

WILL ADJUST TAX
ROLL TOMORROWCounty Board Will Put on
Finishing Touches.

SEVERAL MORE CITED TO APPEAR.

Will Hurry Roll Through to 'Get it to Salem.

The county board did not touch the tax roll last week, as contemplated, but got through with county business and adjourned to meet again tomorrow, when the matter of equalization will be carried to a close. Several more supposed delinquents have been cited to appear and will be asked why their assessments shall not be raised on money, notes and accounts. The roll will then be closed and sent to Salem for the adjustment of the state tax.

HARRIET STEEPLES BRADFORD.

Harriet D., wife of Sheriff W. D. Bradford, died at the family residence in this city at 11:30 Saturday morning, Nov. 11, 1899, after a week's illness of paralysis. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Perrin Steeples, and was born in Washington county, May 6, 1867. Her father was a pioneer of 1852, and from that date lived continuously in this county until his death, early in 1897. Mrs. Bradford was married December 31, 1885. Besides her husband, she left two sons, Elmo, aged 13, and Lester, aged 11. She was a member of the Hillsboro Red Cross and Emergency Corps, and took an active interest in affairs of public nature. The funeral took place from the residence Monday at 2 o'clock. Interment was in the Old Fellows' cemetery.

Mrs. Bradford leaves four brothers and three sisters: D. A. Steeples, Jr., Denver, Col.; C. S. Steeples, Gaylord, Montana; D. P. and M. C. Steeples, Hoquiam, Wash.; and Mrs. Lillie Burns, San Francisco, Cal. Mrs. Bradford was in apparent good health until the stroke came which ended fatally. She had fully recovered from a critical illness of several years ago. During Sheriff Bradford's recent illness she had been his almost hourly companion from last May until his recovery. Her prostration was therefore much of a surprise and her death a great shock to the family.

The floral offerings at the cemetery were profuse, and suggestive of the great regret over the loss of the wife and mother. Rev. E. P. Hughes conducted the funeral service.
