WILLAMETTE VALLEY CROP OUTLOOK

What Director Pague has to say This Week.

EXCELLENT - CROP PROSPECTS.

A good Season With Anything Like Reasonable Weather.

The warm weather produced a rapid growth in all vegetation. Fall-sown wheat is heading; spring-sown is growing rapidly. Some barley and rye has been cut in the Southern counties. Oats are of excellent promise. The acreage of wheat is larger than usual, and the prospects being better, a large crop will result. The fruit prospects continue excellent. Early cherries are ripe and later cherries are coloring. Strawberries continue plentiful. The prune crop will be larger than ever before. Apple and pear trees will have to be hand pruned in almost every orchard. Haying has commenced, with excellent results. Clover hay will not be generally cut for a week or ten days. Vegetables are growing rapidly. Early planted potatoes are of good size and fit for table use.

There is no improvement in the hop yards. The hops that came up at the usual time are making a good growth but the missing hills have not shown any signs of life. The hop crop will be reduced about one-third. At present writing, the prospect for all crops, except hops, are of the best, and a year of plenty appears to be assured.

ROSE CARNIVAL A GRAND SUCCESS

Great Profusion of Flowers on Exhibition.

RICHEST FLORAL TREAT OF A YEAR.

The Ladies of the Congregational Church Give honor to the Goddess Flora.

Friday and Saturday last the rooms formerly occupied by the Delta were the scene of the most splendid and fragrant floral exhibit ever witnessed in Hillsboro. The Carnival was in charge of the ladies of the Congregational Church and the enterprise was attended with the greatest possible success. It was not particularly a rose show. It was a floral exhibition of what our soil and climate will do in producing flowers. Outside of the tropics, Oregon is perhaps the richest of any section in the Union in her profusion of nature's sweetest growths. All kinds of floral productions were in evidence, and, although many were catalogued, it would be unfair to give those which were and leave unmentioned those which were not. The ladies of the city vied with each other in their offerings and large crowds visited the exhibits on both days. Such carnivals do much to encourage floral sentiment and this will not be the last one in Hillsboro—the most successful yet attempted.
