The Wheat Aphid.

Dr. F. A. Bailey, who takes an active interest in anything pertaining to agriculture, is of the opinion, after a careful microscopic examination, that, after all, the wheat aphid is, under certain conditions, quite injurious to grain. He finds that the aphid draws its sustenance from the wheat kernels while in the milk, but thinks as soon as the kernel goes into the dough there is no further injury. On every wheat head infested with the aphid he finds from two to five kernels sapped, so that, were the aphid very general, the yield must visibly be affected. It is only during the damp weather that the aphid thrives, for a hot sun will soon kill it. Farmers should study this matter thoroughly and ascertain whether or not there is a scientific way to kill the germ of this insect by lines similar to vitriol. Dr. Bailey thinks the Agricultural College will soon make a report on this grain pest as it now has the matter under investigation.

Pacific University, having completed a half-century since its beginning in 1848, will hold a semi-centennial celebration on July 9th. OREGON BOYS GRANDLY TREATED AT HONOLULU

First Mail Received From the Manila Transports.

OUR BOYS WRITE TO RELATIVES.

They Were well Treated by the People of the Islands.

At last the mails have arrived from Honolulu and the welcome accorded the boys in blue, quite a few of whom are from Hillsboro and Washington county, was full of good cheer and patriotic interest.

Second Lieut. Edgar Bryan sends a copy of the Pacific Advertiser to his relatives and that paper gives them the following editorial welcome:

"Hawaii welcomes the advance guards of the American legions moving across the great Tranquil Sea to the Tropics. It is the first movement of American bayonets beyond the Western margin of the continent. The cause in which they move is a noble one. Hawaii covers the Boys in Blue with her leis of flowers, and to them gives her greeting: ALOHA!"

The public banquet given the soldiers consisted of the following, a rather extensive menu:

"Potato salad—one ton; roast beef—2500 pounds; ham sandwiches—10,000; coffee—150 pounds equals gallons; milk—300 gallons; roast mutton; turkey; chickens; pineapples—800; watermelons—800; mangoes—20,000; oranges. 5000; various meats; bread and butter; etc., etc. Cigars and cigarettes; soda water and ginger ale—12,000 bottles; etc., etc. Pie—2000; cake—30 bushels.

"The dinner will be a good one with lots of it. Tables will be spread, but there will be no sea. The troops will come to the ground in column of fours, and if necessary will be carried away in stretchers."

WEATHER REPORT

From Oregon Correspondents' Reports.

Coast Section.—The past two weeks have been wet. But little work done in gardens. Clover is lodging and is too heavy to stand. Range food is in abundance for cattle.

Curry County.—The soil is warm and moist. Corn and potato crops will be very large. The late rains have made grass and pasture very good. Vegetables are in abundance. Oats are now in full head.

Cos County.—Farmers are in need of more sunshine. Hay is ready to cut but the weather is not favorable. Spring-sown grain is heading. Corn is turning yellow. Wheat and fruit are very promising.

Willamette Valley.—The week ends with good weather. Some grain shows rust; a few farmers complain of Aphid on wheat. The weather has been extremely favorable for wheat and oats, but unfavorable for corn; the latter needs more sunshine. Some hay has been damaged by rain, but the damaged hay has been more than made good by the extra hay left uncut. Rye is beginning to ripen. Italian prunes are dropping; the thinning is very necessary, for the trees are overloaded. During the latter part of the week, haying was pushed with vigor. Crops of all kinds are looking exceptionally well.

Umpqua and Rogue River Valleys.—Haying in full progress; heavy yield. All gardens produce large and abundant. Potatoes promise an abundant harvest. Corn is growing finely. There has been an abundance of rain to secure a good crop of everything. Hay was not damaged by the rain as much as was expected. Flattering prospect for all crops. Spring-sown grain will make a fine crop. Beans and potatoes have better growth than usual. Grain hay is unusually fine. The fruit prospects are excellent and, taken as a whole, the season is propitious. The first alfalfa crop is in the shock. Wheat for hay is ready to cut.

Columbia River Valley.—In western portion of Wasco county some early hay was slightly damaged by being over ripe
