John Johnson, Associate Editor of the Washington county Hatchel, and for some time since holding a federal position in the Washington county jail as waiting witness in an Admiralty case, came out from Portland Monday evening to finish up a little job of painting the city which he has so ably represented in the columns of the Forest Grove paper. Before he had applied the first coat of priming Marshal Green conducted him to the sumptuous quarters in the city barracks, more commonly known by the vulgar as the "city jail." He was allowed to go back to Portland, Tuesday evening, under the provision that he take his jag with him—which he did.

Justice W. D. Smith, of North Hillsboro precinct, Friday last held John Salzeberger, of the Imbrie hop yard, in the sum of \$50 cash bail, deposited, to appear before the next grand jury in answer to an allegation by Chas. Hess, of pointing a fire-arm at and toward another person. It appears that Hess and Salzeberger have been having a little unpleasantness for some time. Judge Smith fined the old man \$5 for contempt of court, but as he did not understand the ethics of courts, the fine was remitted.

The lagrippe, with its attendant train of complications, is giving this city and the surrounding section a good strong visit. There are but few families which have not sick members and in some cases, the whole family is afflicted. It seems to go after layman and physician alike and fears not the killer of microbes and bacteria. Just at present it has Dr. Linklater in its clutches, and Dr. Tamesie has just recovered from a slight attack.

H. B. Luce, dairy and food commissioner, has recently made four or five arrests at Portland, for adulterating milk, and will push the prosecutions. Thomas Paulsen, of this county, is a strong candidate for the office as soon as Mr. Luce's term expires—or better, when it shall have been determined whether Baker or Mr. Luce is entitled to the office. Paulsen is a thorough farmer and dairy man and would make a splendid officer.

Chas. Shattuck, engineer at the water and light plant, while laying some new machinery in the engine house, Tuesday, stepped on a nail, which penetrated the flesh for two inches. With the aid of a crutch he is able to get around.

JOHNSTON FREEMAN HAS PASSED OVER.

Was a Native Son of Washington County.

A SUFFERER FROM CONSUMPTION

Died at his home in this city, at 7:30 p. m., January 11th.

Johnston Freeman, a native son of Oregon, passed away at his home in this city at 7:30 last evening, January 11. Johnston was born on the North Plains, February 14, 1855 and was the son of Robert and Sarah Freeman, both of whom crossed the plains in the '40's to make Oregon their home. Deceased was well known throughout this section and was noted for his open-handed liberality and big-heartedness, through which he had a very large circle of friends. For several years he was connected with the Grange store, of this city. He was married to Elizabeth Imbrie, November 1, 1883, who with a son, nine years of age, and a daughter, fifteen months, survives him. His mother, Mrs. Sarah Freeman, and his sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Conklin, of this city, and Mrs. Ella Graham, of Westport, Ore., are all who survive him of the Freeman family. Johnston was a Mason and his remains will be buried under lodge auspices, Friday, January 13th, at West Union. The funeral train will leave the house at 10 a. m.

For a number of years he has been failing and kept up by sheer force of an indomitable spirit. About two weeks ago he took to his bed to have an abscess opened. His passing away was not prolonged, and his last few hours were unconscious.

DEATH OF LOUIS ROOD, JR.

The end came at four p. m. Tuesday.

Louis Rood, Jr., the 17-year-old son of Judge and Mrs. Louis Rood, of this city, died at four o'clock p. m., January 10th, at his home in this city. Several days ago he was taken ill with lagrippe and upon convalescing went out in the open air. This brought on a relapse and he grew rapidly worse until death came. The remains were interred in the Masonic cemetery this afternoon. Deceased was born December 7, 1881, and was a bright young man, a universal favorite with all who knew him. The bereaved family have the sympathy of the entire community.

GOLD BEARING QUARTZ FOUND

In a Beaverdam Bottom on the Farm of George Robinson.

It is reported on good authority, that Geo. Robinson of Farmington, while ditching on his beaverdam a few days ago, struck a gold bearing quartz ledge, an assay of which goes \$42 per ton. Another shipment has also been sent for assay and he expects returns in a day or so.

The lead is from two to three feet in width, runs north and south, (a splendid indication) and pitches east. Within sixty feet of this one he has found two smaller leads. These, however, he has not yet assayed or prospected. His farm is located five miles southeast of this city.

Cooper Brannaman has moved his barber shop to next door the St. Joseph—Simionides Lodge K. of P. installed officers Saturday evening. Miss Dill McLinn, of Witch Hazel, visited with friends in the city, over Sunday.

Word has reached this city that G. A. Sanford, who for years ably aided The Independent and Hatchel to secure republican victories in this county, was arrested in St. Helena the other day charged with intending to defraud creditors by leaving the state. He was placed in jail over night, so it is said, and now intends taking advantage of the bankruptcy law in order to get away. He was bound for North or South Carolina when arrested and had tickets over the Northern Pacific.

K, 12th Indiana Volunteers, is rapidly recovering from a rupture of a small blood vessel in his brain. Meyer marched to the sea with Sherman. He was in the Andersonville prison two months and "enjoyed" the hospitality of Captain Wirtz.
