WHY BRYAN IS SUPPORTED.

Bryan is receiving more support than he did four years ago, and the reason is very clear to the student of national history. Note the attitude of the big papers against Bryan, and you will observe that he is assaulted in the same manner in which the Tory press assaulted first Washington, and later Jefferson; you will note that the spirit of attack is purely commercial. You will see that the papers which today fight Mr. Bryan, on every issue, would be from their own admissions, perfectly satisfied under a military government or under a monarchy. It is the sentiment that wants all the power in the president and none in the congress. It is the sentiment which sees danger in the rule of common people; it is the sentiment which believes in the rule of the few as against the rule of the whole people. Within four years much has been done to show people that Mr. McKinley is not the president. The Porto Rico matter disclosed the fact that McKinley was and is a mere figure-head; the Philippine question has shown us that Mr. McKinley completely changed front. Some one has been the dictator. Some one has forced us to the anomaly of a republic with monarchical powers. For this reason there are many laboring for the election of Bryan. Thousands who voted against him four years ago are now working earnestly for his election. These men are of the best brains of the country, and they are in deadly earnest. Men like Boutwell who have been life long republicans, have gone over to Bryan, and the press which four years called them patriots is now calling them traitors. Traitors to what? Traitors to monarchy; traitors to imperialist traitors to rottenness! Perhaps this, but not traitors to democracy and the highest ideals of republicanism. They support Bryan because he believes in the constitution.

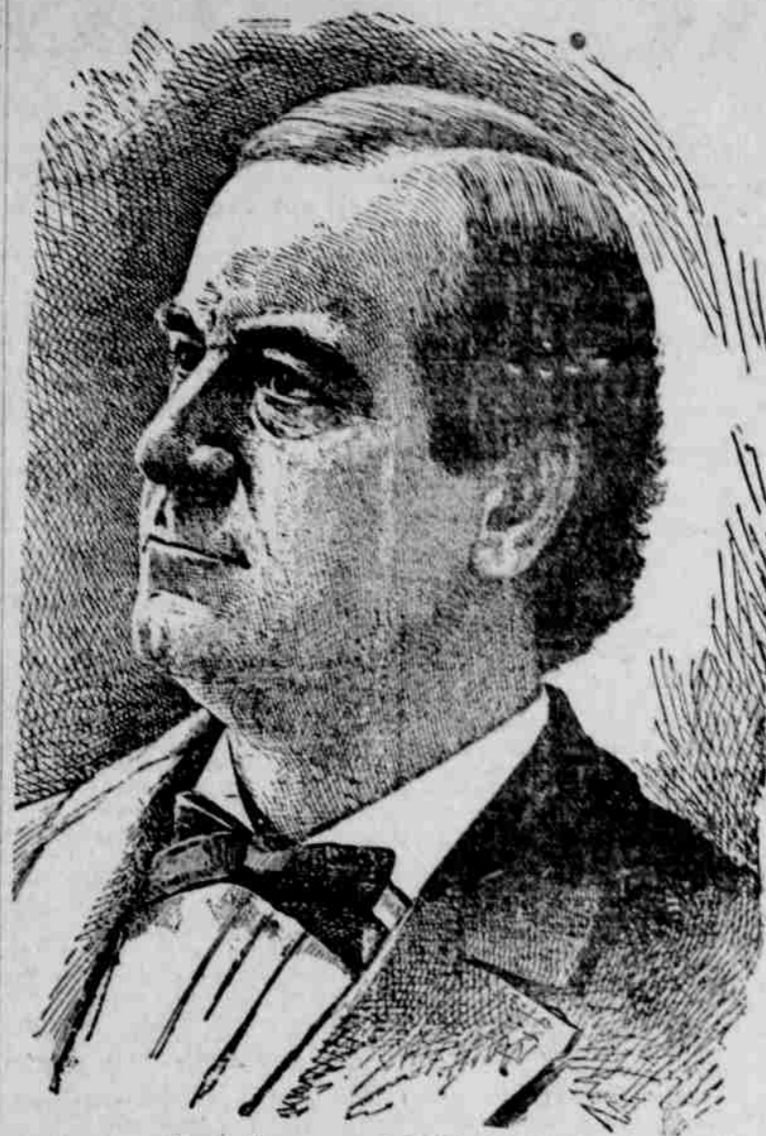
MISTAKE THE TEMPER.

