OUR SOLDIER DEAD.

Decoration Day, 1899, is now history. The day has an added significance this year over those of the past, for there are newer dead over whom to sorrow and remember. The practice of meeting once each year and offer devotion to the memory of those who have lost their lives in their country's service is an ennobling one. Go back in memory to that little handful of Americans who offered up their lives that a republic might be established; go back to the sixties when thousands of Americans gave their lives that this republic might be perpetual; then come down to the war just closed and you will find that Memorial Day has a broader significance. The Spanish war was the occasion of a sentiment inspired by a closer bond of union than our nation has heretofore enjoyed. It started as a war for human liberation and we have every reason to honor those who lost their lives in this trouble with a spirit as devout and pride as deep as do we those who passed away in the conflicts of the long ago.

The soldier dead of our country have never before had so universal a national memorial as in the year 1899, for the south, as well, has a common cause in the offering up her sons in the latest conflict. This universal sentiment of sorrow and glory has made memorial day more sacred and more national. Sectionalism is swept away and the nation's true heart mourns over the wounds of our revolutionary fathers; the wounds of our defenders in 1812; the resting places of the Mexican war veterans, the slabs sacred to the memory of those who wore the blue, and later, those who struck and lost their lives for the benefit of those who were not of us. And, for those who wore the gray and died, the tear for them has no touch of bitterness from him who wore the blue. It is well.

THE INDIAN WAR VETERAN.

The Argus is pleased to note that it is receiving hearty support from the interior press, generally, upon the original proposition of this paper to have the states of Washington and Oregon at once pension the Indian war veterans. The Argus wants to see every candidate for the legislature in either state pledged to this act of tardy justice. Our old defenders are certainly entitled to a pension; they deserve it; and it is not right; not loyal; not generous; and not patriotic to longer delay a recognition so worthy and so exigent. Let these sister states remember the old Indian war veterans; and at once. They are passing away one by one, neglected to the last; forgotten insofar as a proper conception of the valorous defense is concerned. Let us make their last days easier and if congress see fit to give the two states relief, it shall be well. If not, we shall have had the satisfaction of having, altho' tardily, discharged an obligation sacred to our honor as states.

THE HEX BRAND.

According to the ethics of our ranting expansionists, there are no "degrees" in the matter of imperialism. A man must be either an imperialist or a "traitor." These absurd creatures who are so eager to rush into print and charge treason so readily, are, generally speaking, at home, and it is noticeable that a few officers, swelling for military aid in the cry. Mr. McKinley's own commission to the Philippines is divided. The politicians—hence

administrations—are divided and those who favor giving the Filipino a trifle of home power, are branded by their fire eating (at home) brothers as milkops. What our imperialists really want is a large militarism and expansive government—a government by Krag-Jorgensens. They want a big army, for this will make plenty of government debt. They want to keep the tax paying classes down. They would like to make the ordinary citizen "advance and give the countersign" when going to the country postoffice or to the cross-roads grocery. This would smack of empire; of olden times; of huge debt, etc.; of rulers, and by the way, of a blind, dumb citizenship, one easily to be handled by the jewcraft.

DEWEY, CHIEF!

Dewey is coming home at his leisure. Dewey is right. He wants to wait until the fawning, flattering flappodules, fry in their own suspense. Dewey has some sense. He is not a mouth fighter. He is not a Hobson. He realizes that he has drawn a good round salary for many years that he might be able to direct vessels and guns if it should come. He did what a commander should do, no more, no less. That he is, however, above other commanders, is shown by the fact that he isn't always throwing bouquets at himself.

They are afraid of the next election and want the money issue out of the way. They are howling about "imperialism" and with choking sobs, tell us how our opposition is treason. They urge civilization of our Filipinos—and they are ours for did not we buy them at two dollars per head, Aguinaldo and all—and tell us it is a shame to not extend to them the beauties of Americanism? But they are finding that America's producers are not worrying about the Filipinos. Taking their own words for it, the Filipino is too ornery to worry over. The producer is wanting a profitable level of prices and desires to strike a blow at the trust machine now in control of the administration. The producers realize that the bankers have in control the managers of the republican party, and the rank and file of that party are getting tired of low prices for all producers must sell and high prices for all they must buy. The revulsion of feeling is getting to be serious and it is no wonder our trust organs are growing desperate in their methods.

the recent fine imposed upon the Representative of the first district, by Judge Smith. The little saint was too smart to show up any alleged discrepancy by comparison. In the statement published by the Hatcher, the proceedings were distorted beyond measure. Judge Smith and H. T. Bagley and many others who were present at the incident, all corroborate the version as given in both the Argus and the Oregonian. The Hatcher simply had on a case of tuft hunting.
