BUT ONE CASE OF PROSTRATION.

The Patient was Taken to Cornelius and Revived.

Sunday was a very "dry day" in Hillsboro. Back doors refused to obey the old alarm, and many a throat asked the mouth "what's the matter up there." Winehouse and Anhardt laid sullen in their retreats while Jesse Moore, too smart to be caught out, had gone out in a conveyance the night before. The mayor, not being in town over Sunday, can never know the mental and physical suffering attendant his order. Men who had always been healthy and noted for fortitude became weak and helpless, and were led around the streets of the city by their wives—a sure sign that some terrible mental disease had entered the spirit of their soul. The physicians seemed to be doing well enough for a patient apparently left every five minutes bearing a prescription with this legend: "R— 1 qt. Frumenti—Spts. Halo Aqua— Sig—Breathe gently while taking."

One man exhibited signs of mental aberration, and while on a street corner nearly succumbed to a stroke of heart failure. Loving hands carried him to Cornelius where the "cordiale entente" soon revived him.

His Honor, the Mayor, without any criminal intent, doubtless, left the city Saturday evening and went to Portland, when the drouth was not epidemic. The mayor is aware that his exit at this critical time is subject to much criticism and comment but he avers he had other business in Portland.

The remains of Mrs. Ruth Hare Pruyne, wife of Mr. W. E. Pruyne, were interred, Saturday, Feb. 18, 1899, in the Masonic Cemetery, the funeral taking place from the residence of Hon. W. D. Hare, at 1:30 p. m. Ruth Hare was the youngest daughter of Hon. W. D. Hare, and was born in this city, Dec. 20, 1870. Her life has been spent in Washington county, with the exception of but a few months' residence in Heppner, as Mrs. Pruyne. She was married to Mr. Pruyne April 20, 1898, died February 16, 1899. After those nearest to her had taken a last look at the face, which so natural was it that it seemed to defy death, the casket was hermetically sealed and remains laid to rest.

THE SALARY LAW EFFECTIVE JULY 1.

Cuts Present Incumbents on One Year's Work.

WENT THRO' IN THE CLOSING HOURS

Will Save about \$2,000 Annually on Salaries.

The Washington county salary bill passed the house, amended, went back to the senate, and was there concurred in, and is now a law—and this at the closing hours of the session. There was trouble somewhere, the public knew not what—and therefore no one expected the measure to go thro'.

The trouble seemed here: The original senate bill provided that the cut should be operative after July 1, 1900, while J. R. C. Thompson, of the House, wanted it to take effect immediately. It seems that Thompson alleges that Senator Haines had agreed to let the House take its course on the bill, inasmuch as three out of the delegation of five were House members. This, Thompson is said to report, Haines did not do, but on the contrary, helped to defeat the House amendment making the cut take effect at once. Upon this showing Thompson, by request, had the bill referred back to him and he held it until the opposition would come to terms on a compromise. At the last moment Thompson said that rather than have the measure lost he would compromise on July 1, 1899, if the opposition would agree to concur. This was done and the bill went through both houses in a hurry.

Representative Thompson does not relish the idea of being held up as an obstructor and says he has saved the taxpayers \$2,200 by his action on the salary bill. The bill now authorizes: Sheriff, \$1,800 per year and one deputy at \$600. Recorder, \$1,000 per year and one deputy at \$500. The money saved by the new bill is \$2,200 per annum.
