County on July 5th.

FORD CHARGED WITH OVER \$2000

The Report is Voluminous and Covers
Much Ground, Now a Public Document.

The report of Clark and Buchanan, the experts who recently audited the books of the late county officers, was today made public by being opened by the commissioners' court. The findings, officially read as follows:

COUNTY TREASURER.

We find that there is due Washington County, Oregon, from J. W. Sappington, ex county treasurer, on the 5th day of July, 1900, the sum of \$23 33 1-10, said sum being unpaid on date hereof. We find that there is due Washington County, Ore., from E. B. Sappington, ex county treasurer, on the 5th day of July, 1900, the sum of \$63, said sum being unpaid on date hereof. We find that there was due Washington County, Oregon, from A. B. Cady, ex county treasurer, on the 5th day of July, 1900, the sum of \$745 06. Of said sum there has since been paid the sum of \$44 96, leaving a balance due of \$700 10.

COUNTY CLERK.

COUNTY HOP CROP
REPORTED AS SHORTOutput Will be From One-
third to One-Half Light.

QUALITY, HOWEVER, IS EXCELLENT.

So Says an Experienced Hop Man, and
one who has Been Over County.

A prominent Washington County hop grower tells THE ARGUS that the hop crop for Washington county will be from one-third to one-half short in comparison to the yield of last year. The consoling feature of this report is that the quality is excellent, and the product will, in nearly all yards, bring the top notch so far as prices are concerned. Jas. H. Sewell, whose yard is northeast of this city, upon picking, finds that his yield is running considerably over one-third behind, and it is said that this is the experience of other growers. Here and there, of course, there are yards which are coming up to harvest promises, but they are few and far between. If this situation is general over the state, it will cause good prices, so that the loss of yield will be made up by increase of price. The Wood yard, below this city, is one of the yards which will give a full yield, and Zina Jr. is correspondingly happy.
