REMEMBER THE LIVING.

The moneys misappropriated for years by the Oregon legislature would have pensioned every Indian War Veteran in the state. Congress has done nothing for these early defenders. The state seems to take no interest in them. It is only when there is a campaign on that T. A. Wood gets prolific in promises and works the congressional pledge graft for all it is worth. It is worth nothing—this biennial bud which always blights before bloom—and yet this Mr. Wood lends to each campaign his circulars pregnant with promise. Let the state go slow on monument funds and other such matters until it has given these worthy old fighters a decent recognition. No taxpayer will begrudge them their justly entitled mite. Then put men in Congress who will accomplish something toward a relief bill. But should even a relief bill fail we shall rest secure in the consciousness that we have done our full duty to the men who made life and government possible in the early days of the Northwestern empire. "Let us provide first for the living," should be the motto of all good citizens. Then it will be time to memorialize those who are gone.

THE SENATORIAL FIGHT.

Corbett's only recommend for the United States Senate is his money. The people of Oregon have no desire to send him there. They are generally cognizant of the fact that Mr. Corbett is boodle politician, and that he straddles himself with grounders like Larry Sullivan and Graham Glass, whose records as politicians are dirty. successes were never forgiven by the queen and the overthrow of Disraeli was to her a matter of genuine grief. Lord Beaconsfield was an aristocrat, and aristocracy he served. He had no love for the masses and he looked upon them as but subjects and louts. Raised from the ranks himself, he forgot that brotherhood of earlier days and sought only to serve his masters of royal birth and lineage. But historians do well to not forget that the queen was the creature of an environment that kept her out of touch with the real mainstays of social and civic life. She saw but one side of life—and that the royal side. When she condescended to weep over some dead soldiers, or lost battallion, it was a sop to those upon whom the nation might soon call. She was a woman, and therefore it is charity to say as little as possible against her life, public or private. But had she exercised her rights as a sovereign in instances where charity should have reigned, instead of permitting the Chamberlains and Salisbury to take things in their own hands, England today would have been an England that the world would have adored as much as it is possible for an empire to be adored. She will be followed by Wales and all eyes will with scrutiny watch the change.
