THE STAMPEDE TO BRYAN

It is a patent fact, and one fraught with significance, that the most intelligent of the eastern writers on political economies who had the greatest notoriety for supporting McKinley in 1896, have bolted from the Hanna candidate and are now giving strenuous support to Mr. Bryan. These are men who realize the dangers which are setting the republic; they are men who are not "owned" in any sense of the word; they are men who are not influenced by party name or hope of party preferment.

The independent vote, therefore, bids fair to go for the democratic candidate this fall. There are many reasons for this, the most patent and vital being: Hanna control of the government and the shamefaced alliance with Great Britain; the departure from democratic and republican ideas of government and the everlasting demands of corporate wealth upon a administration which yields because it knows its masters and to whom it owes its tenure of life. The stampe is strong and unceasing, and so sweeping is the tide in favor of the Nebraskan and his ideas and conceptions of government, that Mr. Hanna is becoming alarmed. He is afraid that those who blindly vote his ticket one year in and one year out, whether his platform stands for national bimetalism, inter-sectional bimetalism, or the gold standard, "plain duty" to the Antilles or a King George tariff, empire or republic, will not be sufficient in voting strength to carry through the acknowledged creature of the trusts and the generally accepted chestnut raker of Lord Salisbury. Therefore he cries to the trusts for financial aid; and he now boldly does what hitherto he has not done, asks the common people who are blindly partisan to his will, to come forward with their little contributions. Mark sees the stampe and Roughrider Roosevelt can't head them off with his hypocritical yells of "oward and traitor."

PERFECTLY PROPER, MR. GAGE

Lyman J. Gage, Mr. McKinley's secretary of the treasury, has written his campaign contribution, and it has been eopiously copied by the cuckoo-cry journals. This was expected of Mr. Gage, and his little effort has provoked little comment or curiosity. He is a banker, and he is of a banker administration. He is with the big corporation elements, and Mr. Bryan's election, of course, would make Mr. Gage very dependent, no doubt. Mr. Gage belongs to that class which has no allegiance to national institutions, except that class control the laws of that nation. His portfolio, or underscretaryship, as our English friends would say, is the price paid the banking institutions for their liberal aid to promote and secure Mr. McKinley's election in 1896. He and his superior made mince ment of the international plank in the successful platform. They buried it as completely as possible. They are one in sentiment—that is to say, Mr. Gage is with the broker element and Mr. McKinley permits him to do as he pleases because he must live up to the purchase price of his election. So, after all, Mr. Gage's recent little bon mot was expected and the people are not surprised at its appearance. It is the bank contribution, and, as this is not a government of, by and for the banks, it will be treated with contempt by citizens of all parties who have any real interest in public affairs, or who have even a moderate conception of what a popular government means.

COX FOR BRYAN.

Lewis B. Cox, a Portland democratic lawyer who bolted Mr. Bryan in 1896, is now in the field for Candidate Bryan and in an article to the Pacific Monthly, says:

"Having all other considerations for the time being it is a fact so clear as to admit of no denial or evasion that the republican party is wholly out of sympathy with the masses of the people; its interests are no longer their interests, it does not command their confidence and it consequently has no just claim upon their support. Many candid republicans make no secret of saying that the people are no longer to be trusted to conduct their own affairs, but that a ruler must be provided for them, and what these say many more think. The republican party maintains its position through good leadership and discipline through the cohesiveness and sympathy of the great organizations which have fattened at its board, supported by unlimited means, rather than by the spontaneous and sympathetic loyalty of the masses of the people. This tendency of the republican party to doubt the common people and to shridge their control over governmental affairs is the vital political issue of the day, obscured and encumbered as it is by other considerations. * * * Recent years have witnessed many political changes and conditions have been such that none of us can be justified in sitting in judgment upon the motives which have animated some other. Perhaps we will do well enough if we can see clearly the path of duty which lies before our feet. The writer does not treat the subject from the standpoint of an original Bryan man, or an advocate of the Chicago platform, or yet from that of a person to whom party allegiance is superior to civic duty. But we are confronted by issues as momentous as any which have yet engaged public attention, and we have come to a plain parting of the ways. The one is a continuation of the history of our country as it has heretofore been gloriously written, clouded overhead and rough under foot, it is true, but nevertheless in its ends certain and magnificent; of the other no one can or dares to enter a prediction. What choice is there offered to one who has been brought up to believe in the principles of free popular and republican government as enunciated by Jefferson and as cherished from his time to these waning days of the nineteenth century?"

HAS THE STATE BEEN OUTRAGED?

John P. Robertson has stirred up quite a sensation by his inquiry as to what has become of all the school land bases selected by T. W. Davenport, during that gentleman's term as state land agent, a position now filled by L. B. Geer, a cousin of the governor. It seems from Mr. Robertson's letter to the Oregonian of recent date aent the matter, that none of the bases selected by Davenport, and which should now be available for the use of the clerk of the board of school land commissioners when application is made by an intending purchaser, can be found and that the present clerk has to secure bases held by private persons, for which the applicant is forced to pay an additional sum other than that prescribed by law. Robertson's charge, which up to date has not been specifically denied.
