

THOSE CELLS AND CORRIDORS AGAIN

A Very Humorous Explanation by the Judge.

USES A LETTER FROM THE SELLER.

Below are Some Truths for Public Consideration.

The County Judge is very busy explaining how he put in the cells and corridors in the new county jail. He says he had legal advice and did not have to let to the lowest bidder, or advertise.

Now, the law for the building of county prisons is intended to protect public policy and it is more than absurd, is it not, that the statute would require advertisement for bids to get competition on a part of the work and not competition on that part which would cost about two times as much? But here is the law and it is plain enough:

Section 3969. Whenever the county court shall determine to erect such jail or prison, it may either receive sealed proposals for the performance of the whole or any part of the work, or for furnishing materials, or may sell the same at public auction to the lowest bidder; but the court, before it enters into any such contract, shall give notice by advertisement, published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county, for at least three weeks in succession, or by putting up advertisements in five public places within the same, three weeks before the time for letting the contract, stating the day on which it will attend the court house in said county for the purpose of receiving proposals or selling at public auction (as the case may be) and entering into such contract; and the contractor shall enter into bond, payable to the state of Oregon, for the use of the county, with such securities; and in such sum as the court may approve, conditioned for the faithful performance of the contract agreeably to the stipulations thereof.

The judge goes about the county reading the letter J. W. Morgan brought out from Davis, of Portland, who put in the cells and corridors, wherein is stated that the work was done very cheap and to advertise the company. Well, the company is getting the advertisement alright enough. The man Davis goes on to quote the cost of such work done 10, 12 and 13 years ago! Isn't it rich! And to think! The judge says the letter came unsolicited! How pathetic!

The truth is, the contract for the cells and corridors was let on August 12, 1897, before an advertisement ever appeared. The other jail company was waiting to put in a bid. Of course, Davis knew a good thing when he saw it and was perfectly satisfied with the figures. So were others. But public officers should comply with the law! As to the plea that it is cheap enough and worth the money paid—that is all bunk when the rival jail company was ready to put in a bid at several hundred dollars less than the illegal contract called for. It is weak to say that the rival agent wanted so much, or this much, for as a matter of fact, the rival agent expected to compete publicly for the work and would have been a poor business man to have given his figures to the court. The letter to the local agent instructing him to put in a bid on the total steel work for \$2250 was seen by Mr. Huston, Mr. Wall and The Argus man and any citizen can have this corroborated by seeing either of them, to their entire satisfaction. As to the grand jury commending the jail—that was only to be expected, as both grand juries were Ben's juries with the exception of a man or two. In each instance it would have required a minority report and the ring would have jeered at such a report as a campaign flyer. And now, on the 18th of November, this paper published all about this business and the county judge has never seen fit to reply until in the heat of the campaign. Why not before, so it could have been thoroughly discussed?

As to Messrs. Todd and Reasoner, we believe neither of these gentlemen knew of the law until after the contract was let, as they must more or less depend on the county judge, who is supposed to know and advise as to what the statutes require.

SLEEPING SOLDIERS WERE HONORED

On Decoration day by all our Citizens.

TWO GOOD ADDRESSES DELIVERED.

Flowers Showered on the Graves of the Nation's Dead.

Although the weather was rough at times and some rain fell, Monday of this week was appropriately devoted to honoring the soldier dead of our native land. Business houses were closed throughout the exercises. The fact that we now have war with Spain caused more than one mother to think, as she viewed the lowly mounds, that a boy of hers might, in a few weeks, be sleeping, far to the west of us, in an unattended grave.

The G. A. R. and Women's Relief Corps, led by the Hillsboro Reed and Cornet Band left Second and Main promptly at 9:30. Following these were troops of school children each waving flags. Arriving at the cemetery, appropriate exercises were indulged in until the noon hour. At 2 p. m. the court house, crowded to the doors, was the scene of the memorial numbers. Hon. W. N. Barrett, mayor, made the opening address. Songs and recitations followed. Hon. S. B. Huston made the closing address. Both speakers paid eloquent tributes to the departed dead of both North and South and the hearers realized, that, more than ever, the dead past has been well mourned by the sons of time.

