

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH IN OREGON.

Organized at Tualatin Plains in May, 1844.

A HISTORICAL CHURCH BUILDING.

Zina Wood, of Hillsboro, owns the Records of the old Church.

Zina Wood, sr., of this city, owns the official records of the first Baptist church organized on the Pacific slope. The articles of incorporation read:

"Constitution and covenant of the West Union Baptist church of Jesus Christ.

"Tualatin Plains, Oregon territory, May 25, 1844.

"Whereas, in the providence of God, a few names of us, the professed followers of Jesus Christ, who hold one faith, one Lord and one baptism, have been thrown together in the wilds of the West, and being members of churches in the United States, desirous of keeping up the worship of God in our neighborhood and in our families, agree, that we hereby constitute and come into union, first giving ourselves to the Lord, and then to each other, do covenant and agree that we will meet together to worship God and keep the commandments and ordinances of God's house, and are hereby constituted into a church.

(Signed) "D. T. LENOX, HENRY SEWELL, LUCINDA BRAGLE, ALEX. BLEVINS, NINEVEH FORD, LOUBIA LENOX, W. M. BRAGLE, LAVINA BLEVINS."

"The church has not held meetings since March, 1879, and Mr. Wood is the only one now surviving of the board of trustees.

The association built a church in 1853 and dedicated it on December 21 of that year. Wm. Kane, now living at Forest Grove, was the builder. The building committee reported that the expense of the structure was over \$1500. The building is yet used, but by other denominations. A few years ago it was raised on a good stone foundation, and still gives excellent accommodations for worship.

The first baptisms on the coast of this denomination occurred on February 2, 1847, at which time Mary Ann Lenox, Elizabeth Lenox and Perry Beagle were received into the church.

The eighth article of faith reads: "We believe that baptism is an ordinance of the gospel, and is to be administered to believers only, and that immersion of the body in water is the only proper mode of baptism."

The record of February 8, 1845, states: "After hearing a sermon by our beloved brother, Rev. Vincent Snelling, being the first sermon preached to the church by a baptist minister in Oregon, proceeded to business."

The searching of these records has been caused by the fact that the Pacific coast Baptists propose holding an anniversary in the latter part of May at San Francisco, at which time and place the earliest dates and interesting history of the pioneer churches and ministers will be set forth.

As near as can be ascertained, the posterity of the incorporators are: children of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Beagle, (who died at Pendleton a few years ago)—Wm. Beagle, Atlin, Beagle, Jas. Beagle, Pendleton; Perry Beagle (one of the first baptized in the church) Lewiston, Idaho; John Beagle, Colorado; Nancy Beagle Hemmes, (formerly Mrs. Crisp) Corvallis; Frank and Ben Beagle, Yellow Jacket, Idaho, and M. A. Beagle, Skagway, Alaska. Children of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Sewell—James H. and John W. Sewell, of Hillsboro. Lennox children—Sam Lennox, Gaston; David Lennox, Seeburg, and Ed Lennox, California. The Fords moved away to the Walla Walla country and the posterity cannot be traced. Of the Blevins, no trace can be found.

AN OLD VETERAN.

Cornelius, April 16. (To the Editor) The following is an extract from the Milwaukee Germania: "Mrs. Charles Brandon, of Moundsville, West Virginia, made application for a pension the other day, and if one-half her story is true, she is entitled to one. She claims to be the 3d wife of Chas. Brandon, who recently died at the age of 96, and who was the father of 39 children, of whom four died when young. At the time of Brandon's death the oldest child was 75 years of age and the youngest was three. The claimant's name was Sarah Barker, and she was the youngest of a family of 16 children. Brandon's first wife bore him six children, of which the two oldest are living, the other four having died in childhood. His second wife had 18 children. The present Mrs. Brandon bore 15 children and at the time of her marriage there were 20 children under the parental roof, the oldest then being 39 years. She claims she has been a good mother ever to them.

