

# CIRCUIT COURT ON FOR NOVEMBER TERM

A Large Number of Divorce Cases Were Granted.

BAUER INDICTED BY GRAND JURY

J C Townsend Pleaded Guilty to Assault  
Sentence Suspended.

Circuit court convened here Monday morning. The following grand jurors were selected: John Ireland, Greenville; L. C. Walker, Forest Grove; Jasper Reeves and Charles Rockstroh, Cornelius; Elias Olsen, Reedville; C. Holznaegel, Middleton; and M. Kehrli, Cedar Mills.

The suit of Katie Brugger, to recover possession of an interest in the Brugger estate, near Reedville, was called in court Tuesday morning. Plaintiff alleged that she was not in a responsible mental condition when she executed a deed several years ago and that her temporary incapacity was taken advantage of. The court decided for defendants.

The case of the State vs. H. B. Hollenbeck, charged with rape, was dismissed upon motion of the state. It was alleged that the prosecuting witness has lately married and that the defendant has broken jail and cannot be found.

By stipulation the case of the State vs. Washington County, for back taxes, was continued until the March term of court.

Under date of Oct. 8, Sidney Luce writes from Manila: "Col. Summers just passed through inspecting the quarters. They make us keep everything clean and orderly through the whole barracks. We are fixed up in fine shape—have big marble bath tubs with shower baths. We have ice water all the time. We boil the water and let it cool over night and the Company buys the ice to put with it. There are about a dozen natives in the quarters now getting washing from the boys and they are quarreling and arguing about the price. Sometimes they take a fellow's washing up and forget to bring it back. We have three colors of uniforms now, blue, brown and white. We have to wear the white ones for dress parade and guard mount. The regiment looks fine on dress parade all dressed in white. Everything has settled down and the main question with everyone is 'When are we going home?' The officers think it will be sometime in Nov. There is a good deal of sickness among the troops. The hospitals are full and there are many sick in quarters who ought to be in the hospital. What most of them are dying of the doctors call typhoid fever, but people who have lived here for several years say it is Asiatic fever. It is reported that there are seven or eight cases of small pox in the Brigade hospital.

Lieut. E. J. Bryan, Co. E, of Manila, under date of Oct. 30th, writes his parents the following mention of the Washington county boys: "I saw Tom Mann last night and he is well. He is chief cook for Co. H. Our boys have been their main stay, so Capt. McDonald says. They are all good-hearted lads and have kept out of trouble. The Washington county delegation have come through without a break and with great credit to our county. They are all strong and hearty and times without number have I known them to take the duties of less strong volunteers in addition to their own. I haven't time to sing their praise, but you may all feel proud of them—every one of them, and be glad, as I am here, to grasp their brave, honest hands. They have been imposed on more or less since we were broken up, as I predicted, but they have shown themselves true soldiers. All are anxious to get home, for we are tired of police duty. \* \* If the Paris commission could visit the hospitals here, they would be very quick in their decision." Lt. Bryan further says: "We do not want Luzon, without all, and they will cost us more than they are worth."

In making last week's computation The Argus assumed that the reports of the city treasurer were absolute upon their face. This, it appears, is not so. Treasurer Mitchell deducted the cash reported as on hand from the amount of outstanding warrants, and really reported the amount outstanding after the deduction was made. Deputy Schulmerich gives the outstanding warrants (in this year's report) without deducting his cash on hand. Considering the cash to be applied on warrants, then, the warrant debt, Nov. 19, 1898, principal and interest, is \$7,339.79. The net warrant debt, plus accrued interest on Nov. 12, 1897, was \$8,533.21—this after the cash on hand was deducted as if already applied. This makes an actual reduction in the floating debt of \$1193.42 in the past year. The total city debt now stands: Bonded debt, \$10,000; floating debt, \$7,339.79; total, \$17,339.79.

Proper credits were made on the barn's books, but Hughes, Morgan & Rogers did not credit the barn account on their books. The firm subsequently dissolved and the claim was bought by T. D. Humphreys, who was a creditor of J. J. Morgan. Men who had made like terms with the firm but who have not received proper credits are now breathing easier. S. B. Huston was attorney for Mr. Sewell.

## WILL ENFORCE THE ANTI-TOBACCO LAW

Deputy Dist. Attorney Bagley Sounds Warning.

LADS OPENLY SMOKING POISON

After December 10th, Violations will be Prosecuted—A Good Movement.

The law on minors using tobacco is: "It shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of 18 years to smoke or in any way use any cigar, cigarette or tobacco in any form whatsoever in any public highway, street, place, square or resort. Any minor violating the provisions of this act, shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than one nor more than ten dollars, or by imprisonment at the option of the court, two days for each offense." The law also prohibits sale to these minors unless upon consent of parent.

This statute is notoriously violated by our Hillsboro youths and the deputy district attorney, H. T. Bagley, has concluded to give the lads fair warning. After the 10th of December he will arrest any minor or minors violating the statute. He, with many others, is of the opinion, and rightfully, that the present conditions should be interfered with, for the good of the rising generation. Parents will look after their boys and boys will look out for the limb and majesty of the law.

# JAMES McCULLOCH HAS PASSED AWAY

Died in this City Last Night From Heart Trouble.

WAS A CAPTAIN IN THE CIVIL WAR

Widely Respected by the Community—Member of G. A. R. and A. O. U. W.

Captain Jas. McCulloch, a highly respected citizen of this city, died this morning at 1:30 from effects of heart trouble. He was born in Terre Haute, Indiana, Jan. 6, 1839, and was married Aug. 6, 1866, to Miss Mary Caroline Peppers. When the war broke out he enlisted in the 6th Missouri Regulars; afterwards promoted to the captaincy of the 55th Missouri Infantry. He was a charter member of the A. O. U. W. lodge, No. 6, Detroit, Michigan, and upon coming to the Hillsboro lodge, of which at the time of his death he was in good standing. He was also a member of a member of General Ransom post and has for years been its quartermaster. Capt. McCulloch was a man of letters and was universally beloved and respected. He was known as a good, clean citizen and his noble qualities endeared him to all who knew him. His widow survives him. The funeral will take place tomorrow from the Pittenger residence and the remains will be interred in the Masonic cemetery.
