Open Letter to the Publisher of the Oregonian.

"GERMAN UGLINESS."

Sir: We read your nice ebullition in Friday's edition of your really valuable paper under the above heading: "German ugliness" and former snobs and provoking utterances of a similar kind, and we agree with you that they are incomparably nicer than all Germans combined. Would the Germans only follow your pattern of modesty, morality, refined culture, patriotism, consciousness, etc., they would become lofty models of humanity, to be sure! At the same time, though, it strikes us as if your skill in the arts of logic and reasoning power were not so exemplary (for we poor Germans at least) and that you even make sometimes the mistake of measuring Germany's corn and other people's corn with different bushels. But perhaps we poor German-Americans are "away behind" you in this respect as in others not being able to understand a logician of your rank and degree. So, please take pity on us poor ugly Germans and explain the following questions to us in order that we may get a little of your scholarly, logical reasoning in our poor, ugly heads and a little of your high standard morality in our wicked hearts and consciences.

At the time of Germany's trouble with Hayti, you wrote in your paper, "Germany is again in the landgrabbing business." That was very, very wicked of Germany! Of course Germany did not grab anything in Hayti, but that is immaterial (at least to the average editor) and besides it was the height of German ugliness and insolence to be no land-grabber in Hayti, after all, even after the infamous "Oregonian" had so declared. At that time, it looked as if Uncle Sam would never be in the landgrabbing business, and therefore the editor of the Oregonian was right in emphasizing landgrabbing as a mean, ugly, dirty business. Of course, circumstances alter the case. Uncle Sam is now in the landgrabbing business and now landgrabbing is a proper, civilized, gentlemanly, honorable business, beneficial to the whole world and a blessing to all, or at least, to the money power.

Or could you deny, Mr. Editor, that Uncle Sam—once so honest and humane—is now a robber just like Germany, grabbing land where he can? Did he grab Porto Rico, and the Philippines? Will he not grab Cuba and perhaps Samoa, too, if he follow your advice? Doesn't it find your approval, that Uncle Sam stay in the land grabbing business, even if he has to shoot down the very last Filipino? Now please enlighten us a little how it comes that landgrabbing is a mean, ugly business, if done by Germany, and a highly civilized act, if done by Uncle Sam? Do you, in case you or Uncle Sam do it? Of course a man of your capacity will refrain from hollow phrases like "duty," "duty," "force of uncontrollable circumstances," "popular instinct," etc., else ugly Germany might learn something and use

not sell what no longer belongs to him, a patriotic American would be justified in asking, if old England, so dear to you now, after her defeat, had sold the United States to a certain "Washington" or a certain "Jefferson," have acknowledged such transaction as legal and binding and acted less patriotic than a certain "Aguinaldo"? It is really refreshing, this pur chasing business, isn't it?

Did you not always say that European diplomacy (of course, British diplomacy excepted) was nothing but hypocrisy? armed intervention of Europe declared an act of necessity for humanity's sake it would prove to be nothing but bumbling and a cheap pretense to seize territory? Now, let's see! Did not Uncle Sam declare war for humanity's sake, in the name of liberty, civilization, etc., and might not the European powers (Germany, for instance) in the light of later events, hit back and say: "All this only as a pretense to seize territory?" Has now our righteous, honest Uncle Sam become a hypocrite too? Or do you call shooting down Filipinos in order to get their islands, humanity and civilization? But, perhaps you will say, "the best Indian is the dead Indian; the best Filipino is the dead Filipino; and shooting those niggers is civilizing those niggers;" but dear Mr. Editor, let me tell you; it strikes me, some Filipino might answer with the same right and force of argument: "Shooting those Americans is civilizing those Americans;" and, "the dead American is the best American." So, please enlighten us a little.

