

ANOTHER FATAL HUNTING ACCIDENT

Gun in Hands of Jay Ornduff Discharges.

OTIS WHITMORE SHOT THRO' LUNG.

Injured Man Died a Few Hours Later. Leaves Wife and Three Children.

Another fatal hunting accident is chronicled—this time the fatality occurred near Laurel, south of this city. Otis Whitmore, aged about 28 years, and Jay Ornduff, just a few years past his majority, were out hunting Sunday and each took a shot at a grouse. When the bird was brought to the ground, the hunters approached, Whitmore being a short distance in the lead. Ornduff commenced to reload his gun, and the cartridge did not enter the chamber freely. He forced the shell in as far as he could and then snapped the gun into position. The force exploded the cartridge and the load of shot took effect in Whitmore's back, entering one of his lungs. Ornduff gave the alarm and a Newburg physician, and Dr. S. T. Linklater, of Hillsboro, sent for. When Linklater arrived, the unfortunate man had passed away, death taking place about 7:00 in the evening. The accident occurred during the afternoon. Whitmore leaves a wife and three children. He was industrious and held the esteem of a large circle of friends. Young Ornduff was one of his closest friends and the fatality has nearly prostrated him.

Mr. Whitmore was a cousin to Jacob Whitmore, the Laurel hop man.

ANOTHER EARLY PIONEER GONE TO REST

Wm. Connell Died at Portland, Monday.

HE CAME TO OREGON IN 1822.

Was a Citizen of Sterling Qualities. Died from Paralysis.

William Connell, an old-time resident of Portland, died of paralysis, Monday morning, at his home, 201 West Park street. He had been failing for some time, and his death was not unexpected. Mr. Connell was born in Ireland, in 1822. He was engaged in business in Portland a number of years, but of late had devoted himself to his fine farm near Hillsboro, in which he took a great deal of pride. He was one of the oldest and most prominent members of Taylor-street Methodist Episcopal church, Portland, and his long life was conspicuous for kindness and charity.

Two sons and two daughters, all grown, survive him: Thos. Connell, a prominent business man of Portland, and owner of the Connell farm west of this city; Margaret, wife of Mr. George Frazier, a Portland railroad man; Miss Mary Connell, Portland, and William Connell, who owns a fine ranch on Deere Island, below St. Helens. The funeral occurred Wednesday, at Portland.

WHEAT MARKET IS NOW IN THE DUMPS

Very Little Being Sold By Northwest Farmers.

HOPS ARE SLOW AT TEN CENTS.

And it Takes a Choice Article to Buy This Figure.

The Oregonian of this morning has the following to say of the wheat situation and the Portland price: "After several days of uninteresting sluggishness, the Liverpool cargo market yesterday dropped back to the wrong side of 30 shillings, and buyers were scarce at that figure. The unreasonable demands of shipowners prevented Oregon growers from securing much of the advantage of even a 30-shilling market, and now that cargoes are declining, and freights still holding their own, it is a difficult matter to do business on a basis which will admit of profit, as farmers prefer to borrow money and hold their wheat rather than sell at 36 cents per bushel, which is about the top price exporters would quote yesterday for f. a. q. Wain Wain. The future of prices, as usual, is largely a matter of guesswork. Latest advices from England were that farmers throughout the United Kingdom were satisfied with existing prices, and were marketing their grain, and that Argentina was also offering freely."

It is the following on the hop situation: "There is nothing doing in hops except the delivery of some of the new crop bought per contract several months ago. The market is lifeless, with buyers and sellers apart in their ideas of value. Ten cents is generally quoted as the top of the market, and it requires a very fine article to bring that figure."

Miss Baldrin was here about a year ago on a visit. She was a universal favorite and was noted for her kindly disposition. She leaves two sisters, Mrs. Milly Clark, Portland, Oregon, and Mrs. Mahlon Malone, now residing at Anaconda, Montana. Both parents are still alive.

The trial of Deputy Sheriff C. E. Deichman, charged with assaulting Mrs. Walker, who lives in the east end of town, was tried before Justice Humphreys this afternoon. The causes leading up to the trial were: A short time ago the wife of Wm. Walker sued for divorce in Yamhill county. The papers were served at the residence in Hillsboro, but the husband was away in Eastern Oregon. Hearing of his absence the young Mrs. Walker came down to get possession of a little son, which the father had left with his mother. She asked Deichman to go with her. He informed her that he could not go as an officer, except as to preserve the peace, but would go as a citizen witness to her demand. Judge Rood was asked to accompany, which he did. The two women had a sort of physical contest over the little chap, and Mr. Deichman alleges he took hold of the older Mrs. Walker to quiet the disturbance. The younger woman left without the child, and later on, the husband returning, arrest followed. Walker went to Deputy District Attorney Bagley to swear out the complaint, but that officer refused to have anything to do with the case. Private counsel, E. R. Gregory, was then employed. Smith & Bowman defended. Mr. Deichman was discharged.
