

TWO SUICIDES OCCURRED MONDAY EVENING

Harrison Humphreys Ends Life by Hanging.

ULRICH PIEPER SHOTS HIMSELF Financial Trouble the Cause of the Hanging—His Health Prompted the Shooting.

Early Tuesday morning a search party was organized to find Harrison Humphreys, a resident of this city who had been missing through the night, and his lifeless body was found suspended from a tree in the little grove near the old brickyard southeast of the city.
