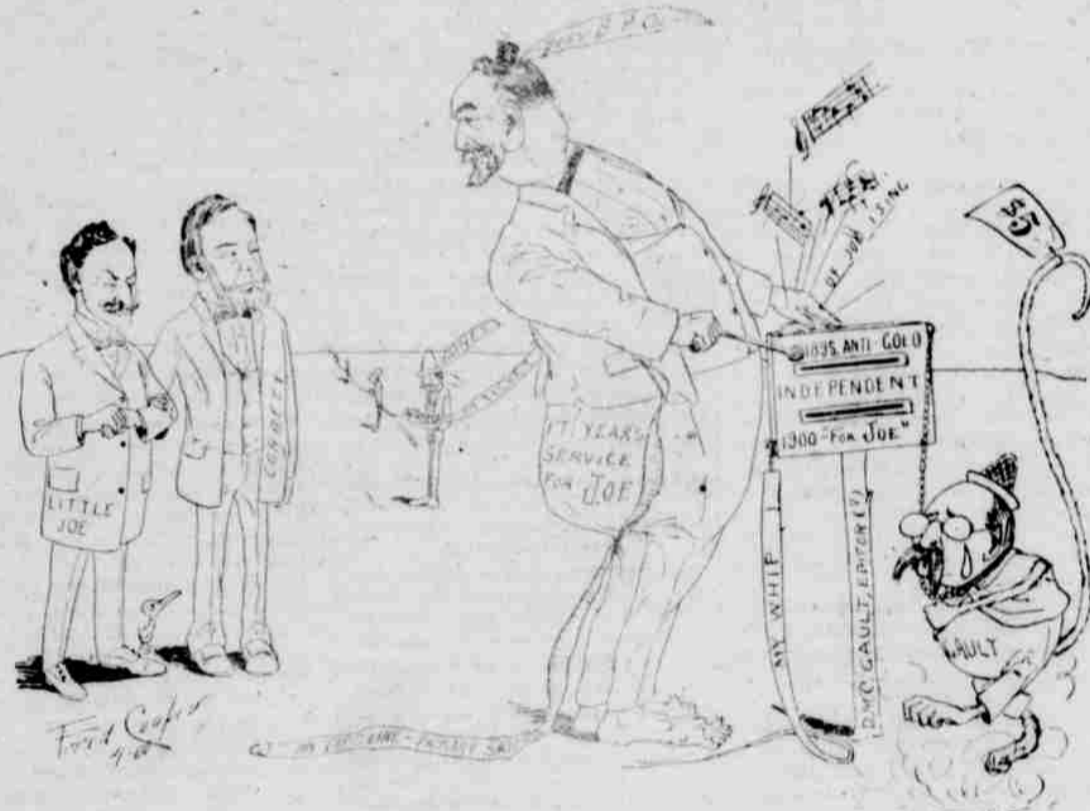
BROTHER GAULT BEGS.
