Had Accepted a Draft for Twelve Hundred

BUT HAD FAILED TO LIQUIDATE.

Grant was then a Captain at Vancouver Barracks.

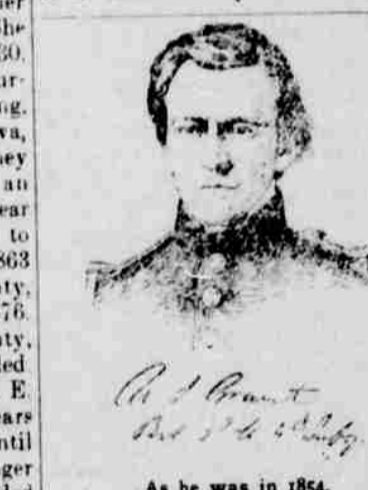

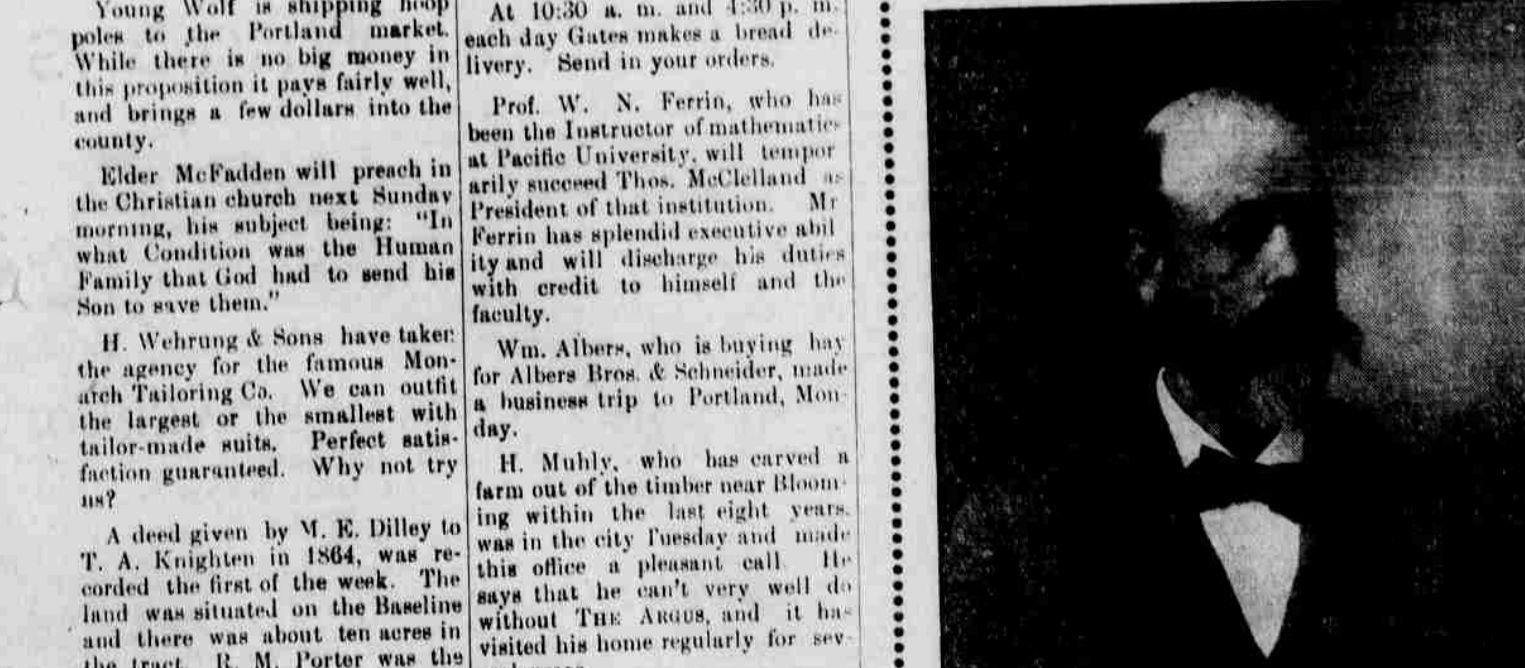
