

HATCHET PRINTERY
GETS IN TROUBLE.

Now in the charge of Postmaster J. W. Marsh.

CRAIG SUEVED BY TYPE FOUNDERS' CO.

Hatchet has been running since the spring of 1895.

The Hatchet printery, of Forest Grove, has been having financial trouble within the past two or three days. The American Type Founders' Company Saturday last filed suit against Austin Craig in the sum of \$190.60 and Sheriff Bradford levied on all of the personal property belonging to Craig. That portion of the plant on which Craig had a contract from J. W. Marsh had already been turned over to Mr. Marsh when the official arrived. Bradford made the levy on the remaining personal property and placed it in the keeping of Mr. Marsh. The claim upon which the suit was brought was for printer's supplies, and paper furnished the Hatchet. The Hatchet thus ends its career in keeping with its editorial positions upon the money question. It has been on all sides of the money question and finally winds up by forced liquidation. Mr. Craig tried every possible way to keep possession of the plant, but at last succumbed to the inevitable. Monday evening he dropped off the west bound train, slipped up the back street and filed a bill of sale, "for value received," of the Hatchet Printery, dated March 24, 1899, to T. W. Tompkins.

The subscription books were included in this instrument, but they have since been hypothecated by Craig to another party, so it is said. Mr. Marsh, now has charge of the property which Craig had received from the Type Founders' Co. as lessee, and he will continue the publication of the paper the name of the Forest Grove Times.

MONUMENT COMMITTEE
APPOINTED BY MAYOR

Will solicit funds for shaft in Court yard.

REPRESENTATIVE BODY OF CITIZENS

Thought that at least Five Hundred Dollars will be raised.

In pursuance of the spirit of the meeting called at the court house May 1, Mayor Barrett has issued the following open letter which explains itself:

"Pursuant to a resolution unanimously adopted at public meeting held in the Court House at Hillsboro, Oregon, on May 1st, 1899, (Dewey's Day) to appoint a committee to solicit subscriptions and collect funds for the erection of a monument in the public square of Washington county, in memory of the soldiers from this county who have lost their lives in the war with Spain, I have selected the following committee:

"Hillsboro—Prof. M. C. Case, Cashier A. C. Shute and Hon. W. D. Hare; Forest Grove—Senator E. W. Haines, Dr. C. L. Large and Melki Johnson; Cornelius—J. C. Buchanan, late a private of the 2d Oregon; Beaverton—F. W. Cady; Reedville—J. W. Karstetter; Greenville—L. M. Moore; Buxton—Chas. Peterson; Gales Creek—A. C. Sargeant; Dilley—Representative Abner Briggs; Gaston—C. A. Raymond; Laurel—J. A. Mesinger; Farmington—John Rogge; Scholls—Ferd Gruner; Middleton—Chas. Ashpole; Sherwood—J. C. Smock; Tualatin—Representative J. R. C. Thompson; Cedar Mills—C. H. Reeves; Bethany—John Wismer; Glencoe—E. E. Mays; Mountaineer—A. K. Watson; Tigardville—C. F. Tigard.

"I urge that the Committee take this matter in charge, and trust that as a result of their labor, the names of the brave boys from this county, who in defense of their country's flag, lost their lives in the war with Spain, may be honored by the erection of a monument that will be a credit to the patriotism of the citizens of Washington county."

THOMAS HAINES, OF
LAUREL, ARRESTED

And arraigned on three Criminal Charges.

MADE ASSAULT ON JOHN MASTERS

The trouble followed a church disturbance Sunday evening.

Thomas Haines, a young man of about 20, and who resides at Laurel, was arrested Tuesday evening by Constable Sappington, on three charges preferred against him by John Masters, prosecuting witness.

It seems that the start off was occasioned by young Haines visiting the Evangelical church last Sunday evening, where he was reproved by Mr. Masters for a supposed disturbance of the meeting. Tuesday afternoon Haines went down to Masters' place, called him out to the fence, and the prosecuting witness says, struck him with what he supposed was a billy-club, but which, later on, proved to be a quirt, a short leather whip.

The mix-up was general and Mr. Masters sustained a bad looking eye and visage, while young Haines had no picnic countenance when he got through with it. Constable Sappington went out that evening and arrested him. He was brought before Judge Smith and waived examination on two charges, one for disturbing a religious meeting, the other, carrying a concealed weapon. Deputy Dist. Atty. Bagley has also filed an information charging him with assault with a dangerous weapon, which will be investigated by the grand jury. Justice Smith fixed the bonds at \$800 and the defendant will remain in the bastille until the security is signed. E. R. Gregory is defending the defendant.

STATE MONUMENT.

To the people of Washington Co.: If there are any who desire to contribute to the building of the State Monument for the Oregon soldiers who have died in the Spanish-American war, they will please turn in their contribution by the 20th of this month, as it is desired to close up the matter here. This monument is going to be built, and the names of Washington Co.'s dead will be inscribed upon it. If the people of Washington County do not want to be represented in the building of it, they have a right to consult their feelings in the matter, but it was thought proper that one more opportunity should be given.

The Hook & Ladder and Vulcan Engine companies met at the department rooms last night and voted to disband. Immediately there after the twenty five members of both companies present voted to reorganize into a single company, known as the Hillsboro Fire Department. W. V. Wiley, the regular elected chief, was again elected as chief of the Department. A committee of four, L. A. Long, H. Schulmerich, J. B. Wilks and E. E. Colestock, was appointed to draft a constitution and report Wednesday evening, May 17. The two companies, thus consolidated, will make a good department.

There are several hundred wheels yet to be heard from.
