THE LATEST VAUDEVILLE.

There is a great deal of bluster and more of childishness in the manner of those papers ardently supporting the ownership of the Philippine Islands. So far as the question is concerned, it is settled, as The Argus has said, in a prior issue, and there is no particular reason for our friends to get epileptic over the affair. The single matter of whether we shall treat the Philippines as representatives of the United States or as pure reservations with Algerism at the head, can never be an issue of public polity.

Nevertheless it is observed that the gold ring of the "don't-pull-down-the-flag" element is very hopeful that it shall get Americans flying at each others' throats over the result of a "glorious war" and embalmment. No one cares particularly whether the Philippines shall be Philippine-governed, (as they should be) or governed by good American methods—only common sense revolts at government by Algerism. The fact is, the great hue-and-cry charging people with wanting to "surrender the fruits of victory" is either witless, or a vaudeville effort to get the public mind off of home affairs.

THE NICARAGUA CANAL.

When the Nicaragua canal proposition came before congress we shall see one of the greatest fights ever witnessed in the United States. Every transcontinental railway will naturally be opposed to its construction and the Southern Pacific will be foremost of all, for its line will be hurt worse than all others combined. Whether or not the more northern roads will spend any money to defeat its passage is a question, but the Southern Pacific bondholders are sure, under the lead of Collis P. Huntington, to lay every possible obstacle in the way. Huntington is already striving to get a senator from California and he generally gets what he goes after. Millions will be spent and attempts of all kinds made to keep congress from putting through the canal. A corporation which spends money in campaigns to keep from being taxed will naturally spend millions to save millions—and the public can go to the d—l. Here is where a little direct legislation would do some good.

HOME MANUFACTURE.

The wheat market still lingers in the "fifties" so far as the coast is concerned—that is to say, so far as the average of the farmers' gettings is concerned. Here we are, in January, with wheat dull and no great prospect of better prices. With present values, even, it will not be long until the farmer will not be able to buy the thousand and one things which go to make up labor for the vast manufacturing east. And here is a point right here: The State Board of Immigration should take up the matter of home manufacturing at their meeting in Portland this month. The Oregon farmer has long enough paid tribute to eastern dealers. Let us have some manufacturers, whether we have low prices or high prices for our product. Transportation, at least, will be saved.

A STATESMAN FIRST.

The United States will make no blunder as elevating to the presidency man who are not statesmen. Grant was a good soldier in general, but he never was a statesman—that is to say, he was not enough to plan a military campaign, but was not in close touch with the economic needs of the country. Such a man as Lincoln, an apothecary, yet unbending, a man who

was one of the nation's real democracy, is the type of statesman necessary to guide a nation. In his sphere Dewey is a past master, but take him away from his naval environment and he could easily prove a failure. He is a trained naval officer, and not a statesman in any sense. From this it is not to be inferred that he is not, however, more of a diplomat and statesman than many who profess to be such. Mr. Watterson may as well keep quiet. So long as John M. Palmer is in the political arena, Henri should not go back on that valiant trail-ender.

THE LEGISLATURE.

The legislature which shall convene next week can do the state great service in more ways than one. There are many statutes which could be amended in a manner to save thousands of dollars to the state, annually. Too much salary is paid in a great many cases. The salaries are remaining as they were years ago, before prices had fallen and this has brought about an increase in purchasing power, although numerically the same of the price of service. Let us see what the legislature shall do before criticism is indulged.

The Independent's remarks conclusively prove that the mule supply had not been exhausted, hence 'twere folly to assume that our "populists" have been embalmment.
