THE OLD CHESTNUT.

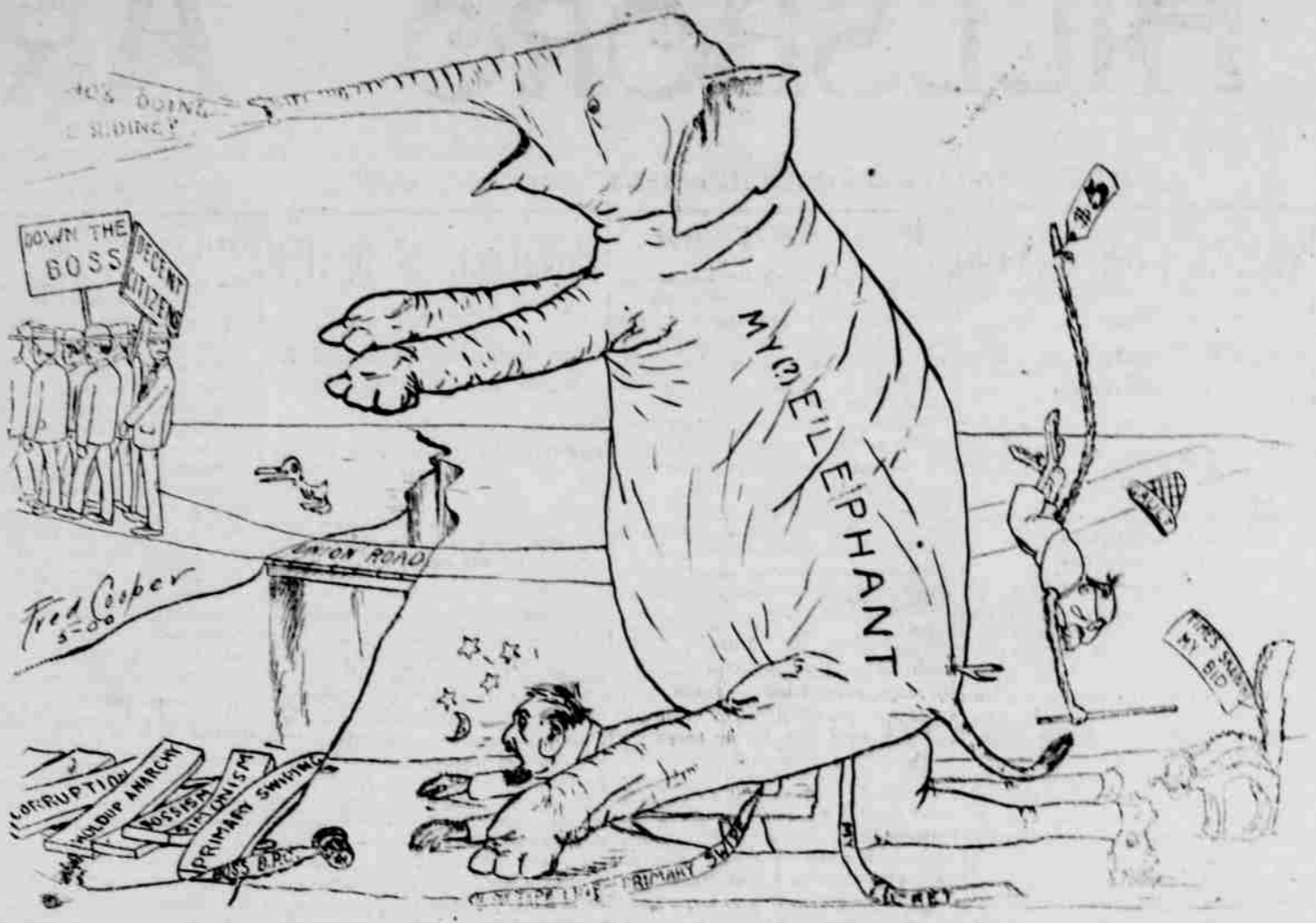
