GUILTY OF TREASON.

What a devilish treasonable thing it is to allow our volunteers to return home before the Filipinos have been whipped! What grave error is it which prompts our administration friends to so far forget imperialism and wanton destruction of volunteers to gain Oriental territory, as to commit them to a weak policy of quitting? Or, have they discovered the volunteer is not the man to stand up as a sacrifice that a few office seekers and military nincompoops may grow shoulder knots and wax fat?

The administration has doubtless discovered that there is no reason why the lives of volunteers for one cause should ruthlessly be forced into subjugating a lot of chateaus, and they are to be released. There are enough men who are willing to fight as so much per fight even if the fight be no labor of love. These are the men who should be put into the Filipino swamps and made targets for the mauser bullets and malarial fevers, and President McKinley has at last recognized the fact and is to send the volunteers home. Now when the recruiting officers report slack enlistments let our little cantankerous 2x4 journalistic expounders of expansion march up and take their place for transportation as Malay fighters, or forever hold their peace.

NO CHEAP AMERICANS.

There need be no fear but what the fight of 1900 will be lined up as it was in 1896, when the friends of debased product spent millions of dollars to elect their administration. The democrats will not falter and they will again voice the cry for a decent level of averages between the output of the farmer and the money it must buy. This is a business proposition entirely, and one that has nothing to do with party names. The debased product advocates may be either republican or democrat, but they have voted the same ticket when the success of the money-crats was wanted. Their hope of success in 1900 is in the probability of their dividing the votes of those who do not want cheap, base unprofitable farm output. Here lies their only chance. It will be a battle royal—the trusts, the advocates of cheap farm production, the dear dollar advocates, the advocates of fifty-cent wheat and low wool and cotton, as against those whose betterment lies in the restoration of the decent price level. The imperialistic proposition will not change the issue.

THE REAL REASON:

The real reason why our monopoly organs have been lately proclaiming that the silver issue was killed in 1896, is very apparent. These contractionists are simply working upon the credulity of the masses. They realize that the Hanna power must liquidate heavily in order to win in 1900. They know that the ticket can not be pulled through with a merely political management and expenditure of money. They fear the vote of the producer, and they want to do away with Bryan and get the old Whitney-Hill combination in control of the next democratic convention. Knowing the futility of open assault upon those who want product not debased, they allege that democracy is sure to win if the silver plank be discarded. They do this to throw the watchful off guard. They simply are up to their old tricks—to have control of both political parties and get their desired monetary legislation no matter how goes the election.

The tactics will not work. The democratic party will stand for bimetalism and there will be no de-

generacy. There will be no control of the true democracy by the Whitney-Hills. The rank and file of Americans, regardless of party, republican democratic, or populist, do not want product debased, and they will not have it debased. Bryan, if he live, will lead the people in 1900—and, we hope, to victory. But he must do this against the rich and powerful; against those who are he debased directly and indirectly by a low scale of values for everything but money and manufactured articles. He must meet the combined opposition of the money trust and the manufacturing trusts, with all their millions of a corruption fund.

VALE, JERRY!

Sockless Jerry Simpson has gone republican! Thank God for that! Our republican managers will now love whiskers and unwashed pedes, to their heart's content. No more shall we hear of the sockless son-of-a-gun, as a "pop." He is now a patriot of the Mark Hanna school; a statesman from Goose Run; a shining example of the palladium of good government, and—but let him go, and God bless him for his action.

Let no citizen deceive himself that Lyman J. Gage's rag baby dollar is dead. It is only sleeping. The bank patriots are rather loth to keep the thing dangling before the public, but it is to be resurrected as soon as it is safe to do so.

Altho' it is traitorous to say so, The Spanish-American war has not been void of signal and singular achievements. It has introduced to a sensation-loving public, Brother Abner McKinley; it has shown us that charity and the beef trust is over all—in the retiring of Egan on \$7,500 per year as a disgrace; it has evolved from obscurity a kissing Hobson, the only man who could successfully gratify, in an oscillatory way, Honolulu belles; and it has also given ten million "savages" at a nominal cost of but two dollars each.

The Indian war veterans have pledged themselves to vote for no candidate for congress who shall not advocate pensions for them. This amounts to nothing, in the light of the past. Candidates for congress and political platforms are always pledging these old veterans their rightful aid, but they never get it. The thing to do is for Washington and Oregon to state pension these old veteran defenders, and at once. Then push congress for a relief bill and let the nation assume the pay roll.

The democratic party could get the money it needs for a presidential campaign if it will let the corporations write its platform. It is not going to be sold out, however, as the "cheap product" people desire. Base farm production is not American, and the democrats need expect no support from producers if they lock arms with the combinations and money trust. There is already one monopoly party. That is enough. If we are to have monopoly rule, let us support the Hanna ticket from the first.

There is considerable complaint going the rounds that the Woodmen of the World ran an excursion into Portland on Memorial Day and gave a series of entertainments, the net proceeds of which are to go towards building a state monument for the Oregon dead of the war just ended. The probability is that the Woodmen meant no discourtesy to the G. A. R., whatever, and in all likelihood they thought the Decoration Day of the future would be an universal date upon which decorating and mourning services could be divided in memory of the dead of both the war of the 60's and the later war.

AFTER all, the Bradley-Martins, wealthy New Yorkers with bonds to clip, did quite the proper thing when they recently became subjects of Great Britain. They spent the most of their time, socially, tuffthunting in England, while the male members of the family preached base product. Some sense of the amenities of such a paradoxical course is apparently in them, for they have done the right thing, and that which is consistent with their desires. May the good Lord instruct more of their ilk.
