

CIRCUIT COURT IS IN SESSION THIS WEEK

Damage Case of Casteel vs. Mill Co.

TAKEN ON A PECULIAR PHASE.

Craig, of the Hatchet, has his Demurrer Overruled. Thirty Days to Answer.

Circuit Court convened Monday with Hon. T. A. McBride on the bench. The following cases were taken up:

Jeannie Reed vs O Johnson et al; Oregon Mortgage Company substituted as party plaintiff in the case with privilege to file supplemental complaint setting forth its interest.

Peter Wikander vs George Thiel; settled and dismissed.

American Type Founders' Co. vs Austin Craig; demurrer over-ruled and defendant allowed thirty days in which to file his answer.

Lottie A Robinson vs N C Wall et al; dismissed upon motion of the plaintiff's attorney.

Elizabeth Jackson vs Ellen and W R Jackson; dismissed without cost.

The case of Charles F. Casteel vs. the Tualatin Mill Company, for damages for broken leg by reason of defective machinery, has taken on a new phase, which is explained by the following entry of the clerk, made last Monday morning: "Received from John T. Whalley, attorney for plaintiff, in the case of Casteel vs. Tualatin Mill Company, a corporation, \$150 as a retainer to defendants for the amount paid by them to plaintiff, without the consent of plaintiff's attorney, in settlement of this case."

C E Runyon, court reporter, appointed as referee to take testimony in Henrietta Mostert vs Henry Mostert, suit for divorce. Default entered in case of Emma Marks vs Robert Marks, and same order as to referee.

J Thornburn Ross was given foreclosure judgment against Augusta and Albert Chivill for \$550 and interest and \$120.08 further costs.

Wilhelm Ott was granted divorce from Marianna Ott for want of answer.

Other judgments were: W A Baer vs A and Phoebe Goddard \$148.30; A Johnson vs F T Berry \$300 and costs; Geo R Bagley vs O Johnson and J F Col; Sarah E Smith vs W M McLeod.

Burleigh R Dozier vs Lillie R. Dozier, divorce; plaintiff ordered to pay to defendant's attorneys the sum of \$50.00, to enable her to make defense. Trial set for July 27th.

T H Tongue vs W D Smith and C W Redmond, appeal from contempt proceedings; H T Bagley entered on journal as attorney for Justice Smith.

THOMAS CLEMENS INSTANTLY KILLED

Fell From a Wagon Load of Wood.

WHEELS PASSED OVER HIS HEAD.

He Was a Steady Industrious Fellow. Brother of Mrs. George Ireland.

Early Tuesday morning Thomas Clemens met with a violent death while driving a wagon-load of wood from the yard of J. C. Hare's saw-mill. As near as can be ascertained Clemens must have fallen off the load while it was descending the hill leading to the bridge. Two of the wheels of the wagon passed over his head, crushing his skull, and killing him instantly. He was found a few minutes after the accident. The team had gone on to the top of the hill and stopped, a little off the main road.

Dr. F. A. Bailey, at the request of Coroner Large, visited the scene of the accident and examined the remains of the deceased. He then gave out the following sworn statement: "That he came to his death by reason of an extensive comminuted fracture of the bones of the skull and consequent injury to the brain; that his death occurred on the road leading from said mill to Hillsboro, in Washington county, Ore., about 8 or 9 o'clock, a. m., on the 18th day of July, 1899."

Deceased was born June 10, 1871, in Washington county, near Farmington. He leaves a father and two brothers, who live east of the mountains; four sisters, Mrs. George Ireland, of this city, Mrs. Jacob Gibson, Portland, Mrs. Lloyd Ingram, Farmington, and Miss Fanny Clemens, of Portland.

Mr. Clemens has been working for J. C. Hare for many months, and his wife has been conducting the mill kitchen. Mrs. Clemens is a daughter of M. Dillaboy. He leaves no children. The remains were interred in the Farmington cemetery yesterday.

Thursday, hemorrhage of the lungs set in and he died shortly afterwards. Mr. Lewis was a native of Anglesey, Wales, and was about 56 years of age. He had lived in Portland about 20 years. He has one brother in Portland, John Lewis, and a brother and sister in Wales. The funeral took place Saturday.

Alphonso Wardle, aged about 24 years, died at the residence of Joseph Connell, near Glencoe, Tuesday morning July 18, 1899, about 7:00 o'clock, of brain fever. Deceased had the grip several months ago and never fully recovered from its effects. He was industrious and had been with Mr. Connell for some time. His mother is dead and his father resides in Chehalis county, Wash. He has two brothers at McMinnville and one at Carrollton. The remains were shipped to the Carrollton brother for burial, Wednesday.

FATAL ACCIDENT NEAR LEISYVILLE

Geo. Sinclair was Killed This Morning.

WAGON PASSED OVER HIS BODY.

Leaves a Wife and Seven Children. One son is at Grants.

George Sinclair, a hardworking farmer residing about two miles north of this city, near Leisyville, started to town this morning on a load of cordwood. Just as he was driving out of his lane into the highway, one of the bridges became disarranged. Sinclair stepped off the load, down on the tongue. The horses started and he fell under the load. One of the wheels ran over the small of his back and another passed over his left chest. The team ran on down the road a few hundred yards and stopped. Sinclair was soon after picked up and taken to the house. Dr. S. T. Licklater was sent for, who upon arrival, noting the critical condition of the dying man, sent for Dr. F. A. Bailey for consultation. Death occurred about 11:00, a few hours after the accident, the result of internal injuries, the pleura being badly ruptured. He leaves a wife, five sons and two daughters. One of the sons, Geo. E. Sinclair, is at Grants.

Sinclair has been in Washington county twenty years. He is a native of the Orkney Islands, north of Scotland. In his early youth he was a sailor and once suffered a shipwreck off the extreme northeast coast of Labrador. He was aged about 55 years. For several years he worked for John Milne. His funeral will take place tomorrow.

The deceased was conscious until nearly the last, and seemed to know he was about to pass away. A short time before death he asked E. F. McNelly to pray for him. The family is disconsolate over the loss of the husband and father.
