A FIRE LOSS.

About 1:30 last Friday afternoon a
fire broke out in the house belong-
ing to and occupied by Mrs. Reeves,
located two doors north of the can-
nery, in North Hillsboro. The
flames caught from a defective flue,
and before the water could be turned
on there was such headway that the
upper part of the building was re-
ndered worthless. Twelve min-
utes after the alarm was sounded
the fire was running. Nearly all the
furniture was saved. There was
no insurance, contrary to the first
report that the building was covered
with a policy. The loss is es-
timated all the way from \$250 to
\$500.Orville Wilkes received a hard
blow from the nozzle on the end of
the hose, which fell from the roof
of the kitchen. Some one was
trying to hold the hose preparatory
to taking it down for another posi-
tion, but the weight was surely
dragging him off the roof. To
save himself he let go the nozzle
and it fell to the ground, the end
striking Mr. Wilkes' head, cutting
a severe scalp wound.

PASSES AWAYMrs. Sophia Mercer, of For-
est Grove.

CAME TO OREGON THE YEAR 1852

Died Monday at the Residence of her
Daughter, in Forest Grove.FOREST GROVE, Or., Nov. 14.—Mrs.
Sophia Mercer, who died at the
home of her daughter, Mrs. D.
C. Stewart, in this place, Monday,
was born in France in 1812. At
the age 16 she came to America
with her parents and located at
Utica, N. Y. The family also
lived in Michigan and Missouri.
In 1840, in the latter state, she
was married to Samuel A. Lee.
While crossing the plains to Ore-
gon with an ox team in 1852, her
husband succumbed to that dread
disease, cholera. Mrs. Mercer con-
tinued on, enduring many hard-
ships. She made the perilous pas-
sage down the Columbia river from
The Dalles in a flatboat. North
Yamhill, in Yamhill county, was
reached that fall, and there she re-
sided until about 20 years ago. In
1853 Mrs. Lee was married to K.
B. Mercer, who died several years
ago. Two children survive her,
Alfred Lee, of New Whatcom, and
Mrs. D. C. Stewart, of this place.
The funeral occurred here today.
Interment was in the Congrega-
tional cemetery.—F. G. Cor.

THE OFFICIAL COUNT.

Clerk Morgan was assisted Satur-
day by Justices of the Peace, Ran-
dall, of this city and J. H. Wirtz,
of Forest Grove, in making the of-
ficial count of the vote for presi-
dential electors. Owing to the fact
that in many cases the votes for
the four electors for each party
varied, it is hard to give an accu-
rate account of unit support. The
following, however, comes as near
being official as possible, when you
use expressions for McKinley and
Bryan instead of for the four electors
representing each candidate,
and the majority is the same as
that derived by the official count,

The prohibition candidate re-
ceived 126 votes; the Middle-of-the-
Road Populists, 4; and the Social
democrats, 47. This leaves the
McKinley vote a majority over all
of 559. The total vote cast is 2,921.
The total vote four years ago was
3,771—or, 850 more than this fall.Of the total vote cast in Wash-
ington County, Mr. McKinley re-
ceived a trifle over fifty six per
cent; Mr. Bryan received nearly
thirty eight per cent; Mr. Wooley
received four and thirty-one-hun-
dreds per cent, Debs polled one
and six-tenths per cent; and Mr.
Barker, the mid-road candidate, a
trifle over one-tenth of one per cent.

JOSEPH MEIER INJURED.

Joseph Meier, who resides about
one-half mile east of Hillsboro sta-
tion, suffered a severe injury while
at Kerr's cider mill, Tuesday after-
noon. He was alone and had just
raised four sacks of apples to the
upper story by means of a wind-
lass. He thinks that he let go the
sweep to take hold the sacks, think-
ing the windlass would remain sta-
tionary. Instead of this the arm
made a rapid revolution and caught
him just over the right
eyebrow, cutting the flesh away
clear to the skull. He was render-
ed senseless, and, upon recovery,
taken to Dr. F. A. Bailey, who
found that the upper jaw was
fractured. He bled profusely and
while he is now feeling well enough
for a badly hurt man, the extent of
his injuries is sufficient to lay him
up for some time to come. Just
whether his eye is injured or not,
time will demonstrate.
