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BAND CONVENTION A SUCCESSFUL MEETING

A Large Crowd was in the city to hear the Music.

A SUCCESS DESPITE WEATHER.

An aggregation of Musical talent of which the County is very Proud.

The convention of county bands which met in this city last Saturday night was a decided success and the crowd was all that could have been expected. About fifty bandmen were present and the way the boys executed their number was evident by the marked demonstrations of the audience.

While the weather was raw and blustery still there was no rain, and the numbers were rendered out doors, the bandstand being

used for the concert. Everybody pronounced the affair as an agreeable indication of what the boys could do were they to get together and practice. All played together as one band, and there was but little discord.

Chas. E. York was present. Mr. York is president of the State Band Association, and he was well pleased with the showing and the way the bandsmen performed. Owing to this being the busy season the band attendance was not as large as it would have been at

any other time. Mr. York, at a banquet given the musicians at the Wehrung Hall, requested the various bands of the county to all join the State Association so as to attend the state fair where the body has been engaged to play this fall. This county can turn in about 75 musicians and the practice work for the fair will commence in a few weeks. At the banquet addresses were made by Mr. York, W. H. Wehrung, of the State Band of Agriculture, W. J. Wall, and by treasurer A. C. Shute.

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BEATHYAN PIONEER BURIED AT SEA

Jacob R. French Dies while on His Return.

WAS AT HONOLULU FOR HEALTH

Widely Known and Respected—Was a Pioneer of 1850.

Word has just been received in this city that Jacob R. French, an Oregon pioneer of 1850, while returning from a trip to Honolulu, died from an attack of dysentery. He was a passenger on the sailing ship Helen Denny, bound from the Sandwich Islands to Eureka, Cal. Mr. French left Bethany, this county, on the 17th of December to visit the islands in quest of health. He died on the 21st of April, and was buried at sea.

Deceased was born in New Jersey, January 14, 1824, and at the age of 19 took to the life of a sailor. After a cruise of three years he settled at New Orleans, and engaged in steambusting in the Mississippi River. He came to California in 1850 and in the fall reached Oregon. Soon thereafter he located near Bethany, owning a place there at the time of his death. Two children survive him—Mrs. E. Read, of Portland, and Mrs. Grant Holcomb, of Bethany, Or. One brother, Samuel French, a hotel man of Woodstown, N. J., and a sister, Sophia Slim, of Philadelphia, are yet living.

Mr. French married Miss Harriet Caples, at St. Johns, Ore., May 2, 1855. Mrs. French died February 24, 1868. Mr. French was a man of strict integrity, and a general favorite in his community. By religion he was a Quaker. His home trip on a sailer was occasioned by the fact that the quarantine prevented the departure of steamers, owing to the plague.
