"THEIR EYES ARE OPEN."

Our so-called republican gold standard friends who make their views public here at last fallen out with their old contention that silver and gold would not enjoy a parity should bi-metallic law be established by the United States alone. In 1896 this was one of their strongest contentions and upon this conjectured disparity they ferociously assailed the "independent" idea, at the same time, assiduously assuring people the "international" scheme would work. They have had their eyes opened. Were they to support and promote international bimetallicism they could not expect the ballots of the Indianapolis people, who at least have the good sense to soberly realize that so far as parity is concerned, one would be as powerful an agency as the other. So, to hold the Indianapolis platform they have come down from their international position to a gold declaration, forced away by the inexorable logic that international bimetallicism would mean exactly what independent bimetallicism would mean, a higher level of values for all commodity as measured in dollars, either gold or silver, and, this being the case, logical deduction must force sanity to vote that ticket which comes out in the open, with no ambiguity. The gold managers of the republicans realized so far as parity was concerned: that the fact that a man could pay as much debt with a silver dollar as with a gold dollar, considering the vast amount of interest on public bonds of all nature, to say nothing of the principal; of national, state, municipal and county expenditures etc., would immediately cause commodity to command an equal amount of dollars of either gold or silver. But here was the rub. Such a thing would mean, virtually the restoration of old time prices, for no gold man will openly declare that more dollars going into a given total will not make money freer, and therefore not so dear. It is of this very parity they are afraid, so, instead of acquiescing in restoring the level of prices which has been lowered by keeping down the volume of legal tender, they cry out "cheap money," ignoring that when commodity was generally of good price, money was cheap; ignoring that "cheap, base, dishonest" money meant "decent, profitable and honest" product. But the scales will in time fall from the eyes of the people and they will realize it is their duty to repudiate the legal confiscation which has characterized our national legislation under the guidance of those who want still further power in the dollar and less debt paying power in commodity. The rank and file of republicans heartily despise the Cleveland democrats, but the trick mules of gold standardism wanted their votes to hold their power and so have whipped the once grand old party into supporting something "British!"

MONEY FOR PRODUCT.

Numerous complaints are made that Washington county merchants can not, and do not, handle product such as vegetables, for shipment to market which can handle the product. It would seem that for the benefit of the small truck farmers some arrangement could be made so that they could get a cash price for their labors, be the values somewhat smaller than in mercantile payment. Many are cleaning up homes and raise nothing but vegetables, etc., and have no other means of getting together a few dollars with which to pay taxes and the like. To peddle this kind of product from door to door is not the finest thing in the world, and in the country towns the field is so limited that it would soon be

exhausted. Some one should look into this matter, and a business profitable to both buyers and sellers could be inaugurated.

RAISE MORE MONEY.

"We often hear," says the Hillsboro Argus, "that money is plenty, and that more is in circulation than has been for years. Certainly, money is more plentiful in the banks and interest rates are lower, and no one desires to negative the statement. But why should money not be more plentiful in the wheat-raising districts? The way to make money more plentiful in the wheat-raising districts is to raise more wheat. Reasonable men do not expect to obtain money unless they have something to exchange for it. The Hillsboro Argus wants 'cheap' money, but it wants it on the basis of full commodity value. But even money like this, based on dollars worth only 45 cents, can't be obtained in the 'wheat-raising districts' without raising wheat to exchange for them; and such dollars, when the wheat-grower gets them, will buy less than half as much of everything he wants and is compelled to buy than actual dollars. The craze for base money is one of the most singular of all the forms of mental aberration.—Oregonian.

The Oregonian says: "The way to make money more plentiful in the wheat-raising districts is to raise more wheat," to which it is respectfully suggested that the way to get more money for what wheat is raised is to allow more money to be raised—the way to make money more plentiful in the United States is to raise more money.