EMERGENCY CORPS.

The greatest enthusiasm was manifested and success is warranted, as the Hillsboro ladies are energetic as well as patriotic.

J. W. Morgan's addition to the campaign literature of Washington county is the richest thing in the universe. It is a letter from the Mr. Davis (who contracted with Judge Cornelius at the dead hour of midnight for the steel work) stating therein that "it was a cheap job" etc. And our kind county judge tried to feed the Germans of Cornelius and vicinity on such a thing! Great Scott, such evidence! And then, to think of Judge Cornelius telling about jails, in comparison which were built ten fifteen years ago.

WHAT THE RECORDS SHOWED APRIL 1

A Resume of That Much Abused Debt.

THE TWO "ORGANS" FALSIFIED.

How The Argus got its Figures and how it Clinched its Statement.

When THE ARGUS published the county debt, outstanding warrants on April 1, 1898, at \$51,290.37 and the debt due the state at \$7,143.08, the two hired organs, the Hatchet and Independent, charged falsifying, forgery, lying and everything else in the category of abuses.

These papers charged and raved and quoted different figures, swore THE ARGUS lied, and otherwise made themselves ridiculous—anything to earn the campaign payment. To check the two organs, and to take off the momentary effect of their sweeping assertions that THE ARGUS lied, we ran two locals in black faced type, stating that Clerk Imbrie had verified the figures as given by us. But, to close the whole affair, we are pleased to give our figures of the county debt as obtained from the records of the county, which records the bosses assert, are kept in good shape. According to Clerk Imbrie's report on October 1, 1897, the outstanding warrants at that time were \$31,303.17. To summarize: Warrants outstanding October 1, 1897, \$31,303.17. Drawn since Oct. 1: October term, 2942.20; November term, 6410.65; December term, 3484.92; January term, 5376.05; February term, 5254.85; March, 3132.95.

Total \$57,904.79. Warrants paid by Treasurer Cady Oct. 1 to April 1 according to printed report in Independent, 6614.42. April 1, 1898. Warrants Outstanding \$51,290.37 Due to State, \$7,143.08. March claims due April 1—not allowed until April term—were at least \$3,000 more.

As to the 1897 tax levy, if the sheriff collects \$25,000 in round numbers to apply on county warrants, he will do well, for there is bound to be more or less delinquent and all the delinquent out of both county and state funds will appear as delinquent against the county fund, for the law requires the county to pay all the state tax, whether or no, and Cady has paid it, so the county must bear the state delinquent, just as if it were county delinquent.

Now let us get down to the April 1, 1894 statement, of which the two hired organs have given the lie to THE ARGUS figures. Let us see. THE ARGUS gave the outstanding warrants on April 1, 1894, as at \$34,098.50; cash on hand to apply, \$8,925.14; county levy 1893, \$23,885.06. The 1893 taxes were partially collected upon April 1, and the cash on hand at that date to apply on county warrants, was collected out of the 1893 levy. The Argus would have been dishonest to have quoted the total levy to apply on county warrants on April 1, 1894, as a resource, when the cash on hand represented a part of that levy! So the hired organ's \$11,000 lie imposed upon THE ARGUS is a myth! THE ARGUS simply told the truth, could afford to do nothing else and took its figures from Clerk Goodin's summary of March 31, 1894. The gang going about the county telling decent republicans that THE ARGUS was lying is but indicative of the same characteristics which impelled these same high and mighty officials to corrupt the primaries so that decent republicans hang their heads in shame at the indecency. They had the Clerk's office. If THE ARGUS had lied why did they not have Clerk Imbrie publish the correction? Again, Clerk Imbrie will not deny that THE ARGUS gave the outstanding warrants on April 1, 1898, exactly as the books showed on that date. The state debt was given just as the official state report gives it.
