PROSPERITY'S NIGHTMARE.

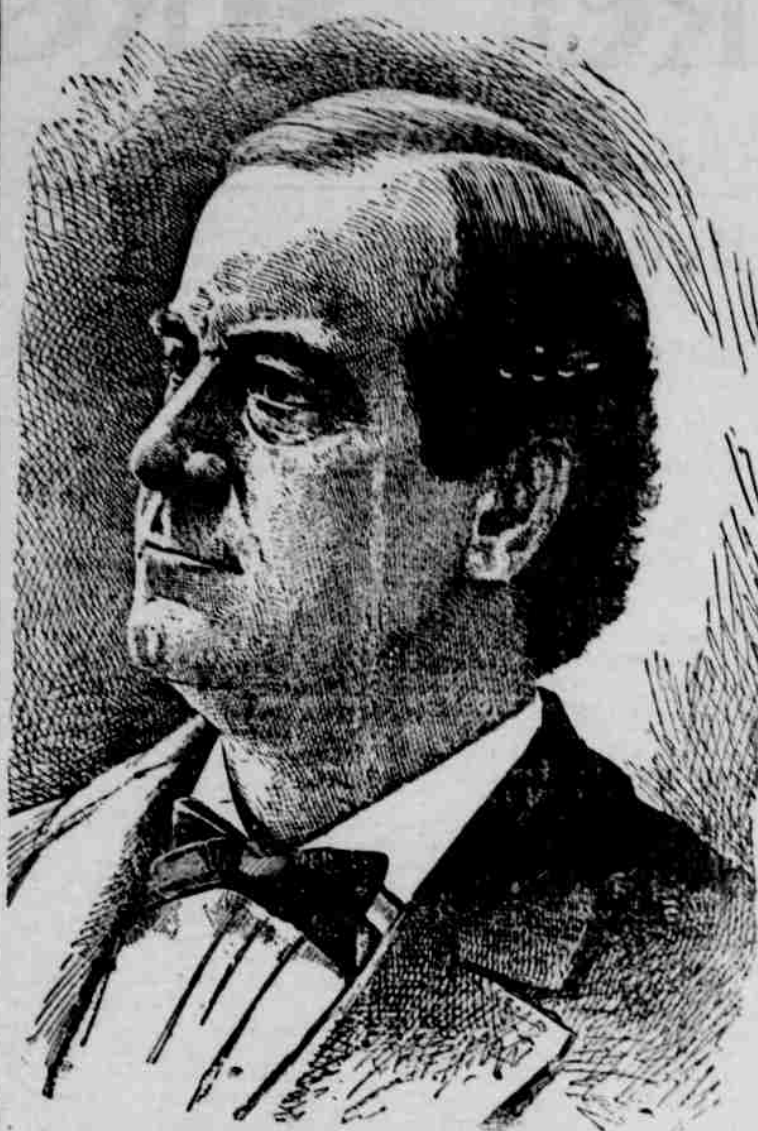
The big anthracite coal strike has given the prosperity howl of the Hanna campaign managers a severe and telling setback in the information it has disseminated to the general public. The coal trust which has been a creature of greed from first to last, and which has ever been one of the beneficiaries of an unrighteous tariff, has been paying its dependents the miserable average of about ninety cents per day, upon which a whole family must be supported, in these piping days of prosperity, and rainbow of universal contentment! It is now made public that we have misery in our own country and that this misery is due to vested rights by virtue of legislation and Mr. Hanna. The dream of security by Mr. Hanna and his satellites, in which power and empire brightly dazzled, and in which the gleam of the rifles and bayonets covered a tented field in the background, has been rudely shattered by cold facts—the nightmare of realism. Capital has been traveling in its Pullman coach; farmers have been operating, the nation over, on profit which is but a shadow; substance has been drawn from the taxpayer to keep up the show of splendor and empire in the East—while here in America we find men working all day in which to earn ninety cents of honest money to support a whole family. Is it any wonder that the East is opposed to empire? Is it any wonder that labor is tired of Hannaism and hypocrisy, forced upon a nation by lying lips and deceitful platforms—written by trust brokers and bloated brokers? This recent nightmare is what has aroused capital to fresh efforts; opened anew the purse of corporate greed; started afresh with a desperation the organs of Hannaism to befoul the ignorant and susceptible; sends out bankers to dazzle the dupes who love glitter and think it smart to "agree" with a "financier."

With this spectacle before us—practical starvation—is it any wonder that the hosts of Hanna are redoubling their efforts to petting their way to the white house?