Of course, it is horrible to the average Jingo and to all yellow papers to think that Uncle Sam should keep his hands off the Filipinos and allow them to have a government of their own. Sure, "ugly" Germany or some other power might buy or lag the islands, subsequently. Just think of it! Think hard. Even the yellowest Jingo gets black in the face when he comes to think of it. But, of course, you are no Jingo, nor is your paper yellow, certainly not! Not to be thought of! You are an ideal newspaper as you claim to be modest for once! You only cannot help yourself but to give the suspicion in your head something that the poor Filipinos are not fit for self government, nor for becoming U. S. citizens, haven't you? Now, please explain, why did the republican party (your party, isn't it?) give full rights of U. S. citizens to the niggers after the war between the North and South? Were they fit for those grand privileges? Then the Filipinos (at least, the Tagalos) are fit for such prerogatives too; much more are they fit to be left alone! The Tagalos have a much higher standard of civilization than our negroes had after war; their press is even far better than the yellow press of our country (at least, more civilized in terms it uses). There are men of literary and scientific fame (perhaps not quite so scientific as you, though) who have visited the islands and furnish the above information. Will you admit the populists are right who claim the republican party of today is not the party of Lincoln; Lincoln's party fought to free the slaves, and the republican party of today fights to enslave the free. By Jimmy, Mr. Editor, doesn't it look a little like that?

If the issue of the next national campaign should prove to be the same as in 1865, will the editor of the Oregonian ride the high horse again and give free lessons in ethics to the populists? That would be a treat, indeed, to hear the great editor of the Oregonian rise again in moral indignation at the sight of populists who want to cheat the goldbugs out of half their money by the goldbug tricks, known as free coinage of silver. But we fear after the populists

have learned by the jingoistic press that a Christian nation is always right in taking the land of some black or yellow heathens, the populist pupil will rise and say: "Please, Mr. Schoolmaster, you are no longer right in punishing us for robbing other people's money, for you are yourself a bushrafter and robb other people of their land and you teach us Americans that it is perfectly legal to rob the Filipinos of their land; only you call expanding what you should call robbing. If it is right to expand in order to get land, it is just as right to expand in order to get money. Stealing money is never worse than stealing land. Cheating is cheating, you know. And let me tell you, Mr. Schoolmaster, if you live in a glass house you should not throw stones, for the other fellow might throw back. Now please, Mr. Scott, tell us, are you right, or are your schoolboys right? Do you live in a glass house of morals, or in a strong fortress, as it behooves a teacher of ethics? Should an unprincipled man teach other people morality, or should only gentlemen of sound and moral principles have this privilege? Please enlighten us ugly Germans a little.

You assert in your paper, there was at present no necessity for German-Americans assemble and protest against an alliance of the U. S. with England. There was no one who thought of anything of that kind. I ask, is there really no necessity when a man of your standard of education almost gets sentimental and nearly faints for joy that the Americans are at last honored to fight together with the greatest power on earth, the British? "That makes a bond not easily broken," etc., "That England shall keep our good favor," while the Germans must smother their ugly feelings and accept the legislation and diplomacy of England and America combined." And last, but not least, "that Germany is powerless when both England and the U. S. are pitted against her." Now, only look at the last sentence. There we are. What the anti-expansionists claimed at the beginning that we cannot rely on ourselves; that we must have an ally, sooner or later, to keep up the expansion business, is now conceded by the independent and almighty editor of the Oregonian. He declares England and America, by combining to make Germany powerless! And this man wants to be an American, a patriotic American! Is there no necessity for German-Americans to protest against such kinds of independence and patriotism? Even many a naturalized Englishman in this country if he loves America will teach to his Scotch patriotism and tell him, America must be able to stand on her own ground alone for all time to come or lose her right to be a great nation! Now please, Mr. Editor, tell us, are you an American or only an Englishman? Is your patriotism the right pattern or the wrong? Do you work for the republican party or against it? Must we Germans smother our "ugly feelings" even at election times or do we have the right to elect men to office who will stand by republicanism allowed to unite with the German democrats and populists and vote a ticket the German loving editor of the Oregonian would not like to endorse? Will the amiable editor, Mr. Scott, do us a favor and continue to show that only Anglo Saxons are first class nations and consequently all others, such as French, Scandinavians, Danes, Belgians, Hollanders, Swiss, etc., are rated by all genuine and sober scientists as second and third class people, or does he prefer to smother his ugly feelings until after election time and talk a little more like a gentleman ought to mean while?
