COMMERCIALISM VS PRODUCTION.

The producer of the world has become the legitimate prey of commercialism, and paradoxical as it may appear, the producer himself has by his acquiescence, hastened the closing of the meshes. For hundreds of years England has been pursuing a system of gradual product debasement, because, to her, it has been a business proposition. Commercialists in Britain have controlled for years, against the protests of her little band of producers. In the main, the movement then was one of economic fitness, for her home holders who produced were in a great minority.

On the other hand, just why the producers of the rest of Europe, and those of America, who are largely in the majority, should without intelligent protest, allow legislation to cripple their efforts, is a strange anomaly on the eternal fitness of things.

The fact is, the commercial classes and labor elements of the east always welcome cheap farm product—cheap as measured in money. They stand, as a rule, together, and by their sophistries, make a part of the farmers believe that they need an "honest dollar" in their business. This "honest dollar" is that dollar which will buy the most of what the farmer produces. Profitable production is a straight up and down business proposition and one that appeals to the intelligence of producers generally. But, notwithstanding the cheap product advocates always stand united, irrespective of party alliance, we find farmers irrevocably divided by party. This pleases the debased product advocates, for without this division, a decent level of farm product prices would prevail.

Not content with monetary legislation, the commercialists have driven another nail in the producers' coffin in the matter of trusts. What they turn out, they want "protected" and "trusted," that competition may be thwarted, enabling them to control the price of that which the farmer buys as well as that which the farmer sells.

There is but one relief for American producers and that is to allow themselves to practice the tactics of their commercial antagonists—stand together for honest product. Farmers, unless they want their property and product debased, must not divide. They must vote on "business lines," for their own uplifting. They must listen not to demagogues who flatter themselves that the producer is simple enough to believe product cheapening a good thing. In 1900 we must elect a president. Let the farmer cast a business vote—one for an American monetary system and one for the crushing of trusts, money trust, manufacturing trust, and all the trusts.

DEWEY AND HIS GUNS.

If Dewey is half the American the Americans believe him to be, he will earn the "donation" some of our dollar rich have planned for him. Admiral Dewey has been enjoying a fairly good salary for a number of years and his prudence and sagacity in naval affairs are indicative that he has prepared for a rainy day. If he shall have not so prepared, he is yet drawing a good round salary, and a year or so of service will provide him for the future. This slush and sentimentalism which would reward duty with outward effects over and above what generous regulations supply, is one of those untoward evidences of beefy Americanism that should long since have decayed. Our government never "half-pays" its officers. They are always

well remunerated. Give a brave man a decent salary and all the honors his actions deserve, remember him with gratitude of heart, and let things go at that. With this review of the situation, coupled with the hope that Dewey will train his forward guns on that \$100 dinner, let us get ready to receive him as become Americans—not as Hottentots would a returning conqueror from a fresh scalp dance.

DISSENSION AT HOME

The laymen are disagreeing with the military in Mr. McKinley's celebrated Philippine commission. The laymen desire to give the Philippines a decent sort of government, while the military are for militarism, pure and simple. This is not surprising, as the sentiment for subjugation of the "savages" was not of much growth until nursed by the fellows who want to see us a military power—not from pure and patriotic motives, but from pure and unadulterated desire for a general and sweeping system of army promotions. The laymen will hardly prevail, as the trust interests generally are with the shoulder knots in sentiment as well as sympathy.

The offer, however, to the insurgents, is ample evidence that the administration has heard something drop. A month ago it was "exterminate the Filipinos." Now it is peace upon the footing of giving the "savages" the right to select their own legislature. The administration tells them we will appoint a governor-general and cabinet. Here is a splendid chance Weyler.

RANT OF THE DEMAGOGUE.

"The cheap money craze of 1896 was so violent that it took considerable courage and decision of character to withstand it. Men who had these qualities, in both parties, resisted it, but the demagogues of all parties took advantage of it. They had so little confidence in the sense of their fellow-countrymen that they imagined the black flag of debased money would be a winning banner. The country discredited them then, and it will discredit them again—Oregonian."

Such rant is of much importance, for it is an argument that appeals to no one but the fool. The fact of the matter is the "black flag" is on the Oregonian side of the political family, in a double sense. The black flag of debased product and cheap Americanism, supported by the intelligent Oregonian, was successful, but it did not receive the ballots of a majority of the American producers, nor did it even receive a majority of our Caucasian vote. That majority was, the unsuccessful, polled by those who were fighting against the dishonored banner which read "debased Americanism and an 'honest' dollar." Producers may take their choice as to which banner they are under. It is merely a question of product debased, or money debased, and the rant of the intelligent demagogue cannot cover the issue.

NO CAUSE FOR ALARM.

Determination upon a system of government for the Philippines is for congress. Meanwhile the administration and its committees should go slow in making pledges—Oregonian.

Thus it is seen that the presidential committee in the Philippines is rather treading upon the toes of intentions cherished, and the members are cautioned to "go slow" by the only real able, paper of the pugillist element in the northwest. The Oregonian need not worry about pledges and the like. Pledges by the powers that be amount to nothing—not a snap of a finger. This pledge, or promise, to give the Philippines autonomy, therefore, is worthless. It is a simple backslide from the imperial Spanish proposition of government which was meeting with violent opposition by thousands of the rank and file of republicans. It is not to be inferred, however, that the Oregonian need fear for this little element of weakness in the presidential creature, the committee in Luzon. Until congress meet, the president is all—and he can easily be swayed by the real strength behind the executive chair—the trusts and combines manufacturing and monetary. When the test comes the Oregonian will find the president where the Oregonian wants him.

Let the brawny young men of Hillsboro join the fire department. It is an institution of which the city may well be proud, an organized effort at a fire all-ways excels promiscuous labor no matter how well intentioned the latter may be.

Russell Alger, of Michigan, evidently has no desire to act as a scape-goat for the administration and he will not retire from war portfolio. Mr. Alger evidently

recognizes that he is as good as any of his fellows in political authority and he doesn't propose to break the circle.
