mr. Goetze left the house of his son shortly after 6 o'clock in the evening, his daughter-in-law lighting a lantern for him. He then started for G. F. C. Meyer's place, but a mile or so from home. No anxiety was felt by the folks when he did not return that evening as they naturally thought he had stopped over night with Mr. Meyer, who is the father of Mrs. Gerhardt Goetze.

The next morning Gerhard left for the creamery, thinking nothing was wrong but when the father had not returned by noon, search was at once instituted. The old gentleman was found dead beside a fence between the two places. The remains were buried New Year's day. Deceased came here three years ago from Nebraska and had been in ill health for some time, his peculiar affliction having been asthma and heart trouble.

As to the Reward Offered for Arrest and Conviction.

The court records, however, shows that the court was to pay but \$250, while the administrator of Ledrick is authorized by the probate judge to pay the other \$250. THE GREAT DICTATOR LOSES CONTROL

The Ohio President Maker is in Trouble.

MARK HANNA PROBABLY DEFEATED

His Forces do not get an Office in Either the Ohio Senate or Legislature.

Every reader of this newspaper who knows anything about national politics will be pleased to learn that the great syndicate manager and jobber Marcus A. Hanna is defeated and that nothing but boodle can save him. As a prominent republican said in the Hotel Tualatin last evening, "He is gone unless some of the legislators are venal."

The Ohio legislature met the first of the week and the anti-Hannaites, comprised of silver republicans and democrats and Kurtz republicans, secured absolute control of both houses, the Hanna forces being defeated by the combination. Mr. Hanna is having special cars sent in with his shouters to force votes for him. Over 70 of these politicians called upon Bushnell the other night and attempted to force his hand. The governor politely invited them to get out of his apartments.

The doughty "president maker" will not be voted upon until next Wednesday, and before that time he must make up three votes to succeed. The chances are good for a deadlock. The administration is doing all it can to pull General Hanna through, but it looks dark. The senator is on the ground. The state administration is in open revolt against the federal forces.

JOSEPH MCGOWAN

At Beaverton, Suicided in a Woodshed on New Year's day.

Last Saturday night, Coroner Large, of Forest Grove, was called three miles south of Beaverton to hold an inquest on the body of a young man by the name of Joseph McGowan, who was found dead in a woodhouse upon the farm, by his brother James. He was found at about 4 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, with a revolver by his side. A jury was impaneled, which, after hearing the testimony, returned a verdict that the deceased came to his death by a gun-shot wound, self-inflicted, the ball having passed through the right side of the skull, causing instant death, the suicide having been caused by a temporary derangement of the mind. He was aged thirty-four years; was single and for the last two months had been living with his brother James, a bachelor. He had been suffering from ill-health for several months. He had been a resident of Washington county for about 14 years, coming here from West Elizabeth, Pa., where his parents and three brothers reside. He leaves about \$1500 worth of real estate. He was buried in the Crescent cemetery, near Beaverton Monday.