THE LIGHT THAT IS FAILING

There is one great guiding light for this nation, and that is the principle of self-government—the sentiment which has ever said that the people shall rule. It is a significant fact that those who have no faith in the masses have controlled the party, the republican party, for some years past. While to secure this control it was necessary to put up a fake platform in 1896, yet the control was, and is, today, complete. The power so controlling is in the embodiment of the letter and spirit of Alexander Hamilton who after we had gained our independence, favored an alliance with Great Britain and an aristocracy of government. The chief factor of the control is the purely commercial spirit, whose chief agent is Mr. Hanna. He is bold and impudent; he is an unscrupulous politician; a purchaser of men and a man who sneers at humane as against corporate rights. For Hanna and his immediate ilk, who today are fooling men of real intelligence all over the nation, a British form of government is the highest type of ideal. They are the Tories of our government today just as there were Tories when Washington led our forces, and as well, when Madison started the war in 1812. These Tories of current history have their journals like the Independent and the Oregonian supporting them just as in the olden times there were journals printing the letters of Hamilton

and Quincy, damning the Jeffersonian idea of government and slandering over English institutions. The light that has for thirty years led the republican hosts to battle commenced to fail when New England commercialism gained its hold in party councils; in 1896, when the banking houses of Lombard and Wall Street contributed to party success, it grew more dim, and within the last four years the spirit of empire has so firmly fixed itself in our administration that even McKinley is powerless to break away. A few men—the real old Tories, are trying to mislead the rank and file of the republican party into support of that which is obnoxious to true Americans. That there will be enough of a revolt to beat this crazy scheme of Boss Hanna is an earnest of all lovers of true America.

THE JEW IN POLITICS.

Last week's Independent contains the herewith little tickler for the edification of its readers:

For a long time our friend, Mr. Long, of THE ARGUS, has frothed at the mouth about the Jews in politics. Indeed, he almost exhausted his vocabulary of vituperation in abusing them. Yet a few days ago his idol, W. J. Bryan, spoke from the same platform with a Jew, Mr. Altschuler, the democratic candidate for governor of Illinois. Wonder what Mr. Long will say to this little incident.

THE ARGUS never froths at the mouth—and it never stutters. It says what it has to say, and it generally proves its assertions; whether THE ARGUS fights boss rule in Washington county, in which case it has received the endorsement of a majority of our good county people; or whether it fights the Jew boss-ridden conditions of the state of Oregon; or the same conditions nationally, and it records its statements in consonance with history. Readers of history agree with it in this regard. THE ARGUS never stammers or stutters when it asserts these facts. From the great banking house of the Rothschilds down to the Hebrew money brokers in New York and Philadelphia, the Jew is the master mind and dictator in financial legislation; the same of the Jew in Berlin and Paris. He is the life of the gold standard everywhere—because it gives him "more goats for de mon-eh."

Occasionally you find a Jew who does not follow Mark Hanna. But such a Jew belongs to the lost tribe and it is very little support he will get from his people. The Independent has found a Jew who is not in Mark Hanna's political synagogue, and it tickles its acumen. But the fact is an innovation and an infrequent exception. When there are more Jews who love country, like Altschuler, the Hebrews will have a country and a flag of their own, which they now do not have. Many of them are satisfied because they control master minds like that of the Independent editor.

THE Independent editor says that he did not like Messrs. Coffey

and Durette because, most likely—he did not like them. The animus of his criticisms is most likely the same as that which prompted him to criticize Mr. Huston several years ago—because that gentleman was on the democratic side. Mr. Independent probably remembers the occasion for he received one of the neatest little skinning of the day in the court house when Mr. Huston was making a speech. Little editors who stand one year against bank domination of our money and the next year for it are always so prejudiced that they never have a good word for their immediate opposition.

BRYAN AND THAT TREATY.

The republican press and orators have been attempting to make a point against Mr. Bryan because he favored the ratification of the Paris treaty. But in a speech, recently made in West Virginia, he made his position clear, saying: "If a republican tells you that that treaty could have been amended in the U. S. senate, I want you to remember that when the Bacon resolution came before that body it met with a tie vote, and the vote of the republican vice-president defeated it. I did all I could to get the Bacon resolution passed; and what republican would say that I could have got the treaty amended, when I could not get the resolution passed that promised independence to the Filipinos? It was much easier to promise independence to the Filipinos after the war had been closed than it would have been to secure an amendment to the treaty which would have been ratified by Spain. When you accepted the treaty you ended the war, and I believed then and still believe that this nation, acting alone, could do by itself everything that it could have forced from Spain. I favored the ratification of the treaty, not because it was good, but because it was easier to correct its mistakes by legislation than by diplomacy." There would have been no war with the Filipinos had the Bacon resolution been passed by the senate.—Exchange.

The Independent grows funny over Gov. to be Altschuler, of Illinois, and says, inasmuch as that gentleman is a Jew, that it wonders what THE ARGUS will say to this. THE ARGUS will tell the Independent that if Mr. Altschuler is a Jew, and a democrat, that he is the exception, the one out of a hundred. And, very likely, from the fact that he is an exceptional Jew, he may be a very fair sort of fellow. But this is neither here nor there. When the Independent gets a squib from outsiders to adorn its editorial page, it should also get an outsider to give it a spelling lesson on names or else study a little modern political history.
