

TWO DISASTROUS FIRES
WITHIN THE WEEK

A. O. Brown Loses his Residence and Contents.

J. ASBAHR, BARN AND CONTENTS.

Each Fire is Thought to Have had Accidental Origin.

Two disastrous fires have occurred south of the Tualatin river in this county within the past week. The first one occurred Wednesday, June 14, when the residence of A. O. Brown, of Iowa Hill, burned with all its contents. Mr. Brown was in the city last Friday, and says that the fire started about three in the afternoon, and that he and his wife were in the garden at the time. A thirteen-year-old boy whom Mr. Brown had taken from the Orphans' Home, told them he had seen a man running from the place a few minutes before the fire occurred, but Mr. Brown does not think it probable that he had any enemy who would burn him out. The gathering of fifty yards were swept away and the proprietor was loading up with new household goods Friday. There was no insurance and Mr. Brown estimates his loss at over a thousand dollars. A fine library, the collection of years, was included in the loss.

ASBAHR'S BARN DESTROYED.

The fine frame barn and windmill of Julius Asbahr, South Tualatin, was razed to the ground Sunday afternoon, the fire probably having been accidentally started by some little children who were playing in the structure.

Mr. Asbahr had a visitor, whose horse was in the barn and burned along with the building. About ten tons of baled hay, all of the farm machinery, tools, etc., went up in flames, the total loss being estimated by Mr. Asbahr as exceeding eleven hundred dollars. He carried \$600 insurance in the Bethany organization mentioned a few weeks ago in THE ARGUS. He will build in the near future.

ORIGIN OF FIRES UNKNOWN.

Neither Brown nor Asbahr know the cause of the fires. Each thinks his loss was due to accident. In the case of the barn, the blaze must have been started by matches ignited by children.

FARMINGTON LADY IS
VERY BADLY INJURED

Jumped Through a Bridge to Save her Life.

ACCIDENT AT TREESTLE NO. FIVE

Fell Eighteen Feet and Injured her hip. Rendered Unconscious.

Miss Mattie Viehl, of Farmington, met with a serious accident at trestle No. 5, on the West Side division of the Southern Pacific, at 5:50 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Miss Viehl jumped through the bridge to escape being run over by a train of cars. She fell a distance of 18 feet. Her hip is badly injured, and the left leg is shortened about two inches.

Miss Viehl, in company with her friend, Miss Clara Hildebrandt, was strolling across the trestle. When they reached a point near the center, an engine and station car came whizzing around the bend and bore rapidly down upon the two young ladies. There was no warning bell or whistle and the locomotive was fairly upon them before they realized their danger.

Miss Hildebrandt was the first to notice the approaching train, and, shouting to her companion to run for her life, she started for the far end of the bridge. She was barely able to make it. Miss Viehl, however, became frightened, and when the engine was not more than a dozen feet away, she gathered her skirts around her and dropped between the ties. She was picked up in an unconscious condition and carried to the residence of Henry T. Hildebrandt, 248 Hamilton avenue, and Dr. J. H. Bristow was summoned to attend to her injuries.

Miss Viehl was very seriously injured about the hip. Dr. Bristow has been unable to locate any fracture, however. She is considerably bruised about the body, and there is a bad gash cut in her forehead—Tuesday's Oregonian.
