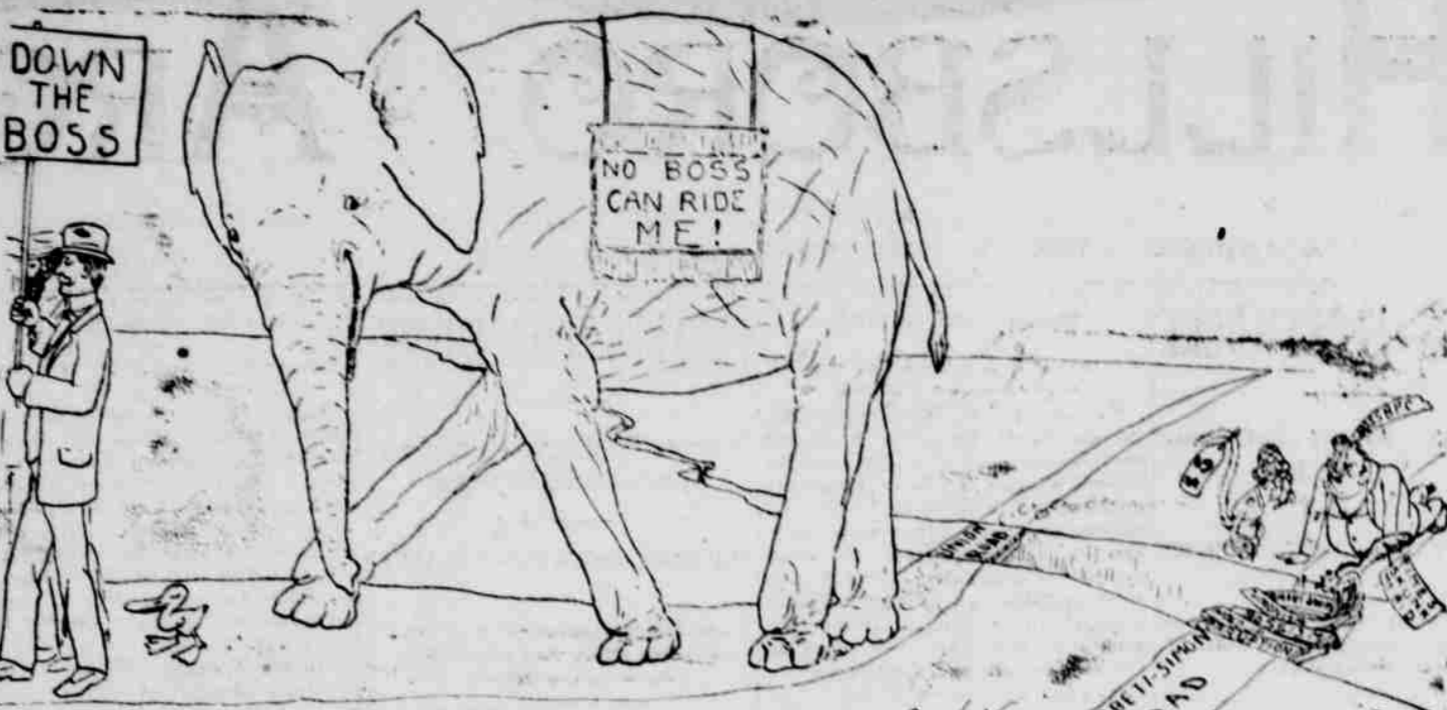

Washington county will next Monday decide upon a pure matter of honor. 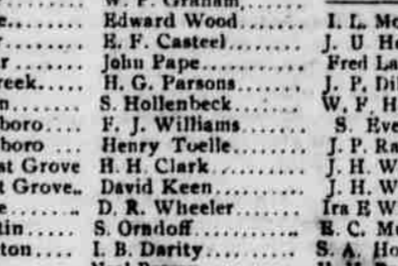

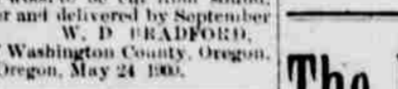

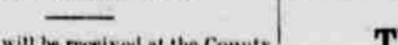