Brandon was a veteran of three wars. He fought against the British in 1812, a later Indian war, and was in the Mexican war. Seventeen of his sons served in the war of the Rebellion.

It seems as though he could not find names enough for his boys, as he named two of them Charles and two John, each of the two pairs being sons of different mothers. Both of the Charles' and John's were in the Union army and were captured at Chickamauga and died at Andersonville prison. The other brothers serving in the army were: Simon, Evans, Peter, Josephus, Hiram, James, Van Buren, Jacob, Alexander, David, Andrew and Rufus. Peter was killed at Shiloh, while the others came home safe and now live, scattered in the mountains of Virginia and Kentucky. Mrs. Brandon is now 61 years of age and the government should do something for her."

A Lively Closed Meeting in a spirit of Badinage.

WHAT OUR RISING YOUTH DO.

The Hillsboro cow question takes front rank in Economics.

The Young Men's Literary Society held a closed meeting last Saturday. Though a business meeting, it was not devoid of amusement. A large volume of business was transacted in the way of resolutions, challenges and programs. Three members presided in relays, as the task was arduous,—equal to Speaker Reed's. The members were full of rules, some parliamentary, some otherwise, which resulted in several chaises, that were haply dissolved after sheer exhaustion had seized on the chaos makers.

A challenge to the Gamma Sigma Society of Forest Grove for a debate, was made which created some merriment, as it had some prohibitory terms, requiring a deposit of \$500 in the bank by debaters having a rating in both Dunn's and Bradstreet's agencies.

A resolution was prepared for Aguineldo and Russel A. Alger instructing them how to extricate themselves from their difficulties. M. S. Hazen was selected as chief adviser for Aguineldo, acting as agent for the society, and accepted the position with great gusto, inasmuch as his name was substituted for that of W. J. Bryan's by a unanimous vote.

The Anglo Saxon Alliance question was adopted to be discussed at the open meeting April 29th by Frank Stewart and E. C. Luce, to which the public is invited.

For the closed meeting of the 15th, the members will expend their energies on the cow question, discussing whether the cows shall roam the streets of Hillsboro or not. This question must not be understood as representing the calibre of the society, as several other lofty themes were proposed, but the cow question came out best in a very complicated parliamentary shuffle, at the close of the meeting when the law and order faction had relaxed their vigilance somewhat.

ROAD LAW

Deputy District Attorney H. T. Bagley has written the following opinion for the county court, relative to collection of road tax:

"Section 4088 of the road laws as compiled by the Secretary of State by authority of the legislature in a joint resolution adopted in February, 1893, provides, 'that a delinquent shall become liable to the supervisor for the amount of his road tax in money,' and said section 4088, 4089, 4091 and 4098 prescribe the manner of collecting such delinquent road tax. The law as compiled in the foregoing sections was enacted in 1864 and in 1866 another law was enacted which is compiled in section 2836 of Hill's Code, and reads as follows: 'If any person liable to perform labor on the public roads, or to any tax for road purposes, shall fail so to do, when warned or demanded, the supervisor shall immediately give to the sheriff a statement of such delinquent road work or road tax, showing the amount that will discharge the same in money, and the sheriff shall immediately collect the same,' etc, and prescribe, the manner of collecting said tax. The provisions of section 2836 being repugnant to those provisions of sections 4088, 4089, 4091, and 4098 which prescribe the manner of collecting delinquent road tax, the latter are repealed by implication and the law as enacted in 1866 must govern. Section 4085 of the road laws was amended in 1893 and subdivision 2 of said section as amended refers to the hinging of an action for the collection of delinquent road taxes, but inasmuch as section 4091 provides for collection by action has been repealed, or so much thereof as provides for the collection of road taxes is my opinion that the law of 1866 and which is quoted in the foregoing, is the duty of all supervisors, 'to give to the sheriff a statement of the delinquent work or road tax, showing the amount that will discharge the same in money,' and it is the duty of the sheriff to 'immediately' collect the same."
