W. H. Hacker asks for Damages from Via and Large.

WANTS SUM OF THREE THOUSAND

Broke an arm in October and claims improper medical attention.

W. H. Hacker, residing at Nehalem, and who broke a bone in his left arm last October, subsequently walking clear into Forest Grove to have the bone set by Doctors C. L. Large and W. P. Via, has brought suit against these physicians in the sum of \$3,000. He alleges that they set the arm Oct. 22 and that they "unprofessionally, negligently, carelessly and unskillfully performed said services, greatly to the damage of this plaintiff." He further alleges that they charged him \$30 for the services, and that he has paid \$10 thereof. Hacker is said to be a man of middle age. The plaintiff states that he is still unable to perform any labor or to do anything or in any way use said arm. J. N. Hoffman is his attorney.

Superintendent Barnes of the Hillsboro schools gives in the following report for the month ending January 18: number enrolled, 296; number absent, 439 (that is, number days absent for the month); number tardy, 50. An agent of the Franklin mail contracting company is in the city today and went out to see Frank Hall, who recently took the contract to carry the mail between this city and Cedar Mill, and who gave a chattel mortgage to act as a bond. Hall never took the route and the service has been supplied by Postmaster Waggoner. Just what the company will do as to collecting on Hall's chattel for breaking the contract remains to be seen. The agent comes from Seattle, and will get some one to permanently take the route before leaving.

Hon. W. N. Barrett returned this morning from a trip to Salem, whither he went to meet some of his old legislative friends. He reports the senatorial fight running along smoothly.

Sherwood is on deck with another shooting scrape. Wm. Wilson has sworn out a warrant against his brother-in-law, Thos. Hess, charging him with firing a revolver at him last Sunday. The case will come before Justice Everett. There has been bad blood between them for some time and the merits of the case can not be learned. There has also been some bad marksmanship as the bullet missed Wilson several feet. When Hess shot at Wilson the latter and his wife, who is a sister to Hess, were walking along the highway near Sherwood. It is said the warrant was sworn out upon the advice of Hess' father.

The city of Hillsboro will collect only \$1,722.05 taxes this year on the property roll, and this will nowhere near conduct city government. This low collection comes from the horizontal reduction in real estate valuations, the property inside of the city limits being valued at \$172,205, and the city put the levy up to its limit, ten mills. The saloons, if licensed, will contribute \$1,200 for the year. Outside of special license for dogs and shows, the city will then get the sum of \$2,922.05 for its expenditures. So if there is any very great reduction of the warrant debt there will have to be a flood of shows and increase of saloons—and if the saloon licensing should be revoked we shall have to extend the city limits to take in Cornelius to get revenue enough to pay running expenses. Forest Grove has a bigger debt than Hillsboro, and her net valuation is still less—\$135,200. That city has not yet levied its tax. A beaver comes to the front with a two mill levy—blessed is Beaver-ton.

COUNTY BOARD HAS LEVIED CURRENT TAX

The tax to be collected will be less than in 1900.

WILL COLLECT CASH FOR ROAD TAX

Made a three mill levy for that purpose.

The county commissioners met last Friday and levied the tax for the year of 1901 and while the levy in mills is higher than that of last year, the total tax to be collected will be less by fifteen hundred dollars, and this in the face of the fact that included is a three mill levy for road purposes, thus putting the road work on a cash, instead of a labor purpose. The levy is as follows on a basis of a total valuation of \$2,870,935, raising a total of money, \$77,515.24, as compared to a total of \$78,917.04 for last year:

State tax, mills	5.70
County general fund	13.20
General school	14,354.67
County road fund	5.00
County road fund	3.00
Indigent soldiers, fund	10
Total amount of levy	\$77,515.24

It is conservatively estimated that this levy, if collected anywhere nearly as close as last year, will, barring anything like an expensive deal of high water, pay all running expenses and wipe out the warrant debt, so that in a year from now the county will have no interest to pay. The road taxes will this year be collected in cash and the work supervised by the proper officers at a time when the work will be most beneficially applied.

TEMPERANCE PEOPLE UP IN ARMS.

Enthusiasts said to be willing to donate \$1,200 annually if license be stopped.

There is said to be a numerously signed petition being circulated asking the city council to refuse to grant liquor licenses after those now in force shall have expired. This is said to be the result of the work of Col. Holt, the temperance evangelist who has been holding forth in the city for some time. It is hardly likely that the petition will be granted, but if such should be the case we are likely to have a very "dry city" compared to which that "dry Sunday" of several years ago will be as a stream running full with nectar lulling the senses to sleep—a veritable Paradise. We all remember when the Sunday ordinance was first strictly enforced how many of our best citizens were on that day absent from the city. Now that the ordinance has for years been in practice, it has become the practice of citizens to imbibe well water on that particular day. The city council can prohibit, under the charter, the sale of liquor of any kind, or they can submit it to a popular vote at the annual election. The city would only be out \$1,200 annual revenue—which, of course, is not very much. It is said that Cornelius and Forest Grove are so caring much if we do forego the pleasure of open saloons, that it is a long time between drinks. "Eh?" and then, how they would pompously reply: "We believe in law, air, but if there is danger of your collapse, produce the price and we will join you in the purchase of an original package."

The Argus publishes this contemplated move for the benefit of the hundreds who annually visit this county seat—and particularly for the benefit of Portland attorneys.

S. J.
