Were Present.

FRATERNAL EVENT OF THE SEASON.

A Magnificent Supper was Served by
the Ladies of Cornelius' Knights.

Simionides Lodge, Knights of Pythias, of Cornelius, gave the Knights of Washington county royal greeting last Saturday night. The occasion eclipsed anything of a fraternal nature given in this county for years.

All told, about one hundred knights were present and there was good cheer on the groaning tables for four or five hundred more. Either the cooks made a mistake on appetites or expected a larger delegation from Phoenix Lodge, of this city, for when all had eaten there yet remained enough to feed all the men in the Klondike. When the ladies were asked why they had provided so much they informed an Arcus reporter that they had expected Mayor Barrett, of Hillsboro, and Webb Hughes, of Dille, down to the supper, and they wanted to provide against an emergency.

The Esquires were knighted, one was given the Page rank and one the Esquire rank. After all was done the ladies came up and listened to many complimentary (and truthful) remarks about the culinary ability of Cornelius' fair sex. After a few speeches the boys dispersed and the boys of Simionides have, as a result, gained a lasting hold on the affections of the Knights of Washington county.

FELL FROM A TRESTLE

German Woodcutter Instantly
Killed Near Sherwood.

Coroner Large was called one mile east of Sherwood on Monday, February 7th, to investigate the death of Nicholas Weibe. Weibe was found dead about two o'clock on that date. He was a German and had lived near Sherwood about four years, gaining a livelihood by cutting cordwood. He was aged about forty years, and was last seen alive about eight o'clock on Saturday night. He had been at a saloon drinking during the evening, and was slightly intoxicated when he started for home in the evening. Crossing trestle No. 16 A, which is thirty-five feet high, he fell off, striking upon his head, his neck being broken and his skull fractured. Death was instantaneous. He left no relatives here, but it is understood he has a brother, who is a merchant in Chicago. The coroner returned a verdict in accordance with the facts. On Weibe's person were found a cheap watch and \$2.74 in cash. He was buried in the Middleton cemetery on the afternoon of Tuesday last.

COURT TRIFLED WITH

But to no Avail, as

Testimony was Taken.

The case of State vs William Wallace Rambo, which was to have been heard before Justice Smith's court Saturday last, has given the state considerable trouble. It will be remembered that the young lad (he is sixteen past) was arrested for a criminal assault upon his grandmother, aged seventy-seven years. When Saturday arrived, the old lady, who had sworn to the complaint, found it very opportune to be too ill to attend court. Justice Smith adjourned Court until Monday, 10:00 o'clock a. m., and the prosecuting witness then not appearing, court was adjourned to the William Nelson place and the evidence of the old woman taken. Although she swore strong enough to have the boy held, still it could be seen that she desired to shield the young culprit. In default of \$500 bail the lad is in jail awaiting action of the grand jury.

Hon. S. B. Huston, who originally defended the lad, withdrew from the case Monday morning, and W. F. Klinehamer was appointed by the court to defend.

Theodore McNamer, of Forest Grove, who returned from Dawson City a few weeks ago, has secured ten suitable horses for teaming and packing, and will leave for Dyea on the next trip of the steamship Oregon. Mr. McNamer will establish a pack train over Chilkooot pass to the lakes, using the horses and wagons for nine miles and packing the remainder of the distance. He will take with him a blacksmith, Theodore Wirtz, and a teamster, Emmet Quick. His object in leaving so soon is to get everything in readiness for the great rush in the spring. Later on he may go into the Klondike, but not before fall. From Forest Grove dispatch in last Tuesday's Oregonian.

Friday last was a lovely day for Hillsboro, fully five hundred people having come to town. Part of these had invitations to witness the execution. However, although the door to the scaffold enclosure was open to adults, there were but about 250 inside when the door was closed. Quite a number had already climbed upon the boiler house, water closet, etc. Old man Huff, of Centerville, father-in-law to John Fisher, (the escaped prisoner who wasn't a prisoner) was up in the top branches of an adjacent tree and was the object of many eyes as well as the recipient of many shakings. He held the fort, however.

Mrs. Jane Patterson, who died at her home in this city on February 23rd, 1898, was one of the early woman pioneers of the coast. She was born in Millersburg, Kentucky, in 1813; afterward, her parents moved to Clair county, Illinois. In 1831 she was married to Herbert Patterson, whom she survived. To them were born five children, four sons and one daughter, three of whom survive. In 1852 she and her children crossed the plains in company with the father, going to California. In 1858 they moved to Oregon, coming to Hillsboro, where she has resided ever since. Mrs. Patterson was left a widow in 1886.

THE LAW HAS BEEN COMPLIED WITH

Wachline Hung and His Remains Interred

ON A LOT AT THE POOR FARM.

How the Returns Were Made. The Father Refuses to Receive the Dead.

