

ANOTHER SUNDAY SHOOTING SCRAPE

Occurred at Laurel Sunday Afternoon.

FARMER SHOTS A FARM LABORER.

Ball Passed Through Left ear and Lodged in the Scalp.

Sunday afternoon, near Laurel, G. H. Hickethier shot Frank Miller, a laborer, the ball passing through Miller's left ear and lodging in the scalp. Miller is a transient and had been working for several days for Hickethier. The hand had been working on a small ship's model and Sunday, so Miller says, the model was missing. He states that he told his employer he would hold him responsible for it, when Hickethier became enraged and ordered him from the place. A scuffle ensued and Miller positively avers that Hickethier flourished the revolver in his face and fired. Miller then left and went to Dave Savage's place, he and Savage coming to town late that night. Hickethier was arrested Monday morning and brought to this city and Justice Smith set the examination for Friday. Hickethier's story is that Miller slapped the little boy during a controversy between the men, over the Cuban question. He thereupon ordered the hired man to leave the place. A scuffle followed, during which the revolver, a small 22-calibre, was discharged with results as above given. Hickethier also says they had some trouble prior to this over a dog which Miller owned. Miller had objected to the Hickethier boy fooling with the canine. Miller seems to tell a straight story while Hickethier is known to be somewhat excitable, he having had trouble in this city over slapping a little urchin here a year or so ago. Miller's wound is not serious. The defendant was formerly a Portland marble dealer.

Justice Smith discharged the defendant, Mrs. Barrett, and taxed the costs to the prosecuting witness, Mrs. Schleich. This seems to meet with the approval of those who heard all the evidence.

Eugene Jackson has returned from the Okanogan country and while here will be examined by the Pension Board of Examiners. Thos. G. Sewell, of this county, has also been ordered by the pension department to appear before the board.

Frederick Settgast has been ordered to pay \$100 into court as alimony pending the suit of his wife for divorce. He is also restrained from selling any of his realty until the suit has been adjudicated.

Judge Sears this morning made an order granting the Assignees of the Planter estate, insolvent, privilege of paying a sixteen per cent dividend, or a larger per cent if the money on hand will warrant it. It now looks, from the report, on file, as though the estate will do well to pay anything over thirty cents on the dollar.

Sheriff Bradford has so far collected taxes to the extent of about \$30,000, which is over one-third of the total tax. Only about \$25,000 of the whole tax will be applied to the county and indigent fund and it is thought that it will be hard to make any reduction on the county debt, above running expenses, this present year in full considered, even if all taxes levied are paid.

J. Walter McRae, an Impersonator who has received much favorable press notice, will soon be in Hillsboro for one night under the auspices of a committee laboring to raise a fund for the widows and orphans of the sailors who were lost on the Battleship Maine. The entertainment will be well worth the expense to say nothing of the charitable disposition of the proceeds.

What's the matter with Oregon! Here we are, shipping three carloads of baled hay from this county to the Ladd & Reed farm in California! Part of it goes from Reedville and part from Hillsboro. The tail end of the Dingley bill, "which bill" tore up all the wheat in India by the roots, seems to have struck our sister state. But Oregon is all right!

D. H. Gordon, a prominent lumberman of Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, was in the city last week on his way to the coast range, where he will cruise for timber with a view to purchasing for future milling. Mr. Gordon is an experienced mill man and is interesting his company in western lumber. He is an enthusiastic bimetalist of republican lineage, and says that the state of Wisconsin will swing into line this year.

Connell Bros., of Glencoe, have been holding their wheat for nearly three years, selling only that which they were obliged to. Yesterday they sold 10,000 bushels to Portland buyers at \$1 per bushel! The recent raise caused by the war scare has not been despised by farmers who have wheat to sell, and if war will keep up the price to this height, we can afford to have a little trouble right along, and the wheat growers will cheerfully foot the bill.

Next week will be convention week in this city, and the town will be alive with delegates of all shades and complexion. Let us see: there will be "Simon" delegates; Mitchell delegates; harmony delegates; populist, democratic and silver republican delegates and union delegates. The union delegates should win out. As to candidates: for the republicans, the thing is apparently cut and dried, except as to the legislative ticket, and that is well under way. The union candidates are few and far between and there is no work on slate, if there be a slate. Let the merry war proceed. Next year THE ARGUS is going to pull for a county convention at Forest Grove.

MILITIA BOYS ARE EXPECTANT

Many are Prepared to Enlist With Uncle Sam.

EAGER TO TRY ACTIVE WARFARE.

Will Know in a day or so Whether They Will be Recruited or not.

The militia of this place and Forest Grove are on the tip of expectancy and they are eager to have the word to enlist for encampment at Portland to await further orders. They will know in a day or so just what they will do, and in the meantime they are doing active work.

It is highly probable that they will be attached to a Portland company, and they will have the preference over raw recruits if they can pass examination. As all are husky young fellows there is but little danger of rejection upon physical grounds. Company calls have already been made and a movement is expected at any time. E. J. Bryan is in Portland today conferring with the authorities.

Sues for Damages.

Mrs. L. J. Gishwiller has brought suit for \$250 damages against E. N. Ordway, alleging: "That at Washington county, state of Oregon, and on the 9th day of April, 1898, the above named defendant without cause or provocation, did wilfully, unlawfully and maliciously and wantonly assault and beat the plaintiff herein with a wooden crutch, by there and then striking this plaintiff in a brutal and vicious manner with said wooden crutch, upon plaintiff's right and left forearms, and did by said wrongful and malicious striking as aforesaid, fracture one of the bones of plaintiff's right forearm, causing plaintiff much agony and pain." Plaintiff then recounts that she was obliged to procure a physician and keep from her house hold duties and asks for damages as above stated. The case was set for answer on Tuesday and defendant defaulted, but his attorneys appeared in time to have till today to answer, at 10 o'clock.

Glencoe to Have a Mill.

Samuel Swanson, of Spokane, who has purchased the old Glencoe flouring mill, several miles north of this city, was in town this morning on his way to his property, which he contemplates thoroughly renovating. He will put in modern machinery and start up as soon as possible. It is his intent also to handle general merchandise. The farmers of Glencoe will be gratified at this move as the mill has laid idle for several years.