Mr. Hanna, the campaign manager for those who have gained for a second time, the control of the republican party, much mistakes the temper of the American people when he tells them he has a standard with the Almighty. Through his journals, which for servility and obedience put to shame pure journalism, he tells the people that God and Destiny have it all settled and that this man and his tool, McKinley and Roosevelt, are elected without a doubt. He sets at naught the temper of a people who have always stood for a government by the people; he sets at naught the fact that the banks are running the country; he sets at naught the fact that the trusts are setting both the price of agricultural product and the manufactured article; he sets at naught the sentiment of the masses against building and keeping, at public expense, a great standing army; he sets at naught the great public sentiment against our tying up with a great power which never makes a mutual benefit alliance but which means first for Britain and second or nowhere for the other party to the scheme. Mr. Hanna very much mistakes the temper of the American people. He will hold many—but that great safety valve for democratic and republican institutions, the thinking voters, he will not get. And for this reason we shall see W. J. Bryan elected.

But when the poor old "Little American" discovered that he was like-ly to fall out of political preferment by reason of a Hanna boycott, and he flopped, did you notice that the Hanna papers suddenly discovered that he was a saint with curls, a statesman with brains; a patriot with pure purposes? Now honestly, Americans, doesn't this rot in our "only, honest and pure press" of the Hanna stripe, chill your sense of the eternal fitness of things? Do you remember how these same papers told you a few months ago that Hanna statecraft had cremated the silver bugaboo forever and how they are now telling you that that bad Bryan is a terror on postmortem examinations and that he will, if elected, dig up the silver corpse so securely buried, blow in it the breath of life and set it to work slaying the banks and incidentally cause dyspepsia of the body politic? Dear readers, are these papers foolish or are they drunk? Or are they just lying? Can you figure it out? What do you think of them anyway? Has the dream of monarchy by Hanna disordered some livers?

Who gave up gold bearing land over which our flag has floated these many years? Why, Mr. Hanna, whose tail candidate, Mr. Roosevelt, says that all democrats and populists are cowards. Isn't it a pretty mess—this hearing the cry, "Don't haul down the flag" coming from men who tell us that England has a better form of government than we have; who are trying to help imperial Britain crush the African republics? Just think a minute and see how ridiculous the whole proposition is from a common sense standpoint. These fellows, Hanna, Hay, Roosevelt & Co., want our flag to stand for nothing and either stands ready to surrender it when "Lunnon" says it would "be quite the thing, don't you know?"

A PRETTY BIRD, INDEED.

When Governor Geer sends an article to the east, he gets in the associated dispatches with much splendor; when he wants to send some one to China to tick the Boxers, he can always get editorial or news mention from the northwest dailies; when he goes out and makes a speech for the Jews and

for "God's" money, he can always have a column dished up in the Bungtown Blizzard, etc. But when he is openly charged with having sold a high public office; and when he makes the charge offers to make the proof, and when the law will protect him from slander and the penitentiary stands open for the accused should he fail to substantiate his accusation, he keeps out of the newspapers of state circulation. This is a pretty condition, is it not? And why is it? When old Harrison Kinsaid used a dollar's worth of postage more than his predecessor there was a holy howl raised; when Governor that was Penoyer issued a pardon, he caught hell; the journals of Corlettism were pillars of clouds by day and pillars of fire by night. But with the present loud mouthed incubus, everything goes. He is a veritable political soul saver and he can do no wrong. Perhaps, however, his votes tell why he is immune from being shown up by the dailies of Oregon. He is a pretty bird to pose as a state executive, indeed. But he is a valuable man for certain corporations. He is an in-tune. His veto is his vaccine virus.

Great Britain sets the pace; we follow. Let us quit this nonsense and be American—just for once.

After all, Mr. Hanna makes an excellent vice-roy for Salisbury in this country. We should send him to the House of Lords.

As we go to press the news reaches us that "Gov. Geer has not yet set sail for China to whip the Boxers—neither has Roosevelt. Geer is going to stay where a man can sell office and Roosevelt is smarting under the chastisement Hanna gave him for making St. Paul ashamed of him.
