THE STATE BOARD LEVIES THE 1901 TAX

Washington County Commission will Tomorrow.

STATE LEVY IS 5.7 MILLS THIS YEAR

County Levy is liable to be as low or lower than in 1900.

The State of Oregon has levied a tax for the year 1901 and the good people of Washington County will pay to the state government five and seven-tenths mills. The County Commissioners will meet tomorrow to fix the county levy. Unless the recent rains shall have done great damage to the bridges about the county—which as yet has not been ascertained to a certainty, the collection will not be any higher, if as high, as last year. Washington County is fast forging out of debt, and, today we doubt if there is a county in the state better situated than this financially. Let the good work go on. The taxpayers can stand it and they do not easily forget that which touches their pockets.

This is not authoritative, at all, and is only based upon old calculations. Judge Rood is desirous of getting the debt reduced so that the interest account will be wiped out entirely in another year. The recent high water has let the county down fairly easy—and there will not be thousands to add for repairs.

OUR FAME.

The increasing interest in dairying in Oregon is well reflected by the character of the meetings of the Oregon Dairymen's Association and the treatment accorded the association by the people of the cities or towns in which its meetings are held. It is a great change from the time a few years ago when the association, out of its meager funds, was compelled to pay for the insertion of a notice of its meeting in one of the local papers of the place where it was held, and was not dismayed at a total attendance of less than a dozen persons. At the late meeting at Hillsboro the visiting members were greeted with a band at the depot and speeded on their departure in the same cheerful way. The local papers not only advertised the meeting liberally but also supplied programmes and other printing without cost to the association. The visiting members found their hotel bills paid. In fact there was nothing which the citizens of Hillsboro and Washington county could do to make the meeting successful, and at the same time pleasant for the visitors, which was not done. The attendance was remarkably good considering the execrable weather. —Rural Northwest.

HON. E. E. FANNING.

Pomeroy, Wash., Jan. 13, 1901.

Fanning, who about 25 years ago was elected to the Lower House of the legislature from Washington County, on an independent ticket and who in 1877 moved to Pomeroy, Garfield County, Wash. Mr. Fanning died at this place, Dec. 27th, at the advanced age of 73 years. He had been quite feeble for several years but was only confined to his bed a few days before the end came. He was buried beside his wife who died some eight years ago. He leaves six sons, two daughters and a sister, all residents of this state.

JAMES AIKEN WAS HELD AND REMANDED

Is now awaiting the March term of Circuit Court.

THINKS HE CAN PROVE INNOCENCE.

Did not make any defense at his hearing. H. T. Bagley for defense.

James Aiken had his hearing for the murder of the Raleigh Chinaman, Saturday last, Judge Rood sitting as a committing magistrate. E. B. Tongue represented the State and H. T. Bagley was counsel for the defendant. The state had witnesses to prove that Aiken was present when the Chinaman had been paid money in a Portland saloon and that Aiken knew he had more than \$25 then paid the Celestial. It further had a witness who swore that Aiken heard the officers were after him for arrest, said he "guessed he would blow the town," a slang expression which means to "skip." It further had a witness who swore that Aiken, when intoxicated, said a "chink" (meaning a Chinaman) had been killed, but no money was got.

The defense, it is said, had a woman out from Portland to prove an alibi, but as soon as the state was through its evidence, the defense decided to make no fight other than argument to dismise. The case looks black against Aiken. The Chinaman who survived the fight, swears that Aiken is the man who struck him over the head with a club. Aiken's mother, who is said to be a very nice old lady, was present at the hearing.

Judge Rood, after hearing argument, decided that the defendant should be remanded to jail to await the coming term of circuit court.

CONNELL—LONG.

Sunday's Oregonian contains the following notice of the marriage of Dr. E. De Witt Connell, well known here and whose mother resides at Glencoe.

The wedding of Dr. E. De Witt Connell and Miss Caroline R. Long, daughter of City Attorney J. M. Long, at St. David's Church Wednesday night was one of the prettiest that have ever been held in Portland. The church had been decorated magnificently and in exquisite taste, the altar being blanketed with pink and white carnations, while palms and exotics screened every corner from view. A great star of white incandescent lights glittered over the chancel steps. The church was crowded with the friends of the couple, many of whom were unable to gain admittance.
