

WHY AGENT HOBBS VISITED IN HILLSBORO.

Was Investigating Official Bonds at Clerk's Office.

FOUND MANY WITHOUT REVENUE.

Collector Dunne Notices Signers of the Delinquency—No Penalty.

The visit of Special Internal Revenue Agent Hobbs, of McMinnville, to this city was not without results. He found nineteen official bonds, embracing those of constables, justices of the peace and county officers, to which the necessary revenue stamps were not attached. The absence of these stamps was due to a misunderstanding of the revenue law, which, according to provisions, became operative July 1. The various officers in question were elected in June, and many had filed their bonds prior to July 1, under the idea that the revenue law did not apply to them. Collector Dunne, however, has notified them that under department rulings stamps must be affixed to the bonds, as the obligations were not in force prior to official qualification. As the Oregon statute provides that newly elected county and precinct officers shall be inducted into office after July 1, the application is plain. The inspector also found a number of bonds filed by administrators of estates without stamps. The insured were all permitted to attach the necessary stamps without penalty, and all is again serene.

WILL GIVE JUSTICES WIDER JURISDICTION

Deputy District Attorney has Prepared a Bill

FOR THIS SESSION OF THE SOLONS.

Thinks it will Annually save County Considerable Money.

Deputy District Attorney H. T. Bagley has prepared a bill giving justice courts jurisdiction in quite a number of cases now triable only by the circuit court, which involves a great deal of expense, as the law now stands. Should the bill become a law the expense incurred in holding prisoners in the county jail awaiting action by the grand jury and trial in the circuit court would be done away with. Among the cases to be included in the bill are: Indecent exposure, using false weights and measures, refusal to aid an officer, outrage of public decency, injuring monuments and trespass in cemeteries, serving civil processes on Sunday, opening and publishing the contents of a sealed letter, and endeavoring to prevent a person from working for another. The author will have the bill introduced at the next legislature through a local member, and thinks it will pass without any trouble.

Attorney H. T. Bagley has prepared a bill for legislative action which provides that but five cents per mile shall be paid witnesses and jurors in all civil and criminal cases in justices' courts, courts of record and corner's inquests and investigations. The present law gives a mileage of ten cents. Another measure up for passage will make it mandatory that a justice cannot collect fees in a case except in actions for murder, arson, robbery and grand larceny, unless the complaint or information is first submitted to the district attorney or his deputy. This, it is hoped, will shut out many trifling little cases which are dismissed, yet cost the county heavily.
