Of course they will be assisted by those newspapers which are controlled by politicians. VICIOUS, NOT VIRILE.

Portland's British residents do not propose to allow the general movement in aid of families bereaved in the Transvaal war to pass them by. A call for a meeting to discuss raising funds is printed in The Oregonian today. This universal response of British people everywhere in this hour of strain on the empire is a remarkable demonstration in virile patriotism. It sets an example of vigor and loyalty that puts to shame our own anti and Agnaldists.—Oregonian.

It is questionable; the above editorial. It is a sort of boyish declamation, such as one would expect from a cheese-headed logician. That thing which questions nothing and accepts blindly is not to be called "virile patriotism"—rather call it "vicious following." In the colonial days, when our rebel forefathers rightfully threw off the British yoke, they had many "virile patriots" here who were "loyal" to that royalty which incited Indians in all their horrors against the "rebel hordes." The best friends American founders ever had were the "anties" in England, who dared to assert that mankind had some rights in common—men who believed in justice—and they were lampooned as cowards and propagandists; called Agnaldists perhaps because they felt that Rebel Geo. Washington was honest in his desire for liberty. Sometimes a "virile and loyalty" of a government complexion is akin to that "virile and loyalty" witnessed in a gang of boot hunters. But it always pleases a puke to prate of "patriotism" and "purity." To conclude; of course there is no strain on the little Dutch band in the Transvaal; there are no families whose supporters are being shot by a great "humane" power—a power that is to the world of nations as a blunt bruising bully compares to a peaceable citizen of a decent precinct.

WANTED: A KING.

What we need in this country is a determined king with a strong army at his back. There is too much weakness here; too much of everybody's business about public affairs. This causes our administration much embarrassment and makes endless trouble. The idea of a republican or democratic form of government is fast becoming obsolete and should be relegated to the dark ages. People talk too much; they think too much and incite others to think; this should be stopped. When favorites in high places steal a few millions there is an indecent clamor coming from the fool populace asking that punishment follow. People are always questioning the wisdom of our greatest men in power and making it very disagreeable for those who want something for nothing. This republic—business—this free speech and free press business is all right in theory, but in practice it is a delusion and a snare. For

proof of this assertion, write M. A. Hanna or Brother Abner, Oberlin, Ohio, or R. A. Alger, Wm. McKinley or Pierpont Morgan—or if these aren't authorities enough write the editor of any "patriotic gold standard" paper of prominence. What we want is a king—or a fool killer.

OPPOSITE PROPERTIES.

Alm at anyone can understand why the man whose sole capital is comprised of dollars is always working for and voting for a system that shall make his every dollar buy a little more of everything else; but just why some farmers will vote with them, to debase the product of the farm, is puzzling. Just why farmers should go to the great corporations and money lenders of the country to find virtue and honor extolled is more of a puzzle. The money holder votes a straight up and down business proposition which will give him more for his dollar. When the farmer votes as money holders do, he is simply voting to give up more of his product to get a dollar. The cry of "honest money" is simply one of the ways to catch support—and so ridiculous and so simple it is, that a minute's reasoning will unveil the "virtue" mark.

A POOR FOOL.

Ex-President Cleveland says when the nation is at war the patriot's duty is to support it. If Cleveland or a man like him had been nominated by the Chicago convention, if the voices of Vilas and Briggs, Hill and Russell, Whitney and Harney, had been heard, and free coinage had been set aside, the democrats would have elected the president. If Cleveland had been president, the Filipino insurrection would have been stamped out at once with vim and resolution. His party would have gloried in the acquisitions of the war as a crowning triumph of democratic tradition. And the election of 1900 would have been a walkover for them instead of "an open grave."—Oregonian.