Friday last, February 4th, 1898, the death warrant calling for the hanging of Gus Wachline for the murder of John D. Ledrick in April, 1894, was officially followed by Sheriff Bradford and all that was mortal of the murderer now lays in a grave at the county poor farm. The fatal rope was fastened to the huge cross arm at about 9:50, by Captain A. M. Collins, Sheriff Bradford, of this county, and Sheriff J. F. Phy, of Union county, witnessing the arrangement. Sheriff Phy, who executed Kelsy Porter, a Union county murderer, dead a knot as an experiment. This knot was afterward so changed that the drop was shorter than was at first contemplated. At 10:25 the trap and rope were tested by using two sacks filled with earth. Everything worked satisfactorily and no changes were made except a minor one at the cross arm. At 11:45 Sheriff Bradford called the jury together and visited the jail to read the death warrant. The prisoner was brought out through the Sheriff's office, up the stairs and led on the trap, a few minutes after high noon. Sheriff Bradford asked the condemned man the question: "Have you anything to say?" The prisoner shot an upward glance and said in a very low tone of voice, scarcely audible even to the closest listeners: "What I want to say is, the statement I made some time ago, is a true statement. I am innocent of what I was convicted. I ask the Lord Jesus to take me as I am."

The sheriff and deputy, C. E. Deelman, and assistants then put the handcuffs on, pinioning the arms behind the back. The side-arm straps were then put on, after which the prisoner's legs were strapped together. Sheriff Bradford then put on the death mask, adjusted the noose and stepped back to where the lines, one of which sprung the trap, were to be cut. He gave the signal and the three lines were simultaneously severed and at precisely 12:10 Gus Wachline was swung into eternity and the murder of John D. Ledrick was avenged. The action of the trap was mechanically perfect and the drop was in the neighborhood of seven feet. The executed man scarcely made a struggle after the rope tightened, but a slight drawing up of the lower limbs being noticed. After fourteen minutes the physicians, Drs. F. A. Bailey, S. T. Linklater and J. P. Tamsieie, agreed that life was extinct and Dr. Bailey so notified the sheriff. A minute or so later the rope was cut and the remains placed in a coffin.

Wachline has maintained a wonderful composure ever since his arrest and his stolidity of demeanor did not desert him even when he stood on the brink of that, to many, uncertain darkness of the future. While he was rather surly to visitors, he in no way appeared to be despondent, seeming to hope against hope, the meanwhile protesting his innocence. As he was brought up the steps out of the office and up to the fatal trap, his eyes had a fixed gaze forward and he neither glanced to the right nor left. Even after he had made his statement no emotion was betrayed, nothing bing marked except a whiteness about the lips. It was a wonderful exhibition of nerve—nothing more can be said.

Attached to the death warrant signed by Judge McBride, ordering the execution of Wachline, is the following return: "I, W. D. Bradford, sheriff of Washington county, do hereby certify that I received the within death warrant on the 21st day of December, 1897, and that I executed the same at the jail yard of the county jail of Washington county, Oregon, in Hillsboro, on Friday the 4th day of February, 1898, at 12:11 o'clock p. m., of said day, in the presence of H. Greer, Thomas A. McBride, Judge of said court, and dated the 18th day of December, 1897, and duly attested by J. A. Imbrie, clerk of said court; that I append hereto and make a part of this return the certificate of R. H. Greer, G. W. Stitt, J. H. Dillberger, Ole Oleson, H. Wehrung, Jerome Palmer, T. W. Thompson, C. Schulmerich, L. F. Carstens, A. K. Watson, S. A. D. Meek and G. N. Hale, bona fide electors, residents and inhabitants of Washington county, Oregon, duly summoned by me, to appear at said time, by taking said Gus Wachline from the said county jail of said county of Washington, state of Oregon, where he had been heretofore, pursuant to the order of the above named court, kept in close confinement, and did then and there in the presence of said twelve bona fide electors aforesaid, duly hang the said Gus Wachline by the neck until he was dead, pursuant to the death warrant of the above entitled court, signed by Thomas A. McBride, Judge of said court, and dated the 18th day of December, 1897, and duly attested by J. A. Imbrie, clerk of said court; that I append hereto and make a part of this return the certificate of R. H. Greer, G. W. Stitt, J. H. Dillberger, Ole Oleson, H. Wehrung, Jerome Palmer, T. W. Thompson, C. Schulmerich, L. F. Carstens, A. K. Watson, S. A. D. Meek and G. N. Hale, of the faithful performance in carrying out the sentence of the above entitled court, in the above entitled case. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand this 4th day of February, 1898. W. D. BRADFORD, Sheriff.

Hale, twelve bona fide electors and inhabitants of Washington county, Oregon, do hereby certify that we were duly summoned by W. D. Bradford, Sheriff of Washington county, Oregon, to appear at the jail yard of the county of Washington, State of Oregon, at the Court House, on Friday, the 4th day of February, 1898, at the hour of 11 o'clock a. m., of said day, to then and there witness the execution of Gus Wachline for the crime of murder in the first degree, and that pursuant to said summons we duly appeared at said jail yard; and we hereby certify that said W. D. Bradford, at the hour of 12:11 p. m. of said 4th day of February, 1898, in the presence of each and all of us, did hang Gus Wachline by the neck until he was dead, as prescribed by the warrant of death, of the above entitled court. In witness whereof, we have hereunto set our hands this 4th day of February:

We, the undersigned physicians, residing in Hillsboro, Washington county, Oregon, hereby certify that at the summons of W. D. Bradford, sheriff of county and state aforesaid, we attended at the execution of Gus Wachline, convicted of the murder of John D. Ledrick, and saw him, said Gus Wachline, executed on the fourth (4th) day of February, A. D. 1898, in Hillsboro, Washington county, Oregon, and we further certify that the execution of said Gus Wachline was by hanging by the neck until the said Gus Wachline was dead. F. A. Bailey, M.
