War is on, and the land of our fathers—the land for which they fought as our heritage—must be upheld by young blood, and this county is doing its part. The boys from this city left for Portland, by carriage, Sunday afternoon, and as their eyes, for the last time to some, reviewed the familiar street outlines, guns were fired, while cheers resounded thro' the town as the boys in blue vanished into the distance. THE POLITICAL BOSSES SAY THE COURTS

Have Run the County Into
Heavy Debt.

SHOULDER THE BLAME ON M'BRIDE

A Pretty Pass. Will the Organ Defend
the Jail Steel Contract?

The court organ is busy defending the debt burdening the people, and when the republicans who are against such an evidence of interest bearing debt, ask Mr. Cornelius and his warm political friends just how it came about, the answer is, it is said: "Well, Mr. M'Brade has been awful slow and has made the court terms altogether too expensive." There is no doubt but what the circuit court of this county has been conducted on a scale which is altogether too expensive, but this has been but one of many leaks. The public treasury has not been properly guarded in many instances. For instance, the law has been violated where there was special provisions for the protection of taxpayers. In the building of the new jail, the cells and corridors were let contrary to law. The law requires:

Section 3969. Whenever the county court shall determine to erect such jail or prison, it may either receive sealed proposals for the performance of the whole or any part of the work, or for furnishing materials, or may sell the same at public auction to the lowest bidder; but the court, before it enters into ANY SUCH CONTRACT, shall give notice by advertisement, published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county, for at least three weeks in succession, or by putting up advertisements in five public places within the same, three weeks before the time for letting the contract, stating the day on which it will attend the court house in said county for the purpose of receiving proposals or selling at public auction (as the case may be) and entering into such contract; and the contractor shall enter into bond, payable to the state of Oregon, for the use of the county, with such securities as may approve, conditioned for the faithful performance of the stipulations of the contract.

The court did not advertise for the cells and corridors, but let the contract for them to the Diebold Safe & Lock Co. for \$2,750, on the same day that it gave the papers the three weeks' advertisement.

A local agent of the Pauli Jail Co., knowing that the statute provided for advertisement, expected to put in a bid. He was thus shut out. His figures to put in cells and corridors according to plans and specifications were \$500 below that paid for the work put in. This is one way in which business has been handled. It is said that the county judge and many of the officers contend the cells and corridors were bought dirt cheap, but Hon. S. B. Huston, J. M. Wall and THE ARGUS editor saw the letter from the agent of the Pauli Jail Co. directing the local agent (a republican) to put in the bid for \$2,250. This is truth. The law was not complied with. Laws of this kind are for compliance. That Mr. Cornelius knew of the statute is proven when we know that on the day he let the contract for the cells and corridors he issued advertisements in compliance with the law relative to the most inexpensive part of the prison, the building proper!

Another instance of loose business methods is in allowing the sheriff's office to draw deputy salary when no deputy was in existence. This was done in part of July and part of August, 1897. It was the season of the year when business is very dull about that office, and no deputy was at work between the time that Sappington went out and Mr. Deichman went in; no deputy's salary should have been countenanced. Dollars are dollars, and while it may be contended that this is proper business procedure, it certainly looks as though the sheriff receives sufficient salary in his statutory limit, and that it is enough for the services of any one man. All of these things go to show how debt creeps up and how close guardianship is called for. But it does seem as though the sheriff was not entitled to have his own and the salary provided for the deputy.

Again, in the matter of delinquent taxation. Caste have time and again been thrown off in some cases, while charged in others. This kind of favoritism may be all right, but every time the costs are thrown off the county loses, for the law requires costs to be made and the county pays the sheriff to do the work. The levies and sales are not made on the sheriff's time, but on the county's. The records are so poorly kept, and no semi-annual reports being on file as re-

quired by the statute, it is hard to give the public any thing like specific information in this regard.

Involved.

Other business transacted was the cancellation of \$2910.01 warrants outstanding as against the county when Judge Crandall went out of office. This reduces the debt to that extent, and shows up the debt on April 1, 1894, in just that much better light.

The warrant had been destroyed after having been given to sheriff for lands bought by county for taxes. It was never a valid claim on the treasury, but lack of credit put that much more apparent warrant debt which did not exist.
