Will Give an Open Meeting at Court House

Hillsboro and Vicinity are invited to Attend and Hear Matters of Interest.

Mrs. R. E. Bryan, acting for the Emergency Corps and Red Cross Society, sends the following announcement for publication:

The Oregon Emergency Corps and Red Cross Society will hold an open meeting in the court house next Saturday evening, Oct. 25, at 7:30 o'clock. A brief history of where and by whom and for what purpose the first Red Cross Society was organized will be given, together with some valuable information regarding the plans adopted for carrying on this humanitarian work. Reports of some of the work already done by the Red Cross women of California and Oregon for the soldiers at Manila will be read, and some suggestions made concerning the work to be taken up immediately. As this patriotic work appeals directly to every citizen, the Red Cross feels its duty to lay the matter before the public. Appreciating the public spirit of our people and the worthiness of this call we hope for a crowded house. However, let no one remain away on this account, as there will be a corps of Red Cross nurses in uniform in attendance who will act as ushers and who will conduct each one to the very best seat in the room. The nurses will also be well equipped for rendering services in case of casualties, which are always liable to occur in large crowds.

Inasmuch as there are quite a number of Hillsboro boys at Manila, this announcement should be of general interest and there is promise of a large attendance. The work in question is a noble one and should receive hearty public support.

THE SALARY BILL WAS A BIG BLUFF

Failed to Pass After Going Through One House.

CAUSED ALARM AT COURT HOUSE

Salaries are Safe, However, for the Time Being.

Representative Thompson's bill making a big cut in the salaries of sheriff, clerk and recorder, occasioned considerable alarm in political circles last week but the measure, somehow, died "a bornin." The bill passed the house several days before the close of the session but it hung in the senate. The apprehension was caused by the fact that the bill would cut into salaries of the officers now in office and such a thing, by an Oregon legislature, was unprecedented. The Oregonian twice reported the bill as passed, but inquiry has developed the fact that it did not get to the third reading in the senate.

Sheriff Bradford and Clerk Imbrie made a trip to Salem Friday to observe the way economy was headed and returned the next evening apparently satisfied with the way the matter stood. Sunday's Oregonian reported the measure as law. This was disputed at the courthouse the next day and it then transpired that the bill was in Senator Patterson's pocket. The Senator says its passage was deferred by a difference of opinion as to whether it was to take effect immediately upon its passage, or the 1st of next July. The Independent urged the senate to hold the measure up, and its powerful influence is the probable cause of the same high priced salaries now being paid. There is in existence nothing like a powerful (why, of course) organ to protect the public. How envious must the Hatchet be of the Independent!
