A NINE MONTHS' TERM NEXT YEAR.

Everything working in harmony.
School building to be repainted.

The Board of Directors met the other day and hired the present corps of teachers for the next term of the Hillsboro public school, to commence sometime in September. The teachers are: Prof. M. C. Case, Superintendent; Mrs. D. J. Elliott, seventh grade; Miss Grace Boscow, sixth; Miss Minnie Osmond, fifth; Miss Lulu Mann, fourth; Miss Lucy Humphreys, third; Miss Rose Wilcox, second and Mrs. Pittenger, the primary. Prof. Case has been twenty years in the teachers' field and has averaged ten months to the year. He is a graduate of the Michigan Normal at Ypsilanti, and afterward took a post graduate course. The balance of the corps are all well known Washington county teachers. Graduating exercises will take place Friday evening, June 2, 1899, at the court house, where an interesting program will be given the patrons of the school.

The next year's school term will be nine months and it is questionable whether or not the district will return to a shorter term. The school building will be repainted during vacation and the grounds made as homelike as possible. The district is rapidly forging out of debt and everything is moving along smoothly.

JOHN MICHALEC DEAD.

John Michalec, a well known young man of this place, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Thomas Gheen, Saturday evening, May 20, 1899, of consumption. He was born in Kameniec, Bohemia, Austria, May 21, 1862, and lacked but a few hours of seeing his 37th year. He leaves four sisters, Mrs. Anna Honzik, Mrs. Francis Gheen, Mrs. Ludea Anderson, of Hillsboro, Mrs. Antoine Stephens, Portland, and one brother, Rudolph Michalec, of Sheridan, to mourn his loss. The remains were interred in the Odd Fellows' cemetery, Monday. Michalec was a steady industrious young man, and was universally esteemed.

SATURDAY NIGHT HOLD-UP.

Two highwaymen held up W. G. Glenn, of Forest Grove, a student in Pacific university, as he was going to his room at 11 o'clock Saturday night, and relieved him of his watch and chain and \$34 in coin. They stepped from a dark alleyway as Glenn was passing Water's feed store, on Pacific ave., and presented a revolver at his head with the command, "hold up your duke!" Then they went through his pockets, though one had exclaimed when he first got sight of the victim's face that he was the wrong man. The robbers were strangers, and made no further attempt at concealment than having their hats pulled low on their foreheads. They had but one revolver between them, and one was evidently a novice for he showed great agitation. They were both of medium height. One was heavy set with black mustache and hair, and the other of slender build, with a smooth face. Both wore overalls. The sheriff's deputies are busy investigating.—Oregonian.

The case of State vs Thomas Haines was yesterday tried by a jury for the second time. About midnight the jury brought in a verdict of acquittal. This was Haines' second trial, the first jury having disagreed. The trial was held in the circuit court room, Judge W. D. Smith presiding. Hon. T. H. Tongue was for the defense, and Frank Klinem, n. assisted deputy H. T. Bagley in the prosecution. During the examination of witness Rev. C. Crow, an Evangelical minister, Congressman Tongue made a remark to H. T. Bagley that he might ask any question that he liked as the court had ruled that he might ask that (referring to a question over which objection had been made) or any other question. The court reminded Mr. Tongue that he had made no such ruling, and that if he were not careful he would fine him for contempt. Mr. Tongue replied, "this court can start in with an action of that kind whenever he sees fit." Judge Smith thereupon fined him \$10, and in default to be imprisoned 5 days. The fine was not paid and a commitment was issued. It appears that Constable Redmond would not serve the commitment and he was fined \$25. As the commitment was in clerical error this latter fine was remitted. Deputy Sheriff Deichman was then sent for and given the commitment. Mr. Tongue immediately procured from Judge Rod a stay of commitment until a review of proceedings could be heard. It seems that the word "court" appeared in the commitment papers, where "jail" should have been written. Court then adjourned until after dinner, when the case again went to trial.

Horsemen are reporting a new disease going the rounds amongst horses, called gangrenous dermatitis. It is reported that one horse on the North Plains was infected, but prompt treatment effected a cure. It seems the disease first attacks the horse where the hair and hoof unite and from that point it continues to spread. If not treated at the very first, the case can not be cured. The disease is in the nature of an inflammation, gangrenous mortification setting in, hence its name. Virtually, it resolves itself into blood poisoning. It is held by many veterinarians to be not contagious, but Dr. F. A. Bailey, of this city, thinks it highly infectious, as he is of the opinion that it is microbic in its origin. Upon attack, the animal should at once be isolated.

FIRE ALARM LAST FRIDAY EVENING.

A Fire alarm was turned in about 8:30 Friday evening last and the department called out to extinguish a blaze in the Holcomb residence on the corner of Baseline and First streets. A young man who carries the mail between this place and Cedar Mill stops in the house over night, and had left his blankets hanging over a chair close to the fire place. The fabric soon ignited and the smoke gave the first notice of the blaze. Station agent Friswell was the first on the scene and had the thing well under way when the fire apparatus arrived. Water was soon turned on and the fire extinguished. The loss was not to exceed \$500. The building is worth five or six hundred dollars. The department made excellent time in answer to the alarm and water connection was never quicker made.

Sheriff E. L. Matlock, who captured the late Gus Wachline, and who was here at Wachline's trial, has left Heppner to go to Indianapolis for treatment. Mr. Matlock is troubled with tumors which have almost covered his body.

It was reported here this morning that Melki Johnson, Forest Grove's popular real estate man, suffered a paralytic stroke and was not expected to live. Several unsuccessful attempts at telephone communication were made, but no corroboration of the rumor was received.

Dr. S. T. Linklater last night attended the banquet given at the Hotel Portland by British born residents and invited guests in honor of the 80th birth anniversary of Queen Victoria. The Dr. reports a splendid time and some fine toasts and addresses.

Sheriff Bradford's condition, according to the report of his physician, is much improved. The ailment is serious effusion of the base of the brain, superinduced by exhaustion. He is now much freer from pain and is taking nourishment right along. He spends nearly three-quarters of his time in sleep and is the best natured patient imaginable. There never has been any necessity for more than one nurse and he needs but little more than simple care from his attendant. His many friends will be pleased that his chances for recovery are encouraging.

Hon. S. B. Huston returned from Heppner last Thursday evening, where he won a \$2700 case for a client by the name of J. M. O. Spencer. Spencer was an heir to an estate which went to probate 21 years ago. It appears that the first bondsmen of the administrator were subsequently released and a new set procured. The county judge who released the first sureties, was one of the bondsmen. The administrator subsequently defaulted and left the state and after several attempts to collect from the bondsmen, Mr. Huston was employed and commenced suit against both set of bondsmen, winning his case upon the illegality of a county judge, releasing the bond upon which he was a surety. The case was settled at once and the \$2,700 paid over. Mr. Huston, it is said, received \$1000 for his retainer.

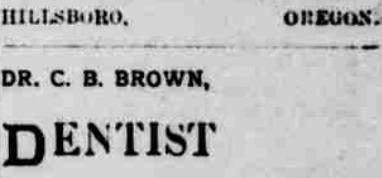
