JOHN AND REBECCA LEWIS WIN THEIR CASE

Get Over \$900 for Nineteen Months' Work.

W. N. BARRETT FOR PLAINTIFFS

The Dead Man Cut off his Brother With One Dollar.

Judge L. A. Rood yesterday entered his findings of fact of record in the case in probate, John and Rebecca Lewis, husband and wife, against the estate of Hugh Owen Lewis, deceased. The decree gives John Lewis \$27.50 per month for 19 months care of the dead brother, and Rebecca, the wife of John Lewis, \$20 per month for 19 months making a total of over \$900. The decree carries the costs of the suit.

Hugh Owen Lewis owned one of the finest farms in Washington county, the land being situated near Farmington, comprised of several hundred dollars. Lewis was in poor health several years before he died and his brother John and his wife, Rebecca, cared for him and worked on the farm, furnishing the household goods and doing the cooking, etc. When Lewis died his will was admitted to probate, and he was discovered to have cut his brother off with one dollar legacy, bequeathing his property to a brother and sister in Wales. The estate has been appraised at twelve thousand dollars, but with a small incurrence, is probably worth ten thousand. The renter on the farm in question last year made one thousand dollars clear, which speaks volumes for its fertility. W. N. Barrett, of this city, was attorney for the disinherited brother and his wife, while Fenton & Muir, of Portland, are attorneys for the administrator, Robert Foulkes. The case will likely be appealed to the supreme court.

Inventory of estate of John M. Lyon, deceased, filed and approved at \$471.25, and ordered that personal property exempt from execution be set aside for benefit of widow.

Citation ordered served on heirs of estate of H. C. Raymond, deceased, to appear at court house November 5 and show cause if any there be why realty should not be sold.

Estate of Nathaniel Holland, deceased, heard for final settlement and the estate finally closed of record and bondsmen discharged.

Ordered that executor of Hugh Owen Lewis estate pay to John Lewis \$522.50, and Rebecca Lewis, \$380, same to be paid out of estate.

Estate of Flora Collett, deceased, finally settled and closed of record.