Reasonable men who produce want a generally better level of prices. Our mutual friend, the Oregonian, pleads the case of "sound money" and openly asks the people who are interested in product to help the "poor" people who are interested in dollars. With the Oregonian it is not mental aberration—it is pure political perversity. Its pernicious doctrines are those of a clientele which wants dollars to exchange for more of everything else—wants base product, cheap product, with no commercial attributes other than first cost. These debased product ideas are unwarrantable in a productive country where institutions are democratic—they do first-rate where a leucy and parasitic royalty rules. "Forty-five cent" dollars! With all the millions of debt where silver could be utilized equally with gold, and still a "45-cent" dollar! The Oregonian knows better than this. It is not an aberration with the Oregonian. It is a willing insanity. No sane person alleges that a dollar which universally pays as much debt of all kinds as a gold dollar, is or can be, a 45-cent dollar. But this cheap and base product "craze" pursued by our extollers of their own intelligence, "passeth understanding," as Brother Tongue would say, were he still against Mr. Cleveland's gold policy.

THE ELECTIONS.

The congressional elections are over and it is close figuring at this time whether or not the republicans have lost control of the house of representatives. It will be a majority of but very few either way. On the whole, congressionally, where the fight was made upon the money issue, silver has made gains. In California and Washington, where the gold standard people made their greatest fight against the single tax, the silver candidates have not defeated. The South made democratic gains at all points. The Tammany candidates in New York were elected, and while there are those who aver the elected are gold standard men, it is significant that Tammany supported Bryan in 1896.

In Illinois and Indiana, where the money question was supreme, great gains are made, Illinois electing several silver men to congress, with Indiana giving the opposition a close run. Taken all in all, considering the great hue and cry about not going against the administration while peace negotiations were pending between our country and Spain, the election can have but one significance—that the silver issue is gaining ground and will gain power at the third attempt, in 1900.

Should the house be republican, the contractive policy will be at once inaugurated and we shall have bank rag "flat" legal tender (when the bankers feel inclined) and the financial system of our country will be controlled by the great collateral institutions of the world.

The putting of the single tax into the platform cost California and Washington bimetallicists the elections. No more experience will be necessary to teach them that

one issue, a vital issue, at a time, is sufficient. Breakdowns invariably are the result of unnecessary overloading. No one can hew on both sides of the line at one and the same time.

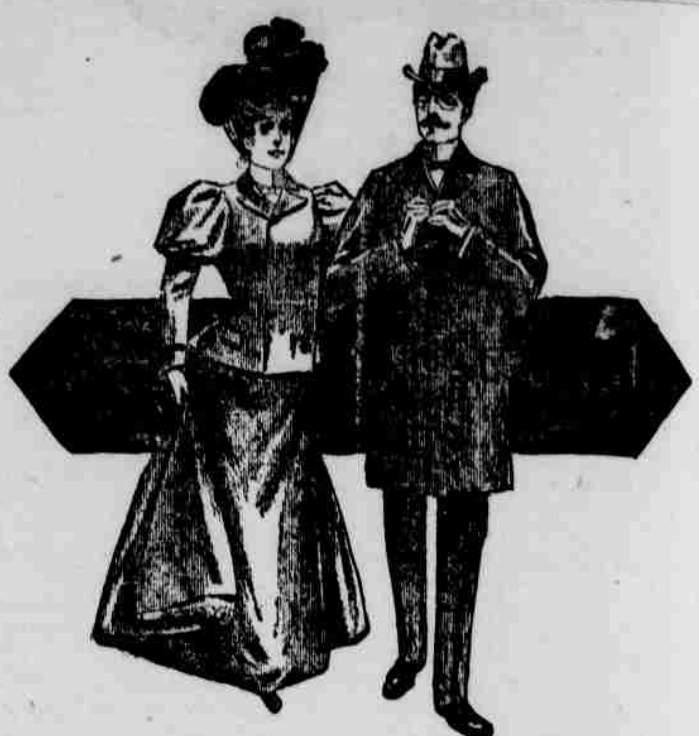
