

ANOTHER FATAL ACCIDENT AT LAUREL

Louis Meyer Shoots His Brother Edward.

BOY LIVED ABOUT FIFTEEN HOURS.

The Young Men Were Butchering Hogs. A Sad Case.

Edward Meyer, of Laurel, six miles south of here, died at two o'clock Tuesday morning, the result of a revolver shot in his head. Young Meyer was helping his brother Louis butcher hogs, and both were in the pen when the accident took place. Louis had just shot at a hog, not killing it, when the enraged beast made a rush at him. His foot slipped and he fell against a partition. In the struggle to get away, the revolver discharged, the bullet entering the brother's head near the top and center of the skull. The accident occurred Monday forenoon. Louis is about 23 years of age, while the deceased was about 20.

MRS. GEO. H. DURHAM.

The funeral of Mrs. Geo. H. Durham, who died Tuesday, was held at Portland today at 10:30 from the family residence, King and Salmon streets. The services at the grave, in Riverside cemetery, were private, and only immediate relatives were present.

Few persons have left behind a better life record than Mrs. Geo. H. Durham. She was the daughter of Rev. Harvey Clark, who came to Oregon as an independent missionary in 1841. Her sisters are Mrs. Dr. Elbert, of Vancouver, and Miss Maria Clark. Her children, Mrs. H. G. Platt, George C. and Marjorie, were with her when she died.

Mrs. Durham was born July 26, 1844, on Tualatin Plains, Washington county. She was educated in Forest Grove. Her father was a native of Vermont. He settled on the land now known as Forest Grove, and gave away most of it for founding a school, which was the nucleus of Pacific University.

Some years ago Mr. Griffin deeded some land to his son, Homer Griffin. Griffin retained a life interest in the land. Homer died and willed the land to his niece, Miss Patterson. Prior Griffin's death he had leased the land to a renter, who had some winter wheat, which was growing at time of Mr. Griffin's demise. At his death, the land in question descended to Miss Annie Patterson, but Mrs. Griffin, being administratrix, at harvest held that the grain rent should descend to Father Griffin's estate.
