HOW THE COUNTY WILL GIVE HONOR

Dewey's Day will be appropriately celebrated May 1.

The committee appointed to arrange for a Dewey Day celebration met last Friday evening at the office of Mayor Barrett and concluded to have a rousing celebration on the evening of May 1, in honor of the achievement of Admiral Dewey one year ago. After consideration of the national monument movement, it was decided to have no part with it, but a new idea, entirely, was adopted.

The committee resolved to organize for the purpose of raising funds with which to build a monument for the Washington county soldier dead who have passed away while with the Second Oregon at Manila. The proposed shaft will cost over \$250 and will exceed that to the extent of the money raised. It is intended to receive permission from the county court to have it placed in the court yard plaza. So far but two of our boys, Percy Oliver and John Speirings, have met with death while enlisted, and the people of the county will respond liberally to a memorial slab.

John Loftus was in from beyond Glencoe yesterday. He reports that W. P. Freeman, one of Washington county's native sons, has removed to Winlock, Wash., to reside.

Mrs. Wm. Beagle departed Wednesday morning for her Pendleton home, after having visited here for ten days. County Clerk Imbrie and wife accompanied her as far as Portland.

The backward spring is rather provoking to the farmers, as seeding is somewhat delayed by the frequent rains. Nearly all the plowing is completed and a fortnight of good weather would see all crops in.

Appropos of trotting horse families, the most familiar to Oregon horsemen is the Pathfinder-Altamont family. Whenever these horses have been put up for sale, they have always brought ready money ahead of average fine horse values. When the horse market was dead a few years ago, \$5,000 was refused for Altas. The owner of Altas, 2:09 1/2, when he was a 3-year-old, refused three \$10,000 offers. Altas made the record of 2:09 1/2 in 1895, and has but one living son who is a stallion. This son is Alto Mann, a splendid, handsome black, stands 16 hands and has the regular Altas action. He weighs about 1,200 pounds. Alto Mann's first dam was Ada Rock, (dam of Alta's 2:15 1/2) by Adiron-dack, 7:19; second dam, Minnie (dam of Trumont 2:21 1/2) by Rockwood 14:67; third dam, Sallie M., (dam of Pathmont 2:09 1/2, Altas 2:09 1/2) by Oregon Pathfinder 10:51. Compare these famous dams and his sire to other horse families and you find that in Alto Mann you have the greatest living young stallion in the world. Alto, above mentioned, a full brother to Alto Mann, readily sold last fall at a high figure, when the horse market was demoralized. Hop growers all over Washington county are showing increased activity, not alone in the care of the present area of cultivation, but yards everywhere are being enlarged. The Wm. Bagley yard will be enlarged 20 acres this year; the famous Buchanan yard at Cornelius will be 50 acres stronger in its pick next year, and nearly all growers are putting in more of the crop. All told, the 1900 crop in this county will be several hundred acres larger than this year. The present profitable price is the cause of this, and while it is down from what it was, still, growers generally are looking for a level of values which shall make good profit.
