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with delight. This open battle to the American citizenship—this political battle—was fought for the benefit of the nation, from the most disinterested standpoint, and the result was a good thing. The political "crisis" which charged honest product supporters with being cut-throats and brigands against organized society. Yet, in spite of all these combinations, the opposition to Hanna money monopoly made such gains that can be interpreted nothing but a signal victory. There is more than mere consolation in this—there is great hope; hope that in time—and that time is not far distant—the stolen livery of "piety" will be snatched from those who would degenerate the result of farm labor and their deception unmasked to even the most conservative of people. The desire to cheapen and debase that which is the foundation, studding and brace of society will not always be supported by those whom such a thing meant the most harm. The recent elections were of a nature to bring hope to American farmers.

WHERE THE ISSUE ROOTS.

The presumption that value in gold never changes is the fundamental error upon which is based the strongest arguments of the cheap product crier. He assumes that gold is stability, per se, and when he notes gold, as money, or bullion, measuring more of commodity, he does not seek an analysis of its greater purchase, but looks for the defect in the production of that which is constantly growing cheaper, forgetful of the basic principle that so much gold, measured in itself, remains a like quantity, and likewise, commodity, in like measure, remains a like quantity. Only for the great holders of money or collateral calling for money, you would never hear of these fellows crying out for "more money." They do not care a penny about philosophical conditions, but do want a "stable" dollar—one that is stable in a progressive ratio, capable of constantly bearing relation in each unit, to more property. This is only natural, of course.

On the other hand, they deny the important fact that money is demand, and yet, while trying to convert laborers to their theories, constantly contradict themselves by pointing out that this "dollar" will get him more than ever before with but one or two exceptions. They deny that legal tender law has ought to do with value and yet affirm that law can create conditions which, in other orders of commerce, make value. Denial is their strong forte and they must catch support with them or go to default in election results. Summed up, the battle is between dollar holders and producers. Each wants his property to stand for the greatest possible measure of the other. The minority is on the top of the heap at present, but it will not maintain its position if the force of numbers and dignity of productive labor go for anything.

CAN WE CREATE PARITY?

Given a use of several hundred millions annually to an article where use does not now exist: will this use be of any material commercial levelling with a factor which now enjoys the sole use in question? Will this increased use for the new and the decreased use for the old, have any effect upon relative values, one to the other, when the productive ratio of each to the other has remained materially unchanged for centuries? Sanity says "yes." It is therefore held that were bimetalism established in the United States, where the use for silver as money would annually absorb many times the world's production above the use commercially, parity would at once ensue. If gold left, parity would so much the sooner obtain because the demand for the silver dollar, would, by so much gold as would leave, be that much increased. Granted that it did not leave, but remained hidden, the demand would be relatively that strong as if gold had gone abroad.

Then, under bimetalism, you would have greater total of equal legal tender dollars, as gold must in any event, leave, non-use being destructive of value—and a better level of price must come, with the use of product to dollars. This would be an "anarchy" among all our farmers, even those who are voting to debase that which they raise. Let us have par-

ity of dollars and the parity of that out of which dollars are made will be assured. Let us have the old parity of product to money and we shall have a broader parity between the farm and bank counter of the country. Let us have these things if we do have to break up political parties managed by two or three dictators.
