

MALHEUR SHERIFF **ARRESTS S. JOHNSON**

A Resident of Above Forest Grove.

CHARGED WITH STEALING HORSES.

Arrest was Made Tuesday Morning Prisoner Taken to Vale.

Sheriff J. D. Looney, of Vale, Malheur county, Tuesday morning left this city in company with Deputy District Attorney H. T. Bagley, and proceeded to above Forest Grove, where he arrested Sherry Johnson, wanted in Malheur county for alleged complicity in horse stealing. Some time last summer, when Johnson left Malheur county, he accompanied a shipment of horses amongst which were several stolen animals. Looney eventually located the home of Johnson and a few days ago came out to Washington county, where he identified one of the stolen mares, which Johnson had sold to J. Caldwell, who resides near Carsten's mill. He wired home for a warrant for Johnson, and receiving the same, made the arrest and started for Vale with his prisoner Tuesday evening.

REMAINS TAKEN HOME.

As soon as the remains of the late Percy Oliver were landed at San Francisco, Dr. Linklater, the administrator of his estate, had a dispatch sent to that place, requesting that his remains be at once forwarded to the address of Geo. A. Oliver, Lakeland, Minnesota, who is the father of deceased. Nothing was heard of the request until the wires yesterday brought the doctor this dispatch: "Hudson, Minnesota, Feb. 14, 1900. Percy's remains arrived today; funeral tomorrow, at 1 p. m. George A. Oliver, Lakeland, Minn."

It is a great gratification to Hillsboro people to know that Private Oliver's remains have reached the old home to rest in peace, and to show how the father feels, read this letter from the parent to Dr. Linklater, received yesterday: "Dear Friend: I would say that what you have done in relation to Percy's remains is just what a father would have done. You have been as a second father to him and me in all your transactions. I saw by the papers that a number of the bodies of the Second Oregon had arrived at San Francisco, but did not see Percy's name among the list, so I was very much surprised to receive your telegram of the 3rd inst. I then sent a telegram to the officials there and yesterday received one that Percy's remains were sent on the night of the 8th, to my address. I thank you kindly for what you have done. (Signed) George A. Oliver."

The dead private has many friends in this county, where he taught school for several terms, and afterward was in the employ of Dr. Linklater as pupil and later on as druggist. This closes the chapter of the life of a thorough-going and conscientious young man—a man who was universally respected by all who knew him and beloved by his most intimate associates. His death occurred on the 2nd of November, 1898, at Manila.

Address of Welcome by Col. J. B. Eddy.

RESPONSE BY DR. WITCOMBE.

The Farmers' Institute convened at Forest Grove this morning. The address of welcome was made by J. B. Eddy, of the Times and Dr. Jas. Withcombe delivered a very neat reply. Prof. Cordley then took up the question of "Fruit Pests," which he intelligently handled. Discussion followed this, after which Mrs. S. T. Crow gave a selected reading. At 1:30 this afternoon Dr. James Withcombe lectured on conservation of soil moisture, and Ferd Groner, of Scholls, gave an interesting address on the County road problem. W. K. Newell discussed "Farm Manures." This evening the program, as published last week, will be followed, and tomorrow likewise, with the exception that instead of Prof. Fulton's number, Prof. Sweetser, of the University, will be heard on "Bacteria of the Farm." The meeting tomorrow evening will be held in the Auditorium of the College. Mr. Austin Buxton states that the attendance is much larger than the bad weather promised. Friday afternoon, Wm. Schulmerich, of Farmington, will tell the meeting how to care for dairy stock.
